


Carrick, and brought to John at Carrickfergus in July. John forced her to conform William's offer & took her with him to England. William met them at Bristol on 20 Sept. 1210 but as neither he nor his wife would pay any part of the 40,000 marks they were outlawed & fled to France from Shoreham. He died at Corbeuil on 9 Aug. 1211 & was buried in St. Victor's Abbey, Paris, by Archbishop Stephen Langton, the exiled primate. His proud wife, Maud de St. Valérie (Lady De Hangle) <sup>and her eldest son</sup> were imprisoned by John in Windsor Castle & starved to death. Their second son, the Bishop of Hereford, returned to Eng. 16 April 1214 & paid a fine of 9,000 marks for his father's lands on 21 Oct. 1215. He died soon thereafter and John allowed the lands to pass to William's 3rd son, Reginald, on 26 May 1216. Under Henry III Reginald recovered his Irish estates. William's daug., Margaret, m. Walter de Lacy & on 10 Oct. 1216 founded a religious house for the souls of her mother Maud & her brother William.

(William's grandfather was Philip de Braose, Lord of Bramber.)

William de Braose (+1211) was descendant & heir of William de Braose (alias, Braiose, Breause, Brehus, Brewer, etc.), Lord of Braose near Falaise in Normandy, who received great estates in England at the Conquest. The family located at Bramber in Sussex. Through his grandmother, a daug. of Judhael de Totnes, Lord of Totnes + Barnstaple, William also had a claim to one of those fiefs and through his mother, <sup>Lady</sup> Bertha, 2nd daug. of Miles + sister of Roger, Earl of Hereford, he inherited the vast Welsh dominions of her grandfather, Bernard de Neufmarché. It was as "William de Braose, junior" that he was made Lord of the "honour" of Brecon. His father was alive in 1179 but it was junior who invited the Welshmen to Abergavenny Castle in 1176 and slew them (nominally in revenge for their slaying his uncle, Henry de Hereford the previous Easter), a crime avenged on Braose's grandson by Llewelyn in 1230. Under Richard I William was Sheriff of Herefordshire 1192-99 + justice itinerant in Staffordshire in 1196. He was with Richard in Normandy in 1195 + secured both Barnstaple + Totnes for himself in 1196. On John's accession William was foremost in urging that he be crowned. He accompanied John to Normandy in 1200 + was granted all the land he could conquer from the Welsh in increase of his barony of Radnor. On 12 Jan. 1201 he received the honour of Limerick but not the city which his uncle Philip had received in 1172 from Henry II. On 23 Oct. 1202 John gave him custody of Glamorgan Castle + on 24 Feb. 1203 a grant of Gowerland which he claimed as his inheritance. He publicly refused to retain charge of Prince Arthur whose life he suspected was in danger. Possibly to silence him he was granted the city of Limerick 8 July 1203. On 16 Dec. 1206 he was given Grosmont, Llanthilio (or White) + Skenfrith Castles but shortly afterwards his fall began. He got in financial arrears to John + in Nov. 1207 surrendered Hay, Brecknock + Radnor Castles in pledge for his arrears. In 1208 he refused to grant hostages + was forced to flee to Ireland where he was harboured by William Marshall + the Lacy's. He returned to Wales in 1210 + offered John 40,000 marks for peace + the restoration of his lands but John declared he would treat only with William's wife, Maud de St. Valérie. She fled to Scotland but was captured in Galloway with her son + his wife, by Duncan of
