Little Brother Joseph Chandler has 150 descendants who are members of the Chandler Family Association<sup>1</sup>. However, little has been published on this Joseph. The similarities in names makes identification of lines difficult. This kind of outline will not answer questions in detail; the goal is to get an overall picture of the family structure, where they moved to and settled down based on research, to aid in your continuing research.

WATCH the header line to follow the family line. And WATCH the DNA notations to see where lines have been verified or where more DNA is needed. Of the 27 current members who hold the 15–23---31 DNA pattern of the Branches (sons of Robert 2), 18 come from Little Brother Joseph, but he has 8 with a similar, but not this pattern. Why? We want to know.

## JOSEPH CHANDLER, I

Son of John (1600), Robert (1628), Robert 2 (1652)

Little Brother Joseph was baptized, 11 Aug. 1700, in New Kent County, VA<sup>2</sup>. He was 64 when he died, 1764, in Lunenburg County, VA. His life was that of a British colonist in VA under British rules with British judges and soldiers at the Forts and towns. As the colony grew in population, new counties were carved out of frontier Indian land and an American spirit developed.. Joe died 10 years before Patrick Henry's great, rousing speech and the Rev. War.

He was the baby of a family of 6 brothers and 1 poor sister. He, no doubt, had his chores to do, so much tobacco to hoe per day, cows to milk, water to get from the well or river. His father, Robert 2, had 160 acres in New Kent farmland; he was 45 with some grey hairs when Joe was born. He died when his boys were 22 to 37 years old.

Joseph listened with wide eyes as his brothers talked excitedly about new frontiers, Indians departing leaving land for settlers at bargain prices, in new counties and states.

Joe never knew his grandfather, Robert 1, born, 1628, in Elizabeth City County, VA, and died, 1669, in New Kent County, VA, but he would have heard stirring stories about him----how he chased and fought the Indians----went east 20 miles to the York River on the frontier in 1652 when the Governor called for volunteers to protect their back side. Robert 1 took his family up the York River to New Kent in 1662 to this very homestead where Joseph was growing up.

And, of course, he heard about his great-grandfather, John, 1600-1659, the first and very brave Chandler lad who came across the ocean at 9 years old and grew up to own 3,000 acres of land, married Elizabeth Lupo, become a Burgess, and a Judge.

#### ----THE BIG TRIP----

Joseph just couldn't help himself----he had FRONTIER FEVER. When he was 26, he and his next older brother, William, set out to visit the older brothers and find their own future and fortune. Their wanderlust may not have sat too well with their wives. William had 3 young children when they left and Joe had just married, Sarah<sup>3</sup>.

Joe looked like he was settling down----- in 1726 he <u>patented 400 acres</u> of land in St. Margaret's Parish in King William County<sup>4</sup>, VA, on the Polecat River adjacent his brother, **Timothy**, where his first son, **John**, was born in 1726, (named after great-grandfather, **John**). **William and Joe** with their families were still visiting brothers **Robert and Timothy** when son, **Joel**, was born in 1728(named after his oldest brother).

But Joe wasn't through sightseeing: when everyone was able to travel again, they headed west to Henrico County to see brother, John; and further west to see brother, Joell, in Goochland County(out of Henrico in 1728).. Joe bought 400 acres there1 in 1732 by Joell, who had an orchard and everything. Joell became a Burgess and Commissioner. Joe and Sarah named their third son, 1729, after his kindly, brother, William; daughter Nancy was born in 1732, son James in 1734, Elisha in 1736 and a namesake of his father, Joseph, II, in 1739.

#### ---THE LUNENBERG, VA. HOMESTEAD---

William and Joe made more exploratory trips to the frontier buying and selling land. Joe and William sold their other lands, packed up all their families and goods, again, and moved due south to Lunenburg County<sup>2</sup> which had just opened up for settlers on both sides of the Meherrin River about 1745. In 1746 Joe's sons, John, 19, Joel, 18, and William, 17, paid tithes with Joe in Lunenberg County; in 17493 William and Joe both bought large plats of land. Joe set in motion paperwork for a grant of 1,850 acres( 3 miles square), recorded with full title in 1760.

Finally, they settled down for good. Wild game, wild turkeys, fish were plentiful---tobacco grew well. Plenty of trees to fell and clear. The river flooded, and -- soggy ground does not a good garden make. Little Brother Joe did all right for himself—he was happy. He had a large homestead— to leave to his 6 boys who could help him with the clearing and farming...

Those boys were now 25-37 and already making forays out to the frontier when Joe died at 64. Joe actually sounds a bit miffed when he wrote his will. Only daughter Nancy who had married, Richard Burns, and 2 boys, Joel and William were still at home helping him farm his large plantation when he died. In his will, he gave away 1,050 acres: Nancy and Richard 350 acres where they lived, son, William, 350 acres where he lives, and Joel 350 acres where I live... He totally ignored 4 boys who had already moved away..

[NOTE: It took extensive researching before the other 4 were positively identified as sons of this Joseph.. Very significant that descendant's DNA is verifying them.]

# I. THE OLDEST SON OF JOSEPH, I -- JOHN CHANDLER ----LUNENBERG, VA, to GRANVILLE, NC, to FRANKLIN, GA----

I. JOHN CHANDLER: (JOE-RRJ). (26 Dec. 1727, King Wm County, VA-25 April 1800, Lunenberg, VA).

His often-moving father, Joseph, gave oldest son, John, ideas about the frontier. As a child, John lived in King William County, VA, near his grandfather's land. Later, his folks took him to Caroline County, VA, by his Uncle Robert, and Uncle Timothy; his teen years were spent in Goochland by his Uncle Joell.

He was 19 in 1745 when they moved 50 miles south into Lunenburg County, VA; he paid a tithe that year and was helping his parents with the tobacco crop. He soon found just the right girl, Elizabeth (Wells)<sup>1</sup>. They were married in 1748 when he was 21. They had about 8 children<sup>2</sup>:

- A. Richard Chandler. (1749-1782) Married, Elizabeth Carter.
- B. William Chandler. (1752-1780). Married, Lydia Wharton, Granville, NC.
- C. Joseph Chandler. (1755-1822). Married, Nancy Ann Turman, moved to Franklin, GA...
- D. Elizabeth Chandler. (1758- ).
- E. John Chandler, Jr. (1759-1838). Married, Mary. (About 14 children).

F-H: Zachariah (1753); King Solomon (1754); and Jeremiah (1757) who lived in the same area in GA where John was, may be his children. We need evidence and DNA!

In 1760 when he was 33 with a family of small children, **John** bought 292 acres by the Meherrin River (unknown if on his father's land, or on which of 3 sides of the river it was).

