

This is the last will and Testament of me, Thomas Chaplin, the Elder of Ladies Island in the Parish of St Helena and State of South Carolina, Planter. It is my desire that all of my just debts be paid and discharged out of my Estate as soon as after my decease.

I devise bequeath and confirm to my son John F. Chaplin my plantation or tract of land on Ladies Island called the Brickyard containing Six hundred and fifty acres which I have heretofore conveyed to him by deed - to him and his heirs forever reserving nevertheless the free uninterrupted and exclusive use of the dwelling house thereon situate and all necessary outbuildings thereto appertaining to my son Hamilton Chaplin during the term of his natural life. I give devise and bequeath my stock of Cattle on the said plantation called the Brickyard to be divided share and share alike among my children who may survive me and the lineal descendants of such as may have died, such lineal descendants taking among them the share to which their respective ancestors would have been entitled.

I also give devise and bequeath to my son John F. Chaplin my plantation or tract of land situate in the Parish of Prince Williams near Gardens corner containing about four hundred and twenty four acres together with my household furniture my stock of cattle on the said plantation and all the rest and residue of my personal property not herein disposed of together with the following

negro slaves and the future issue and increase of the
females, viz: Bitcome, Beck, Hagar, Sack, Jimmy Sillah
Beck, Jack, Linas, Tom, Kit, Bob, Phoebe, Bacchus Mi-
ly, Mosis, Herah, Old Peter, Dore Sue, Mike, Eleanor, Nancy
Eley, Bacchus, Daphny, Carolina, Lucy, Maria, Jimmy
Bella, Jacob, Will, Isaac, Mosis, Israel, Pat, Kit, Peg, Amy
Milly, Rose, Felix, Old Rose, Selvia, Nanny, Mingo, Thomas
Tony, Jerry, Moll, Toney, Peter Cupid, Frank, Pat,
Mary, Rose, Phillis and Clarissa In Trust never-
-theless to and for the several uses intents and purposes
hereinafter declared of and concerning the same
that is to say to apply the rents issues and profits of the
aforesaid Estate settled in Trust, or so much thereof
as he may deem amply sufficient for that purpose,
to the maintenance and use of my son Hamilton
Chaplin for and during the term of his natural life
paying to him One hundred dollars annually to
be used at his own discretion and if there remain
any surplus then in Trust to pay over the same an-
-nually in equal proportion among the children
of my son John F. Chaplin and of my daughter
Isabel Jenkins who shall be then living, share and
share alike each child taking an equal share
and not taking among them the share to which
their several ancestors respectively would have been
entitled - and from and immediately after the
death of my said son Hamilton Chaplin in Trust
and make partition and conveyance of my plan-
tation near Gardens former before mentioned
constituting a portion of the Trust together with all
other portions of the said Estate exclusive of the

negro slaves to himself, my son John F. Chaplin and my daughter Isabel Jenkins or in case of their death to their right Heirs and legal representatives. Then in Trust to divide and deliver the said negro slaves hereinbefore named together with the future issue and increase of the females among the children of my son John F. Chaplin and my daughter Isabel Jenkins who shall then be living share and share alike each child taking an equal share and not taking among them the share to which their lineal ancestors respectively would have been entitled. I hereby nominate and appoint my son John F. Chaplin my Executor and in case of his death my son in law Perry Fripp and Edward Fripp Executors and Trustees in his stead.

In witness whereof I, the said Thomas Chaplin have hereunto set my hand and seal this thirteenth day of May in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and thirty five and the fifty ninth year of American Independence —
