



Chaplin

CHAPLIN COAT OF ARMS
Burks Peerage.

Granted 1593 to the Chaplins of Stoneham, Hauts County and of London, England.

Arms: Ermine, on a chief indented azure, three griffins' heads, erased (torn off, not "Grouped" or cut off), or (gold).

Crest: A griffin's head erased argent (silver), ducally gorged or.

The symbolism is as follows: Ermine and a chief mean dignity and authority; a griffin is the emblem of vigilance; azure or blue means loyalty; argent, sincerity; and or (gold), generosity and elevation of mind.

In 1678, a Chaplin was Lord Mayor of London and he used these arms but without the crest.

There are Chaplins at Weston, Northampton and at Blankney, Lincoln, England, and they also use these arms. In Scotland, the name is spelled Chaplen.

Lower's "Surnames" says: Chaplin is from the Latin Cappellanus, meaning a Chaplain, one in charge of the king's chapel.

Variations of the name are: Chapelin, Chapelein, Capelyn and Capelin

An Albert Chapelain was a tenant in chief about 1066 and is mentioned in Domesday Book.

An Abraham Chaplin of Virginia was a captain in the Revolution, 1777-1781.

There is much data of the Chaplins of Maine, Vermont, Mass, New Hampshire and other New England and Middle Atlantic States, but no data of the Southern Branch.