When his father, **Joseph**, only 64, died in 1764, leaving a short will in which most of his children were not even mentioned, **John**, the eldest, was named Executor by the Court. He made many land and personal property transactions; it took 3 years to settle.

He sold 192 acres of his own land; then, in 1768 John packed up his family, now 9 to 19 years old, moved across the border into Granville, NC, where he sold his final 100 acres of Lunenberg, VA, land.. John and Elizabeth celebrated their 25th wedding anniversary in 1773 starting over on a new frontier in a new state.

However, in 1778, after 10 years in NC, he packed everything and every one into a wagon, again, and moved **south 200 miles to Wilkes County, GA**, just formed out of Indian lands, where he bought 200 acres. They **retired to a grant of 500 acres 6 years later** in **new** Franklin County, GA³ celebrating their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary in 1798---- his children were 39 to 49 with places of their own. He died there 5 years later in 1803 at 77-------leaving no will, no list of his children.!!

#### -FLUVANNA, VA, To KANAWHA, WV---

I. A. RICHARD CHANDLER: (John, JOE, RRJ).(1749, Lunenberg, VA-1784, Fluvanna, VA).

He farmed in Goochland, moved one county, west, to Fluvanna (founded in 1777; he died at 33 in 1782. His will named 9 children and widow, Elizabeth, (on the census of 1782).

Sarah Smith Chandler 1770, Nancy 1773, Robert 1774, George 1776, Lucy 1777, Lavinia 1779//John R. Wood, Mary//Oliver Moore, Thomas 1781, Elizabeth.

- + Richard Carter Chandler 1772; he had 2 sons, R.C. Jr. and John Anthony Wayne Chandler, pioneers in Kanawha County, WV. J.A.W.C. had 7 sons who were there in the 1800's.
- + <u>John 1782//Frances Seay</u>. They had George P., John, Jr., Robert (whose daughter married, Eli J. Seay), and **Andrew Jackson Chandler w**ho married, **Marinda Smith**.

#### ----GEORGIA COUNTIES----

I. C. JOSEPH CHANDLER: (John, JOE, RRJ). (1755 Lunenberg, VA-1822, Bear Creek, Franklin, GA.)

This Joe grew up in Lunenberg, VA, on his father's tobacco farm. When he was 21 in 1776, he was serving in the Rev. War. After the war he joined his father at Bear Creek, Franklin County, GA(southernmost tip). He married, in 1773 at 18, Nancy Ann Turman.

In 1790 he sold a grant in Elbert County given for his Rev. War service. By 1803 he had a 700-acre plantation with 3 slaves. **Joe** was more than a farmer—he was civic minded. He became a **Justice of the Peace** (means he was literate) and a **County Judge**. Children: 10.

John 1778, Sarah 1783, Susannah 1788, Luvinia 1794;

- +Sterling (born, 1782, had 15 children; one son was named, Dudley J.
- +Robert 1785, married, then divorced, Jane Hobbs. His son Zachariah N, 1810. had 7 children; 5 died of pneumonia in one week, 1877, in Perry County, AL, to which they had moved.
  - +Green 1792, had a son, Sterling, also, born, 1820.

+William, 1793, married, Elizabeth Frances; won lottery land in 1833 in Coweta County, GA, 125 miles west on the border of MS. They were doing well, had a nice country home, until he died of a stroke in 1856 at 63, leaving Elizabeth a rich widow. Children: 8

William's sons, John and Clark, were in the CSA during the Civil War. Clark died; John returned home with a big black, plow horse, called, *JOE*. He took in Clark's children and helped his mother with his siblings and the farming<sup>1</sup>.

I. E. JOHN CHANDLER, Jr.<sup>2</sup> (John, JOE, RRJ).(20 June 1750<sup>3</sup>, Lunenberg, VA---1838, Coweta, GA).

John, Jr. grew up with his brother Joseph learning to grow tobacco on their father's farm. When he was 18, 1768, his father moved the family to Granville, NC, just across the state line. Instead John, Jr. and his brother, William, joined the Granville, NC, Militia. It was greatly needed because of Tories who came in and out, pillaging and killing settlers. (John, Jr. was granted land for his military service, but he sold it and joined his father in GA by 1790.)

In 1778 when John, Jr. was 28, his father loaded his family into wagons and went south 200 miles to Wilkes County, GA, where he received a grant in 1784 of 500 acres on Bear Creek, Franklin County, GA. In 1796 John bought 100 acres for \$100 adjacent his own land which was was adjacent to his brother Joseph, nephew Sterling(1782), his own son, Zachariah, and the Echols family. He paid taxes there for 32 years, 1798-1830, adding more land as available<sup>4</sup>.:

The name of his wife is unknown, but he had 15 children. Up to about 6 may have been born 1773-1780 in Granville, NC; 2 in Newberry, SC, 1781-3; about 7 born in Wilkes/ Franklin Counties, GA, 1785-97. In fact, we've only identified about 4 of his children: (Need 11 more.)

He married, Miss Smith; and 2d, Sarah Quillian. Children 8:

James Quillian, Nancy, <u>Bailey A.</u>, Anna, Daniel Philip, <u>Sampson Lane</u>, <u>Clemmons Q.</u>

. <u>Clemmons Q.</u>
Became a famous potter. He had a grandson, <u>George Neese</u>, born, 1849, Gilmer, GA, who had 12 children; his grandson, <u>Brue Chandler</u>, <u>III</u>, is President of St. Joseph Hospital in Atlanta. [NOTE: He gave a DNA sample (13–24—28) for Hezekiah's line which matches descendants of Joseph's son, William, but not the Branches.]

<u>Sampson Lane</u>. (1813). Had sons, <u>Hezekiah</u> (<u>born</u>, <u>1835</u>), <u>Clemmons Chaptin</u> and <u>John Wesley</u>(1833, Habersham, GA-1910, Eastoboga, Talladega, AL). He was a grain miller and a Baptist preacher; he served in CSA, Civil War, at a Instruction Camp in Talladega, AL..

Son, William Chappell, (1866) west to Itasca, Hill County, TX; son, Amos, 12 children there.

<u>Bailey A. Chandler.</u> (1816) must not be confused with the many Bailey's in the JOELL
Chandler Branch. Hezekiah's Bailey A. was a Lt. in Habersham County, GA. Militia, and lived in
Hall and Cherokee Counties, GA. 12 children including Rev. George T., and Gibson Clemmons.

I. E. 3. JOHN CHANDLER, III.(John, Jr., John, JOE, RRJ). (1793, Franklin, GA-1870 Lauder., AL).

He married, Rhoda Longmire Sandridge, about 1813. Children: 9.

