Dear Mr. Peeples,

I am enclosing herewith quite a bit of Cater material, which I hope will be of interest to you. I would appreciate your giving it your very early attention and returning it to me as soon as practicable, as I have no copy of it, and also yourself a copy of such part of it as you may desire, or such extracts as you may wish and return to me, except the sections marked "Do not return" which containing the "Cater Bible entries" of which I have a copy. My old notes are in much confusion and it is difficult for me to reassemble them. I have to go slow about everything.

I think perhaps I may have written you that I had a fall several years ago, which resulted in a fractured hip, but I continued working in my office until the spring of last year, when I had a physical breakdown and had to sleep in the hospital awhile for a test. My medical advisors told me that I was in excellent condition for my age, and that my main trouble was old age and overwork, doing a young man's work at the age of 72 years. So acting on their advice I withdrew from all activities public and private on the last day of Sept., 1962, and am now an invalid and can get around very well, but am careful not to overdo.

We have no public stenographer or typist here and I am unable to find one, who will come to my home to do my work as they would have to come at irregular intervals for short periods of work. It is therefore necessary for me to do my own writing. I can not use a typewriter, nor can I write with a pen on account of a touch of the palsy of old age, so I have to do my writing with a pencil and do the best I can, which is not so good at best. I hope you find it legible.

I tell you this by way of explanation and apology for using the pencil for my correspondence. I enjoy genealogical research and am pleased to give you such information as I can.
