Dear Rev. Dr. Robert Peoples,
Many thanks for your letter - it was "newsy" - my wife,
Euna, + I enjoyed it.

I welcome all comments, suggestions on my genealogical information.

I used the marriage date of J. Martin Cope and wife #1 Mary M.
Burnap 2/27/1831 for his second marriage. My records show
that J. Martin + Wif #2 were married in March 1877. I do not
know the date. I am correcting my Ancestral Chart.

I appreciate the invitation to join the Society of First
Families of South Carolina. I will proceed as you suggested.

I have been disappointed that I have not found Johannes
Cope on immigration lists about the period of 1756.

Have you heard of definite proof of time of his arrival other
than 1756?

I found a Johannes Kopp of Niederberbach that left for
Carolina in 1738. I found him in 3 places - an
immigration list; Don Yoder's book "Pennsylvania German
Immigrants 1709 - 1786"; and a book "18th Century Emigrants
Vol II, the Western Palatinate" by Annette Kunzelman Burgoft.
Annette shows him of Niederbetschbach leaving for Carolina
in 1738. That part sounds good but if he was born in
about 1730 - I would not think that an 8 year old boy
would travel alone to Carolina. Then what was he doing until
the 1756 land grant?

I have a memorial to Johannes Copeside on Turkey Hill Swamp, Berkeley County Feb. 25, 1768. I have heard of a report that Johannes 1756 land grant was recorded as Johannes Copeside. I do not have an idea about Johannes Copeside — how this may fit in !!

I have a copy of the Wannamaker, Salley, Mackay & Bellinger Families, Genealogies & memoirs compiled by T. Scottow Wannamaker, St. Matthews, S. C., published 1937. The Bellinger family is the first family in the book — through page 19. I copied those pages for you & enclose herewith. Also I copied pages 421, 422, 423 which list all Bellingers names. There are 485 pages in the book. I hope this information will be helpful. It is interesting to hear reports which have not been verified.

Another report — Johannes Americanized his name to "John" — this is supposed to be a reason we don't find Johannes !!

P. S. I have a picture of, sincerely,
six men and I have been Herald Cope
unable to identify them. The picture was taken in Charleston.
On the event that you have ideas on their identity please
spare. It's a poor photo. My mother owned the photo. I
enclose a copy.

Also is a picture of Jacob Martin Cope, my grandfather.
You may keep both pictures. I have other copies.