Garrett S., Meriah, Nancy, Matilda, Mary Jane, Martin T., Luci, Lucretia.

+Bethel Green. Children 10; son, Samuel Jones, grandson, Rufus Charles, to TN.

[NOTE grandson, Leslie F's DNA sample DOES match the main Branches (15-23-31) and verifies this part of the line back to Robert 2.]

### ----FIRST CHANDLER to COWETA, GA: SONS-FIRST to HENDERSON, TX---

<u>I.E. 4. ZACHARIAH CHANDLER</u>. (John, Jr., John, JOE, RRJ)(1780, Granville, NC,-1836, Coweta, GA.)
Zach was only 10 when his family moved to GA. He was a bright young lad; he did leave a will, but did not name his wife(who was alive) or children or assign an executor.

He is first mentioned in 1798 tax records at 18 because he **owned** houses with outhouses on less than 2 acres. The year before **at 17**, **he had spotted and married**, **Sarah Echols**, his next door neighbor, **who was only 13 (died at 70, 1855)**. At the 1800 census he had 74 acres.

He stayed close to his relatives, bought several properties, won 490 acres in the Irwin County land lottery in 1820 adjacent himself. (Unknown if he sold it to a son or others).

He was an enterprising farmer who became a Justice of the Peace, performed marriages 1828-1830. When he drew land in the Coweta County land lottery, 1827, he moved there, was a tax collector in 1830, and bought up unwanted lottery land. His homestead farm was 202.5 acres at Newnan, with a store at his crossroads. He died, too young, at 56 in 1836; Sarah stayed on the farm raising the last two sons alone<sup>2</sup>: Alphonso and Hassell. Children 17: (4 died young).

Elizabeth (Md James Freeman³) Orpha 1800, (Md Anderson Nix), Naomi 1803 (Md George Nix), Jefferson T. 1804, David 1805, Martha 1809 (Md. James F.W. Freeman), James S. 1811, Nancy 1820(md, Lawrence B. Whitehorn, at 14, the only one who stayed in Coweta, GA)..

<sup>2</sup> Coweta Inferior Court: July, 1843, son-in-law, **Ruben reports Sarah Chandler** is showing signs of erratic old age; son-in-law, **Peter Lantern**, given Power of Attorney. He is not proven to be a son, but quite likely.

+JEMIMA O. CHANDLER: :(Zach, John, Jr., John, JOE, RRJ). (1807,GA) She married, Peter Lantern, who helped settle the family estate; they moved to Dallas County, AR, in 1845.

### -THE SHERIFF IS FELLED BY A NEEDLE-

+ <u>WILLIAM CHANDLER</u><sup>1</sup>,:(Zach, John, Jr., John, JOE, RRJ).(1814, Franklin, GA–1863, Union, AR). At 22 William and his 2d cousin, **Zachariah N.**<sup>2</sup> who grew up together, in GA, left for Perry, AL in 1835, looking for land and wives. He married, **Mary Philbert, 2d, Sarah M. Prime**<sup>3</sup>.

After 13 years in AL, William took his family 400 miles west to El Dorado, Union, AR, where he bought land and city lots. He built a 22-room hotel living in it as the Innkeeper. He was the acting sheriff during the Civil War. As a needed public sevant, he was inoculated with smallpox vaccine—which was contaminated, causing his death; several others died as well.

His daughter, Orline, married, Dr. William H. Goodwin; daughter, Martha Ann, married, Judge William C. Langford; boy-crazy, Fannie, was sent to her Uncle Alphonso 300 miles west of AR, where she promptly married, Henry T. Ellis.

Children 10

Son, Henry Lee, (1844-1908, Orange, CA) married, moved to **Orange County, CA**. Son, **Crawford C.**, (1837-1909), married, **Rebecca Janis Tatum**: 5 girls, 2 boys.

## ----TWO CHANDLERS to CHANDLER, TEXAS----

+<u>HASSELL S.CHANDLER</u>: ,:(Zach, John, Jr., John, JOE, RRJ). (1821-1885, Henderson, TX). The 2 youngest children, **Hassell and Alphonso**, trekked 750 miles west to Henderson County, TX, after they settled their mother's estate. **Hassell and Alphonso** were the **first white** settlers to Henderson, TX. He was a bugler in the Civil War. Children 10

+<u>ALPHONSO HENRY CHANDLER</u>. ,:(Zach, John, Jr., John, JOE, RRJ).(1826-1911, Chandler, Henderson, TX). He felt rich; with his inheritance money, he bought 500 acres at \$3.00 an acre. Some of his relatives worked for him; He joined the CSA, was in several battles, in LA.

When he got back home, everything was gone, except a few cattle. He had to start over: built a store which became the postoffice—it was destroyed by fire. He built a new, two-story, brick building. When a rumor started that the railroad was coming, he sold them land for a station which was named after him: Chandler, TX. Children 7.

His two sons, **John Zachariah**, **and Reuben House**, both died before their father did in 1909 and 1911, in Chandler and Graham, TX, **DNA sample needed for Hassel and Alphonso** !!!

[NOTE: It's abundantly clear that special attention must be given to age and location of the sons in these families because their names are commemorating relatives, whether near or far, dead or alive. As stated before, not very much has been published about the families of JOSEPH Chandler, I; ABC's yellow book, <u>8 John Chandlers</u>, Elisha and Zachariah, is a good resource for these families; <u>The Chandler Family Association Newsletter Genealogy Reports</u>, Vol. I, II, published by Sue Kirves, reprints all the early research findings found. ABC's <u>Discovering Chandler Lines</u>......... p. 123-9 covers **Joel and Shadrack**.

Pamela Gregory has diligently pursued her ancestor, William; he is easy to confuse with others.

## II. THE SECOND SON OF JOSEPH, I-JOEL CHANDLER

-----GOOCHLAND, VA----REV. WAR-GREENVILLE, SC.

II. JOEL CHANDLER. (JOE, RRJ). (1727, King William/Caroline, VA-1799, Greenville, SC?)

He was taken by his parents to Goochland where he grew up. In 1743 and 1745, when he was 16,18, and 21, he was listed as a tithe in his father's family in St. James' Parish.

But the following year he married a neighbor girl, Agnes, before they left with his parents and his **Uncle William** who were going south to Lunenberg County, VA. On the tithe list of 1751 and 1752 he was a married man with a son, **Joseph**, born in Goochland.

Joel bought 253 acres probably on the south side of the Meherrin River (which became Mecklenberg County). He inherited 460 acres from his father at his death in 1765. He sold both pieces of land about 1767 and took his growing family further south to Newberry, SC.

