Note From St. Helena's Church Records - Beaufort Library

Baptisms - Christiana Bowman Fickling b 24 July 1834 baptized March 17, 1836, daughter of Joseph and Eliza B. Fickling.

yes Eliza B. Fickling could have been the daughter of Thomas 2nd ANN (BEZCK) Fickling, Bowman

St. Helena Records -

Joseph Fickling (died or buried) Dec. 25, 1838, Beaufort, S.C.

Joseph and Eliza B. Fickling had two more children mentioned in St. H. Rec Benjamin Fickling b (1827) and William Fickling (b 24 Mar. 1823).

I did not copy many of the St. Helena Parish Records only a few I was interested in. In case you do not know, these records are kept in the vault, TW, The Beaufort Co. Lib. Bft.

George Adams, brother of ANN Adams Bowman, married Mary ANN M2pes. Their daughter Georgiana Adams married Samuel Gilmore Courtney, son of W^m Ashmead Courtney who was Mayor of Chas. in 1881.

Note. The Adams and Bowman data was copied from The S.C. H.M. V. 23 NO. 1; JAN, 1922. The records were copied and arranged for printing by Jos. W. Barnwell and Mabel L. Webber. All were the records of the 1700's. I saw books by Miss Webber in the Chas. Library (Old Citadel Square) did not have time to check them but did find the marriage of Henry TzEBird, Jr to Catherine Bowman, later found that Catherine was wid. of Thos. Bowman, Jr through will of Thos. Bowman.

I have found that wills are not much help unless or you untie: you have other data first.

If you have not checked Miss Webbers work it might pay to do so as I remember there were only two small books.

I was checking Tabbird family data and Jenkins connections mainly due to time limit
Baptisms. Christiana Bowman Fickering dz of Joseph and Eliza B. Fickering
born July 24, 1834 bapt. Mar. 17, 1836.

Burials Joseph Fickering died Dec. 25, 1838, Beaufort

Note Have marriage data Re Jas. Fickering + Rosa Matilda Rhodes so probably
there is a record of marriage for Joseph. Have Mrs Christina Bowman
confirmed May 5, 1835

The list of "Earliest Settlers" in the Town of Beaufort shows

Thomas Bowman lot 125 - Oct. 5, 1749

Sarah Evelyn Crawford Apr. 29, 1774 Lot 205 - Lot 206

Note Mr. Bowman mentioned the coat of Arms of Evelyn and
Crawford as being in the family Bible, but did not mention the
name of the family. He also spelled the name "Evelyn" and

"Evyryn". Admiral Byrd, Richard Evelyn (1888-1957) has the same
spelling as the Coat of Arms shows, so that is probably the correct spelling

Sarah Evelyn Crawford, owner of Lots 205 + 206 was (free)
evidently rebt'd 200

Henry TEEBIRD to ANN Bowman, Deeds March 1, 1770, Release
March 2, 1770, Indenture between Henry TEEBIRD of Parish St. Helena
in Grandville County, S.C. and ANN Bowman, widow of said Parish
etc. Land situated in Town of Bft., Lot #126, which was orig. Meey,
8/2/1757
granted to Henry TEEBIRD, the boundaries show that to the North was
Lot #125 granted to Thomas Bowman in Oct. 5, 1747.

SCHM Vol 28 No 1, Jan. 1922 p. 21. Bowman, Thomas Sr. Deported this etc
9 Jan + Bur 11th, 1773 aged 65. The Thos. and ANN Bowman referred
to above must have been the parents of Thomas Bowman who died
N 1773.

Note. On page two "Cousin Charlie" mentions that "Uncle Clark"
held some position in Beaufort, he also mentioned ^{in a letter} that
he was related to the Blacks and thanked Mrs. J. for sending
him some data on that family. see family outline. I copied
the following from "Death Notices in The South Carolina Gazette
1732-1775" compiled & Edited by A.S. SALLEY, Jr. p 34.
"Last Tuesday died here, after a short illness, Richard Black, Esq.
Collector of His Majesty's Customs at Beaufort in this
province, - a gentleman who was deservedly much esteemed
& is now much regretted. (Monday, Aug. 11, 1766).
We had a collector of the port in Bft. up to the 1912⁵ at
least, the "Custom House" was where Calhoun Thomas has
his office on Bay Street. "Uncle Clark" may have held this position
before or after Richard Black.

Bowman - Clark - Connection

A year or so ago Tom found among some papers which had belonged to Hayward, Sr., some old letters from Mr. Charles Alexander Bowman, of Newberry, S.C. dtd. 1914-1916 to Mrs. Jenkins and signed "Cousin Charlie". He was asking her about Bowman records. In 1914 the old St. Helena Church Records had been returned to the church in Bft. Miss Mabel Runnett was the Librarian of the ^{Library} ~~Beaufort~~ at that time and she asked Mrs. Jenkins to make a copy for the library, which she did. The enclosed form will give you the family outline, he evidently did not have too much family data. I will give you a few quotations from his letter which might be of help. He mentioned that his grandmother Bowman, nee Ann Adams, had a Bible which had been destroyed by fire. It dated back to 1710. He apparently had seen it but did not remember too much about it. "Pasted to the inside cover drawn in ink was, The "Armorize Bearings or coat of arms" of Evelyn and Crawford". Among the records was an account of an Aunt who was Matron of a hospital at Wraggs Plantation during the Revolution. She died, and was buried at St. Michael's Church, an Uncle who was killed at the battle of Stone and another wounded at the battle of Monks Coton. He gave no names as he could not remember whether they were Clark or Adams. He did recall seeing the name Balleomy. He goes on to say that Mrs. James Armstrong, Jimmie Armstrong's widow, of Bamberg, S.C. has the Adams Bible but he did not know how far back it dates. Not much help at present. I recently checked Mrs. Jenkins address book and she had Mrs. M. B. Armstrong (Cousin Jimmie's widow). I tried to find out something re the Bowmans & Armstrongs through a friend who used to live in Newberry but got nowhere. Through a genealogist I was given the name of "Cousin Charles" grand son

T. Roy Summer 1204 Main St Newbury, I wrote immediately and he promised to send me what data he had: that was in 1964 - no answer as yet.

Mr. Chas. A. Bowman did not know the names of his gr-grand parents. Other than his great-grand-mother married and a Capt. Bythwood. Bowman children were - Charles Alexander Bowman who married Ann Adams one daughter man w^m Elliott one a Fickling and one the master children of Charles A. and Ann Adams Bowman were - Bythwood Bowman and George A Bowman (father of "Cousin Charrie") He did NOT mention mothers ^{NAME}

The Adams connection is really what I am most interested in. George Adams (b. d) married Mary Ann Mapes their daughter Georgina married Samuel German Courtney, son of Edward Courtney. (that explains Mrs. Jenkins relationship with the Courtneys.

Ann Adams, sister of George, mar. 1825 Charles Alexander Bowman, Grandparents of "Cousin Charrie". Mrs. Jenkins had asked him who was "Aunt Adams", and was told that she was the wife of George Adams. He went on to say that he ^{had} often heard his grandmother Bowman speak of "Uncle Clark" who she said represented the English Government as Port Master or some similar position in Beaufort. He did NOT know, however, if he was related through the Adams' or through the distaff side of the family. In one of the letters he reminded Mrs. Jenkins that she had mentioned that Gov. Doreen Clinch

Heyward told her that one of the plantations which he had inherited from his father had once belonged to Charles A. Bowman.

Note Gov. Heyward owned White Hall plantation Green Pond. I believe he lived there, Mr. Chas. Lawrence of N.Y later owned it. c2 1830's

Did NOT mention name of Plant.
