p.125 "58. A Certificate of Captain Walter Izard Junior in Favor of Mr. Richard Baker for the Use of a Slave enlisted 17 Days for the Public Service in the late Alarm. Which having been also read to the House, it was ordered that the same be referred to the Consideration of the Committee appointed to settle and adjust the Accounts of such Persons as have Demands on the Public for Negro Hire and Provisions supplied the Militia during the late Alarm."

p.206 "The Petition of Eliza Moore to the General Assembly was read, setting forth that the late Daniel Cartwright, deceased, had heretofore bought of Mr. Richard Baker of Ashley Ferry, for a valuable Consideration, a Lot of land in Charles Town, distinguished and known in the Model, or Plan, of the said Town by the Number 136. One Half of the said Town lot was surveyed and laid out by Mr. George Hunter and Mr. George Haig and was sold again by the said Daniel Cartwright with a Dwelling House thereon to your poor Petitioner's Husband, John Moore, deceased, for about one thousand Pounds this Currency, where your poor Petitioner had lived about 9 Years.

"And lately one Mr. Bethel Dews, an Orphan, puts in a Claim to all, or the major Part, of the said Town lot of Land No. 136 with the Dwelling House thereon, he pretending to have a prior and better Right thereto, saying that his Grandfather left him two Town Lots of Land, No. 134 and 135, which were granted about 70 Years ago (containing about Half an Acre in front, and says that the Petitioner's Dwelling House stands upon His Land), and had already arrested the poor Petitioner for a Trespass, notwithstanding when the half Lot No. 136 were bought, both the Surveyors did affirm that Mr. Dews's Children had a Right only to a small Goe of Land.

"It is believed the Plan of Charles Town had been altered since Mr. Dews obtained a Grant for those Town lots No. 134 and 135 by which Means the said poor Petitioner is likely to loose the Land and her Building thereon and be totally ruined, and her Neighbors Mr. John Meek and other Owners of the adjacent Town Lots and Houses were likely to be removed and deprived of their proper Settlements, and (are) in a fair Way of being ruin(ed) also.

p. 235 "The Deposition of Alexander Parris who was taken the 12th Day of May last by a  
23 Feb. 1743 Spanish Privateer and carried into Augustine on the 8th of June and was  
brought with several others to Charles Town in a Spanish Vessel from  
Augustine with a flag of Truce to exchange for Spanish Prisoners on the  
5th Day of this Instant.

The Deponent says that he with several others of the English Prisoners were  
put on board some of the Spanish Vessels employed in the late Invasion  
of Georgia upon St. Simon's.... That besides a Bermudian Pilot who  
deserted from the Spaniards to General Oglethorpe there were two Irish  
Roman Catholics on board one of the Galleys, one of whom said he had been  
a Servant in this Province to one Mr. McPherson from whom he ran  
away to Augustine with 4 Negroes. That there was a great many Negroes on  
board the Fleet who had run away from Carolina, many of whom this  
Deponent knew, and one of them, named Toney, formerly belonging to Mr.  
Divines of Port Royal, desires to return if he could be sure of a Pardon, told  
this Deponent that they were to be employed particularly to go amongst our Negroes  
and to assure such as would <sup>desert</sup> their masters and join the Spaniards that  
they should be free. etc."