Just 9 years later when he was a father 11 times over, and the Rev. War was heating up near them, he enlisted in the SC Militia at age 49 with his 4 sons. They served to the end of the war, and it was a bloody fight. His oldest sons, Joseph and Obediah, were killed by the sword of Gen. Tarleton in May 1780 in front of Joel's eyes. Joel's horse was shot out from under him, making it a hand-to-hand battle, but they still fought until 1786 before they returned home.

After the Rev. War in Oct. 1784, Joel bought 400 acres from a cousin, Jesse Chandler, on Horse Creek Branch of the Reedy River, in newly minted Greenville County, SC, out of Indian land. He bought 400 for Shadrack in 1792, and 350 acres for himself. From then on, he was familiarly called, *Greenville*, Joel. In May 1799, the year he died, he sold 92 acres to son, John, and 92 to daughter Lucy//Mitchell. His will named 3 sons, and a Daughter Deed. Joel and his family were illiterate, but he knew how to buy and sell land. Agnes and John, settled the estate. Child. 11

Joseph 1749, Obediah 1753, <u>John 1755</u>, <u>Shadrack 1757</u>, <u>Milander 1760,//Moses Sullivant, Delilah 1764,//William Shipp, Marian 1766, //, 2d cousin, John Franklin Chandler, Lucy 1770,//Henry Mitchell, Susannah 1772, //James Webb, Rachel 1774,//William Fitts.</u>

The rapid opening of new lands, gave the children FRONTIER FEVER; they tried Robertson, TN, MS Terr., Logan, KY, DeKalb, GA, Bibb, Washington, Marengo, Dallas, AL, from 1795 on.

Timothy was the only one who knew how to write home.

II.A. -SHADRACK CHANDLER. (Joel, JOE, RRJ). (1757, VA-1840+, DeKalb, GA) He was 83+.

This Shadrack was a Mighty Man: 5' tall, 200 #, all muscle, and a strong patriotic mind. He lived in Newberry County, SC; during the Rev. War, he bought land on Horse Creek in 1787 from Jesse Chandler assigning his whole army paycheck to him to do it.

In 1792 he bought 398 acres from his father for 100#. After their father, died, his brother, John, bought Shadrack's 404-acre plantation in 1803 and sold him 200 acres in 1804. Then, Shadrack set out to satisfy his *frontier fever* in TN, KY, AL, settling in DeKalb, GA. In 1833 brother, John, signed his pension affidavit.

He married, **Lydia**, about 1782. After their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary, **Lydia** died(1838), **Shadrack** went to live with son, **Joel**. They had **John** 1783, **Obediah** 1785, **James** 1787, **Joel** 1789, **William** 1793, **Hollyberry** and 5 other daughters. Children: 12

#### ----GA to MO----

II. B. <u>JOEL CHANDLER.</u> (Shadrack, Joel, JOE, RRJ). (1789, Newberry, SC-1860, Cherokee, AL). He had a modest plantation, was in the War of 1812, chased Indian land, lived in DeKalb, GA by 1830, plus Gwinette, Henry, GA, Cherokee Counties, AL, and Dunklin County, MO..

He married, first, Rosey Gunnell, in Greenville, SC; 2d Nancy, 1829. Children: 14.

James Washington, 1814, William Jackson, Lewis Wilson, John Hampton, Joel Allen 1822? Nancy E., Clarissa 1827; Mary, Posey, Thomas Jefferson, David Franklin, Jessie Cleveland, Newton Jasper, and Josiah Marion, 1846.

### ---to HOT SPRINGS, AR----

II.B.1. JAMES WASHINGTON CHANDLER1. (Joel, Shadrack, Joel, JOE, RRJ). (1814, SC-1903, He married, Mary Ann (Polly) Kemp,(1821,GA-1896, AR) daughter of his cousin, Temperance Kemp/Camp( daughter of Shadrack's brother John<sup>2</sup>). Children: 11.

They moved to frontier lands in Izard, AR, in 1843 with Tempy's brother, Joel Chandler, bypassing AL.. At 50 he joined the CSA, as a Cpt., was wounded in the leg, crippled, but came home. They had a grant of 60 acres adjacent the 40 acres of Polly's mother, Tempy (md, Tapley Arnold Camp). In 1860, Tempy, was with them; James was a farmer there for 40 years+. After 4 of her children died before age 32, Polly became distracted, but she died at 70 in 1896.

Andrew Jackson 1844, Nancy E., Elizabeth A., Joel 1850, John Lewis, 1853,

Temperance C., Nancy A,. William Thomas& Benjamin McCullock(twins) and Martha J. 1862. -Andy Jackson Chandler served in CSA, 1860-1865; He married, Safrona, O. J. Pennington, 1863 who died in 1890(thrown from a horse). Children: 13 (3 sets of twins<sup>3</sup>).

---AR to TX----

II.B.1. a JOEL CHANDLER4 (James W, Joel, Shadrack, Joel, JOE, RRJ). (1850, Hot Springs, AR-1920, Flomont, Floyd, TX.). He married, first, Mary Margaret Clifft in AR(mother & 2 sisters lived with them). They had 13 children(7 died young). He married, 2d, Martha Clifft, his sister-in-law.

Joanna 1871, <u>John Benjamin 1873</u>, William V 1879, Zerelda, Daisy, Joe Eugene, 1889.

II.B.1.a.(1).JOHN BENJAMIN CHANDLER:.( Joel, James W., Joel, Shadrack, Joel, JOE, RRJ). (1873, Hot Springs, AR-1947, Hall, TX).

This John married, Katie Milton Craddick, in AR, where 9 children were born; took them to Bowie, TX ,in 1916. They almost had a triple wedding in 1933—Luther, John and Hugh; Luther was drafted into the US Navy, in World War II. John died in 1947; Katie in 1968. Children 10

Snow 1898, Joel Isom., Mary, Elmer, Bessie, Luther, John, Hugh, Lester, Katie E. 1921. [NOTE: CFA members from this family researching their family line, have collected many full dates, especially from James Washington's Bible. A DNA sample is needed.]

### ----MAKING AN IMPACT IN TN-

II. C. WILLIAM CHANDLER: (Shadrack, Joel, JOE, RRJ). (1793, DeKalb, GA-1877, Hancock, MS. This William, brother of Joel, was a traveling man. He was a born-again Christian, a farmer and hunter, he joined the TN Militia, in the War of 1812 under Gen(Pres). Andrew Jackson at Pensacola, FL, collected 160 acres bounty land in Lauderdale, MS, and 640 acres in Ashley, AR.

He (19) married, Mary Fitts (15), daughter of his cousin, Lucy//Fitts. They had 16 children, born in Robertson, and Giles, TN, Washington, AL, Choctaw, Ind. Terr., Lauderdale, MS. They kept the traveling wagon at the ready but 9 died young or were killed in Civil War. Emma, 1816, Martin, 1820, Temperance, 1824, Jane, 1825, Martha, 1827, Green Callier, 1829, Mary, 1831, and Rev. Leonard M. Chandler, 1841. Leonard was a Methodist Circuit Rider, died of malaria in MS swamps. Had 2 children: William H. and John P. Chandler.

II.C.1.GREEN CALLIER CHANDLER: (William, Shadrack, Joel, JOE, RRJ).,(1829, Washington, AL-1905, Washington, TN).

He was a, Col. in 8th MS infantry in Pensacola, FL, a learned and likable Christian gentleman, newsman, lawyer, an orator, congressman and Judge, District Attorney. Elected to the Legislature

It shows these families kept track of each other, even though we have trouble keeping up with them.

records. Posey's list, found in a coin purse, was published in Anne Long's Chandler Collections #10, p 17-7.

James Washington's Bible has many entries. See, descendants, Ada Lester, and June Everheart.

The controversy over whether his name was Joel or Joseph may have originated in a twin who died. <sup>5</sup> June Everheart has written a good manuscript of the family. Snowl/ Castleberry collected Bible

in 1854, he wrote MS laws(became a state) and re-wrote (for CSA), Post Civil War(for USA). He imported Jersey cows, moved to Johnson City, WA, TN, for better climate, where he practiced law with his son-in-law, William J. Exum. He married, Martha Glouvinia Croft, 1854. Child. 7.

Walter B., 1855, Mary, William Henry, Martha M., Dr. Greene Croft, Sarah, Cornelia Chandler ---Walter Bernard, died at 24 of typhoid after shooting at a politician harassing his father.

#### ----VIOLINIST, POETS, JUDGES, AND WRITERS----

II.C.1.a.WILLIAM HENRY CHANDLER: (Green C., William, Shadrack, Joel, JOE, RRJ). (1860 Clarke, MS-1934.Madison, TN).

This William couldn't quite make up his mind: He was a violinist, salesman, dentist, then saw the country without leaving home—as an IL Central Railroad Mail Clerk.

He married, Mary Knoxie Clifft, who died in AZ. She was talented too: had a green thumb, read Latin and English classics, made children's clothes, took the family to St. Luke's Episcopal church where she often volunteered. She must have been a pray-er, as well, for their 4 sons who served in WW I, returned safely. One son died of TB; one at birth.. Children: 9

Walter Clifft, William H., Jr., Knoxie, Hugh, Mary, Green Callier, II, Martha, Elizabeth.

II.C.1.a.1.WALTER CLIFFT CHANDLER<sup>1</sup>: (William H., Green C., William, Shadrack, Joel, JOE, RRJ).1887, Madison, TN–1967, Memphis, TN).

He was intelligent, artistic, a poet, collector of music and history-minded. He worked his way through college and law school, was Assistant Attorney General, Shelby, TN, Representative, a Senator, Memphis City Attorney, and Cpt. of Artillery Unit, WW I, 1917-1919 serving in the front lines. He was elected for 3 terms in Congress, 1935-1940, Mayor of Memphis, 1940-1946. At the same time he was Sunday School Sup't., Bible teacher, and law partner with his son, Wyeth. As Mayor, Walter, was Master of the Processional<sup>2</sup> down the city streets at the installation of the Fifth Episcopal Bishop, Rt. Rev. Edmund Pendleton Dandridge, 1947, in the new Cathedral.

He met the talented, beautiful, well-traveled, **Dorothy Wyeth**, daughter of an Army Surgeon. It was love at first sight: when she handed him a sandwich in the USO the day he went overseas in World War I, he proposed; they married when he returned. Children: **John W. and Lucia.** 

Walter wrote a book about his grandfather, grandson of Shadrack Chandler: <u>The Journal and Speeches of Greene Callier Chandler</u> (Memphis,TN:1953). It is very interesting showing **Greene's** changes in thinking in that messy time in our country.

Walter's son was, The Honorable, John Wyeth Chandler, served in the Marine Corps in the Korean War, Mayor of Memphis 1972 to 1982, Judge of TN Circuit Court, 1982++.

#### **GRANDSIRE JOHN AND RITA**

-SC--GA--AL-

II.D. JOHN CHANDLER (Joel, JOE, RRJ). (1755, Goochland, VA-1849, at 943, Benton/Calhoun, AL).

This son of **Greenville**, **Joel**, was illiterate but competent. He moved to Gwinette County, GA., where he received a very small pension for his militia service in both SC and GA during the Rev. War.. He bought a new piece of frontier land about every 3 to 7 years.

Since his two older brothers were killed in the Rev. War, John, the next oldest son, settled his father's estate with it's Daughter Deed---- a nightmare to do. His son, David, chose to remain on a piece of grandfather's land.

His obituary called him: One of the County's Great Citizens.

He married, **Rita** about 1782; they spent their 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary in Greenville, SC; their golden, plus 7, in Gwinette, GA.

Children 10.

Rita died in 1833;he gave son Joel a \$1000 loan for land in Benton, AL, and went to live with him in 1839. Before 1849 when he died, 11 in John's family died; then son, Joel/Ritta Bonds, took their 14 children (John's grandchildren) in a wagon train to AR 500 miles west.

His last 4 years were lonely ones.

John, Jr 1783-1854, Bailey 1785-1846, David 1788-1837, Ritta 1790-1851, Elizabeth 1792-1830, Luci 1794-1880, Frances 1796-1826, Joel 1800-1876, Narcissa 1804-1860, Temperance, 1805-1887. You will find 2 of them in GA; 5 of them in AL; 2 in AR; and David in SC.

## II.D.1.RITTA CHANDLER. (John, JOE, RRJ). (1790, SC-1851, Benton, AL).

She married, 1812, **James Taylor**. He signed her father's pension affidavit in GA. They moved to AL where she cared for her aging father. **James** administered her father, and brother **Bailey**'s estates. **James and Ritta and their 2 daughters**, **Tempy and Ritta Taylor**, were also ill and died. Their son-in-law **John A. Wallace**, made 6 coffins. Children: 3

<u>II.D.2-JAMES CHANDLER</u>.(John, JOE, RRJ). (1807Newberry, SC.-1853, Benton, AL). Had a heart attack while he was in the courthouse. Manuela, William T., <u>Martha Ann Malinda Permelia Conant Jane</u>, Willie Decatur Katley Eversilli Tennessee, Jasper, Mary, Eliza, John P., Martha, Millard and Monroe (called *Teen*).

Martha Ann Malinda Permelia Conant Jane Chandler: married, James Asbury Hall who had a heart attack plowing his fields. They had 8 children, including triplets..

Daughter, Lena Estella Hall, married, Worth Riley Garret, 1918. He was alcoholic; son James Louis Garrett. ordered him to leave the family. James joined the CCC, ending up in Klamath Falls, OR, in a gas station. He couldn't resist Violet's huckleberry pies. Children: 5

## II.D.3.JOHN CHANDLER, Jr. (John, JOE, RRJ).(1783, Newberry, SC-1854, Cherokee, AL).

He grew up on Horse Creek of Reedy River, Greenville, SC, living by many relatives and in-laws, when he married, Elizabeth Camp, ca 1806..

Settlers began creeping into Indian Lands pushing for new counties in 1813, but were not allowed to own land. GA opened 7 adjacent, NEW counties in 1818: Walton, Gwinette, Hall, Habersham, Irwin, Early, Appling; then, they had to count and decide what to do with the early settlers; those records help us find our people there.

John, Sr. bought land in Walton County, by 1820 with sons, Jr, Bailey and Joel, being witnesses. However, it was only 17 years later when these 4 moved again to Benton/Calhoun AL. The year, 1853/4, was a bad year: John, Sr, had just died; John, Jr. and James died, and brother Andrew J. had malarial chills and fever. Jr. wrote a letter about it to his sister, Minerva.

The widow, Elizabeth, lived for 22 years more, with various of her 12 children.

<u>James</u>, John, III<u>, Emory</u>, Minerva, Ervington, Chidley, Andrew Jackson, Mary, <u>Sarah, William Pinkney</u>, and Bailey Chandler.

NOTE: not a lot of information known.

<u>—SARAH ANN CHANDLER</u>.(1822, Walton, GA-??). She married, first cousin, **Daniel Chandler, son** of Uncle Bailey.

--WILLIAM PINKNEY CHANDLER. (1825, Walton, GA-1853++). Married, first cousin, Kyziah Chandler sister of Daniel, son of Uncle Bailey.

--EMORY CHANDLER. (1810, Newberry, SC- 1880+, Howard, AR) He planted cotton, a new profitable crop, in Benton, AL. The year his father and brother, James, died, he had 300# of cotton in the field in 1853 and called on his brothers to come help him pick it. But the area hosted malarial mosquitoes. They moved to Mine Creek, Hempstead, AR, before 1860. He married 4 times and had 10 children who lived to be married... John R., William J., Frances L., James E., Mary C, Thomas M., Ritta, Narcissa, Andrew Cap, and Henry Burton Chandler.

II.D.4.TEMPERANCE CHANDLER. (John, Joel, JOE,R,R,J). (1805, Greenville, SC.-1873, Saline, AR.)

She married, **Tapley Amold Camp**, 1826, SC. They moved to Benton, AL, to Izard, AR, Hot Springs, Saline, AR, where they bought 40 acres. He died, 1852, AR.

During the Civil War, she hid her brother **Joel** in her home from the bushwhackers after they killed his wife **Rita**. Children: **Mary Ann**, **Tapley**, and **Caroline**.

Mary Ann (Polly) Camp. (1826, Gwinette, GA-1896, Hot Springs, Saline, AR).

She married, James Washington Chandler, her 2d cousin, son of Joel and Rosey Gunnell (Sister of David's wife, Susan), grandson of Shadrack, brother of her grandfather, John Chandler, Sr. James bought 60 acres adjacent Tempy, helped her with the farming, etc.

In 1850 Polly had postpartum depression, but recovered

Children: 11 (3 sets tw). See p 9

II.D.5. BAILEY CHANDLER. (John, Sr., Joel, JOE, RRJ) (1785, Newberry, SC-1846, Benton, AL.).

This Bailey, son of John, Sr., and uncle to his brother John, Jr's children, died 4 years before his father did; he was very ill while trying to settle his father's estate.

His widow, Mary Ford, and the children chose James Taylor, husband of Bailey's sister, Ritta, to finish the estate, but he died also. That was not the only problem: the intertwining marriages were tricky, as was a law suit that went to the Supreme Court. Children 9

James (d 1847), William A.(to TX), <u>Steven</u>, Milton, Ritta, <u>Daniel</u>, Elizabeth, David G., <u>Kyziah</u>. DANIEL and KYZIAH married children of Uncle John, Jr.

Son, <u>William M. Reeves</u>, married, <u>Margaret Bonds</u>, sister of Norvel A. Bonds who married, <u>William's sister</u>, <u>Mary F. Reeves</u>. They took care of <u>Elizabeth Camp Chandler</u>, widow of <u>Narcissa's brother</u>, <u>John Jr. during part of her long widowhood</u>.

Daughter, Tilda (Matilda) Permealie (Permelia) Reaves, married, Joel Chandler, Jr., cousin.

II.D.7. <u>DAVID CHANDLER</u><sup>2</sup>. (John, Sr., Joel, JOE, RRJ) (1788, Newberry, SC.–1839, Greenville, SC This David, brother of Bailey, was the one who insisted on staying on land his father bought wher

settling his grandfather **Joel**'s estate on Horse Creek, Reedy River, Greenville, SC..

He married, first cousin, Susan Gunnell<sup>3</sup>, in 1810; they celebrated their 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary but David died soon after and Susan was left alone to plan 8 weddings. Children 9

Rachel, Elizabeth, Benjamin Harrison, Nicholas, Ira, Malinda and Rosa.

RACHEL CHANDLER. (1806,-1894,. Married, Obediah Owens. Children 9
NICHOLAS CHANDLER. (1816-1880+). He and sister, Rosa, named after Gunnell grandparents. Sons, John A., William R., James E. and 6 daughters.

IRA CHANDLER. (1819-1861)<sup>4</sup>. Ira, married, Anna. Their 4 sons including, Rev. William Beverly Chandler, and a son-in-law served in the Civil War and were killed, leaving 5 bereft widows.

<u>Ira's son, David Pinkney</u>, and his sister **Ann** were shipped out to **Elijah Clark's** house in 1860, but **David** enlisted anyway and was wounded giving him a permanent limp. That left **David** and his mother with 5 sisters to care for—*imagine the mother's grief!*.

David limped out to do the farming, trained as a surveyor, was hired to survey the rail bed to complete the first Railroad Line from Lynchburg, VA, to Augusta, GA, giving GA mountains-to-gulf port access. He surveyed the line, laid it out, built, inspected, and walked it from Augusta to Terminus (became Atlanta) to keep his knee limbered up, was a conductor, bought stock in it.

He married, Permelia Caroline Fowler. Four descendants followed David's footsteps into engineering; Joel Ira, grandson, Joel Ira, Jr., Joseph Luck, Robert Lee. David was famous for his work. Negroes who worked for him took the surname, Chandler, as a sign of their respect.

# III. The Third son of Joseph: WILLIAM CHANDLER —LUNENBURG, VA to SURREY, NC—

III. WILLIAM CHANDLER1. (JOE, RRJ). (1729, Caroline, VA-1795, Stokes, NC).

The third son of **Joseph**, grew up on the move, was 20 in 1749 when the whole family moved to Lunenburg and paid tithes with his folks in Goochland, VA, 1750. He was entrusted with being an overseer to his father in managing his large estate on both sides of the Meherrin River.

In 1752 he married his neighbor's widowed daughter, **Delitia Cox Dobbins<sup>2</sup>**. They lived on her 400 acres as the widow of **William Dobbins**, until son, **Edward**, became of age. Both of their fathers died in 1764; his father left him his last 400 acres. **William** may have served in Rev. War.

In 1779 when William was 50, they sold out and moved across the border into Surry, NC, where they soon appear on tax lists. He bought land in the eastern section by 3 of their children which became Stokes County in 1789. Son, Richard, stayed with his father until he died, 1795. In 1786, William had 3 sons and 2 girls <sup>3</sup>:[NOTE: 8 DNA donors show 13–23—29 pattern ?1].

Daniel, David, William, Jr., Keziah, Richard, Rebecca

III.A DAVID Chandler. (William, JOE, RRJ) (1755. Lunenburg, VA-1822+,Stokes, NC). He paid tithes, witnessed deeds, paid taxes, lay out a road in 1799. He married, Elizabeth, ca 1776, in Surrey, NC. Had 2 sons and 3 daughters + in 1786. David, Joseph, Fannie, Ellender, Lucy, etc.

III.A.1- David, Jr. He married, Hannah, 1796. They moved west to Washington, TN. They were 75 on 45th anniversary in 1850; they had 6 girls and 2 boys<sup>4</sup>.

--Nancy, Jane, Carrie, Elizabeth, Pheobe, Sarah, Zachariah, Elkannah.

Ill.A.1.a. Zachariah married, Malinda E. Milburn. He had a Wayside Inn along the 100 mile Buncombe Turnpike. Continued in TN through 1920. Children: 9

-- George Washington. Married, Nancy Jane Hammett, 5 children. James Wm. He married

III.C., WILLIAM Chandler, Jr. (William, JOE, RRJ). (1757, Lunenburg, VA-1850+) He lived with his Uncle John Cox from 1773 to 1778, 16 to 21, and was his overseer for him after Daniel.. He built roads, bought land, was a witness for his father in 1782. Unknown wife: 1 son and 5 girls in 1786.

Catherine, Gabriel, James, III, Nancy, Rhoda and Wilson.)

III.C. 1. Son, Richard Chandler, (1778, Lunenburg, VA -1850+ Surrey, NC.), He paid taxes in 1797, Wilkes, NC; married, Charity Parks, 1789-97, bought land in 1813 in Wilkes, NC. They had 1 daughter and 6 sons when they sold it from Franklin, GA, (with Charity's release), which was 150 miles south, on Bear Creek, near his cousins, John Chandler, Jr, and Joseph who married, Nancy Ann Turman. Had 4 sons in GA, bought 950 acres there, was a road commissioner, church deacon. Children: 10.

Matilda, Rev. Parks, (Daniel), Ambrose, Lindsey1, (Elza), Major Lewis, Francis Marion, Ira Griffith.

III.C.1.a.Daniel married, Rhoda Langston: 7 boys: Jesse, John C, Isaac, Dan W, Wm Harris, +3. III.C.1.b.Ambrose bought 220 acres from his father,in Carroll, GA, too, married, Jerusha White, had 10 children: Hiram Bennett, Martin F, Marion R, Wm J. Daniel and 4 girls.

III.C.1.c.Lindsey, was a miller, he married, Matilda Sewell, moved to Carroll County. Had 8 children. (Never drank liquor or coffee, nor chewed tobacco.) Asa, Clark, Tom, Newman, and 4 girls.

III.C.1.d.Elza, went to Carroll, GA, bought land, paid taxes; married, Elizabeth Johnson, 10 children John P., Wm J, Fr. Marion, Charity E., Coleman Lindsey, Mary, Sarah, Martha, Elizabeth. [Need DNA] III.C.1.e. Francis Marion, born in GA, married, Elizabeth Fennell, raised 3 of his brothers' children: Thomas B.(Parks only child), Matilda, and Coleman Lindsey. .

III.C.1.f. Ira G. moved to Talledega, AL(3d cousins, James and Mordecai Chandler, there) He married, Martha J. Peters: 8 children: Wm.P. James J. Fr. Marion, A. Jackson, Riley W., Sarah. [Need DNA] Ill. C.1.g. Major Lewis. He married, Malinda Sewell: 6 Child: Greenberry F., Wm. Martin, John Smith,, Levi Lindsey, and Elizabeth. III. D. . RICHARD Chandler. (William, JOE, RRJ). (1760, Lunenburg, VA-1810+). This was the only son staying with his father. He bought 200 acres in 1797 in Stokes, NC, served on a jury, Feb.1800 he sold it to go to Patrick County, VA, where he was granted 634 acres. Before he accepted the grant, he gave 740 acres, 2 Negroes a horse, 6 cattle, to daughter, Louisa, during her mother's lifetime, then, to be equally divided among Louisa and brothers2.

He married, Sarah, circa by 1790. Daughter, Louisa Rann Chandler, and 3 sons in 1800; son, William (1788-1815), married, Polly Harris, moved to Patrick, VA, then to Giles/Monroe, WV, in 1810 and back again. Their son, Thompson, 1811-1877), married Margaret Smith<sup>3</sup>; both died in WV. Thompson, Moses and Greenberry were the only Chandlers there in 1850. Children: 114

Marion, Nancy E., Priscilla, William Thompson, Luci, Ransom Kiles, Alderson, LuAnne, Sylvester, Rev. Preston Snidow, Miles H. Chandler. ---TO BE CONTINUED----

**Chandler DNA Project** 

This project seeks to identify all family lines of Chandlers worldwide and the relationships among them, if any. Because "Chandler" is occupational in origin, we assume there are many independent lines. But, one key goal is to connect corresponding branches in England, the Americas and other former British colonies.

## Early Chandler Immigrants<sup>1</sup>

John Chandler of Jamestown, Virginia

The earliest known Chandler to settle in the Americas was immigrant JOHN CHANDLER who landed at Jamestown on Sunday, June 10, 1610. He traveled aboard the 30-ton *Hercules* among about 30 settlers plus crew, smallest of three ships in the expedition led by Sir Thomas West of Hampshire, Lord Delaware.

Fragmentary land records in Elizabeth City County (now City of Hampton) make it virtually certain John's older son and heir was JOHN II, but this male line ended with JOHN IV in 1728.

Living descendants of ROBERT, whom good circumstantial evidence indicates is a younger son of immigrant John, number in the thousands, mostly in the South and near Southwest United States.

Immigrant John may have had a brother named NICHOLAS who remained in England or settled in the West Indies. A search for him and possible descendants is in progress, as is an intense search to identify immigrant John's English home.

Edmund Chandler of Duxbury (Massachusetts)

EDMUND CHANDLER settled in Duxbury by 1633 and died there in 1662. He had gone with the "Pilgrim" Separatists to Leiden and probably arrived in the Plymouth Colony around 1630. His origins are unknown.

Roger Chandler of Duxbury and/or Concord (Massachusetts)

ROGER CHANDLER was another early settler in Duxbury with a history similar to Edmund's. It is not known whether Roger left any family, but there was also a ROGER CHANDLER in Concord, Massachusetts, and many people believe there is a connection between the two. There may also have been a connection between Roger and Edmund.

William Chandler of Roxbury (Massachusetts)

WILLIAM and ANNIS CHANDLER settled in Roxbury, Massachusetts in 1637. William died in 1641, but left a numerous progeny who soon dispersed to other parts of Massachusetts and Connecticut. They emigrated from Bishops Stortford in Hertfordshire, where Chandlers have been traced back to at least 1521.

Chandlers of Pennsylvania and Delaware

GEORGE CHANDLER emigrated from Wiltshire in 1686, but died during the voyage. His widow JANE and seven or eight children settled in the part of Pennsylvania that later became New Castle County, Delaware. He was a Chandler from Wilcot Parish in Wiltshire, a family traced back to at least 1524.

John Chandler (d. 1735) of Charles County, Maryland

This JOHN CHANDLER first appears c1710 at/near Port Tobacco, where he acquired several tracts of land in the next 20 years. JOB CHANDLER (1623-1660) patented about 1200A in and around Port Tobacco 1651-1660, but he cannot be the ancestor of this John as some have claimed. Richard, one of Job's two sons, died without issue. Job's other son William had only two sons (Richard and William), both of whom died unmarried and without issue. This John may be collateral kin to Job. He was likely born by 1685 and died between January 17 (will date) and 19 (probate date), 1735, leaving his widow ANN, daughter of William Penn (not the Pennsylvania Quaker) and children JOHN, WILLIAM, STEPHEN, ANN, MARY, and SARAH.

John Chandler (d. 1728/9) of Accomack County, Virginia

This JOHN CHANDLER surfaces in 1669 and he and his wife MARGARET were paid for being witnesses in a court case on August 6, 1670. One or both appear in numerous Accomack records until John's death between January 23 (will date) and March 4, 1728/9 (probate date). The will did not mention a widow, but named children HATHAN FETTAPLACE, SOLOMON, BRIDGETT, ABIGAIL and son-in-law William Phillips. John's birth date was 1648 or thereabout.

An apparent son, JOHN, predeceased his father in 1728, leaving a short will dated June 1 and probated September 3, 1728 leaving his entire estate to his wife "until this crop is finished," then 1/3 to wife and remainder to be "divided among my children," none named. Joanna Chandler presented the will and was named executrix, so she was almost certainly the widow.

Reverend Isaac Chanler of Ashely River, South Carolina

REVEREND ISAAC CHANLER is said by some to have been born at Bristol, England in 1700, while others (including a family biographer) suggest a somewhat earlier birth date at an unknown place. He was a minister on Ashely River near Charleston, SC, from about 1733 until his death in 1749. He left a long and interesting will dated May 20, 1749. His son ISAAC took his medical degree at the University of Edinburgh before returning to the state where he was among the founders of what became the Medical University of South Carolina. The surname is consistently spelled "CHANLER" in recent times, but consistent spelling is not to be expected before the 19th century.

**How The Project Works** 

For an introduction to the field of DNA-assisted genealogy, visit Chris Pomery's DNA web page. For readers wanting the shortest possible description, here it is: the DNA test measures the lengths of certain specific sequences on the Y chromosome. By comparing these lengths for different test subjects, we can deduce approximately how closely the testees are related.

These sequences are not found within genes and have no known genetic function. So, the test cannot reveal physical characteristics or innate tendencies. The reason it works for genealogical purposes is that the observed changes in sequence length are neither harmful nor helpful; they simply happen now and then, and they persist because the body doesn't notice the difference. These persistent-yet-changeable variations are the markers that allow us to tell families apart.

We have arranged with FamilyTree DNA (FTDNA) to offer a reduced, group rate of \$169 (plus shipping) per 25-locus DNA test to members of our project. Similar discounts apply to the 12- and 37-locus tests. The test kit is very simple and comes in the mail with complete instructions: basically, it contains two little swabs to be rubbed on the inside of the mouth to collect some loose cells. Each swab is then popped into a container and mailed back to the lab. The kit comes with an optional release form that requests FTDNA to give your email address to any present or future FTDNA testee who matches you closely on the DNA test. If you decide not to sign the release form, or forget to send it in, your privacy will be protected, and FTDNA will not notify you or anyone else about matches with your DNA. There is also a space on the form for you to write down the country of origin of your immigrant ancestor — this item is optional and has no immediate bearing on this project because we are comparing individuals, rather than countries.

**Searching for Matches** 

One of the test results in our tables came from outside the project. hnt76 is a Chandler who tested privately with FTDNA and uploaded his results to an online database, but never joined our project. Because he made his results available, however, we are able to include them here. They can also be seen in the Y-SEARCH

datebase. Y-SEARCH specifically provides for searching by surname in addition to searching for matching haplotypes. (As of June 2005, there were 30 Chandlers listed in Y-SEARCH). We urge members of our project to upload their results to Y-SEARCH, particularly those who do not yet have a match within the project.

Another online database has been provided by the Sorenson Molecular Genealogy Foundation (SMGF). Each sample in the database is accompanied by a pedigree of at least four generations. Names and dates of post-1900 persons are blanked out in these pedigrees, but the surname of the test subject can almost always be determined by tracing the male line. Athough the normal lookup procedure is only by haplotype and is rather tedious, we have an index of direct links to the search results for all haplotypes in our project, including the necessary translations of markers that are counted differently by different testing labs. As of June 2005, there were two Chandlers listed as being in this database, but we have not yet located them. All participants are requested to use our search index to examine the list of DNA matches at SMGF -- one of those mysterious Chandlers in the database may be your close kin!
