I am in receipt of your letter dated May 24, 1985, regarding documentation of the ownership of Fish Hall Plantation.

My cousin, Eleanor Kaarr Strain (Mrs. Miss. B. Strain), of Savannah, has told me that she is sending copies of the Wills of Samuel Green (father of Sarah Green who m^r. Captain William Pope as his 1st wife) and of Captain William Pope to you, and also a copy of the land grant to Samuel Green and Edmund (Edward) Ellis of the Hilton Head property (formerly granted to John Beauford) comprising "Fish Hall" and "Colquinte" ("Coggins Point"), so I shall not duplicate same.

There has been contemplation in the past as to whether some of Thomas Jr. and Emma C. Pope Grayton might have been born at "Fish Hall." I enclose a Xerox copy of Marriage and Birth records from the Bible of Horatio Fenwick Grayton which answers that question once and for all, which you may forward to Mr. McCorkle at the South Carolina Department of Archives and History at such time as you forward the aforesaid documentation re papers of Administration of Estate of Mary B. (Eliza) Pope, if you like. I also enclose a Xerox copy of Memorials to Anna M. Grayton Thomas and her husband John B. (Greenberry) Thomas which Mr. McCorkle might like to have.

Regarding the inscription on the historical marker to be placed at "Fish Hall," you will see that the last sentence on side 2 should be changed to read: "Fish Hall was the home of Gen. Grayton's wife, Emma Catherine Pope, whom he married in 1838," or: "Fish Hall was the property of Gen. Grayton's mother-in-law, Mary Baynard Eliza Pope." Or, whatever is the desire of Mr. McCorkle

I do not have a copy of the Will of Mary Baynard Ekins Pope, but I am enclosing four (4) sheets (copied from the original copy) (originally two (2) sheets, but folded for copying on legal size paper) of the papers of Administration of the Estate of Mary B. (Ekins) Pope (widow of John Edward Pope) by her son-in-law Thomas Fenwick Drayton. Said papers (original copies) were once in the hands of my father, who gave them to me, but, unfortunately, he lost the remaining sheets when he was aged. I do not know whether said papers of Administration are in the Office of Ordinary of Beaufort County, or not. I do not know how much Sherman left unburned. (Is the Ordinary located in your building or in the County Courthouse?) Emma Catherine Pope Drayton predeceased her Mother, dying in 1854, while her Mother died in 1856.

In the past, I have referred to "Fish Hall" as the property of Emma Catherine Pope Drayton as opposed to ownership by the Draytons (Thomas H., or his Father). It was, of course her home where she grew to womanhood, but she did not hold title to same because she predeceased her Mother.

IN MEMORY.

Entered into the rest of Paradise on Saturday, April 16th, 1910, Auna Maria Drayton, wife of John G. Thomas, late of Baldwin County. Born March 22nd 1842 on Edisto Island, S. C., near Charleston, eldest daughter of Thomas F. Drayton, late of S. C., Gen. C. S. A. and his wife Catherine Pope of "Fish Hall" Hilton Head Island near Charleston. She was educated at the French School of Madame Ocelie Togno in Charleston, in that generation the most thorough and fashionable school in the south. Her early life and young ladyhood was spent at her home in Charleston and at the various country seats of her father, "Rephaim." "Fish Hall" and Bluffton.

With her own hands she made and presented the first battle flag used by a S. C. regiment; the flag was finally captured from Hampton's Legion. Always a loyal and devoted daughter of the South, and true to tradition. She refugee after the Charleston fire to Athens, Ga., from thence to Milledgeville, where she was married in December, 1864. The first ten years of her married life were spent in Dooly Co., Ga. Though reared in luxury and accustomed only to the society of the most cultured and distinguished men and women of her day, she bore misfortune with a brave, intrepid spirit and was not daunted by adverse circumstances; always bearing without a murmur, the rulings of an all wise Providence.

She was a faithful and consecrated soldier of Christ, a consistent member from early youth of the Episcopal church, the church of her fathers. She had a high ideal of the Christian life, and lived up to that ideal. In all the relation of life, she was ever faithful and true; a devoted wife and mother, and most loyal friend. She was always actuated by "noblesse oblige" and possessed the quality of magnanimity to a remarkable degree; in short, filled with that "charity which suffereth long, and is kind." She passed away after an illness of four months, borne uncomplainingly. She leaves one brother, two sisters, four children, and two grand-children. "Her children rise up, and call her blessed."

In Memoriam.

The subject of this sketch, Major John G. Thomas, son of John S. and Mary Bryan Thomas, was born in Milledgeville, Ga., March 28, 1833, and died calm and peacefully at his home in Scottsboro near Milledgeville, Sunday morning, November 11th, 1906, in his seventy-fourth year, of heart trouble precipitated by a severe cold, and was buried from St. Stephen's Episcopal church at Milledgeville, the Rev. W. R. Walker, of Macon officiating, and his remains, under an avalanche of beautiful flowers, were, by a host of friends, and relatives, followed thence in mournful silence to the grave.

Graduating from Yale university in 1853 he studied law with J. S. Pendleton, Esquire, of Charleston, S. C., and was admitted to the bar in that city in 1855, but when the tocsin of war sounded in 1861, he laid aside his law books and legal pen, left as it were the unfinished brief upon his desk, and shouldering his musket entered the Confederate service as private in a Florida regiment, and thus served faithfully and fearlessly for twelve months, after which he was assigned to duty as Assistant Inspector-General of cavalry, with the rank of major, on the staff of General Joe Wheeler, until the summer of 1864, when he was appointed special aid to his brother, the lamented General Bryan M. Thomas, late of Dalton, Ga., in which capacity he continued to serve with bravery, zeal and energy until the close of the war, when leaving the disbanded army and the now untended field, he wended his way through the ashes and smoke in Sherman's wake back to the land of the Palmetto and the Pine, and with undaunted spirit engaged in the culture of cotton in Florida and Dooly county, Georgia until 1876 when he returned to Baldwin county, his native heath, where he has since lived in quiet and at peace with the world and all mankind, dispensing hospitality, charity and good cheer to the extent of his ability and justice with an even hand from the bar of the court over which for many years until his death he presided with graceful ease and ability.

Brought up amid plenteous surroundings, and finely educated, he was a gentleman of the old school, with strong convictions of his own and the courage to defend them.

He is survived by his good and faithful wife and six children, Mrs. E. K. Lumpkin of Athens, Ga., Mrs. Alexander R. Jones of San Francisco, Cal., Miss Elizabeth Thomas now of Savannah, Ga., Miss Martha G. Thomas and John G. and F. Drayton Thomas of Jacksonville, Fla., and one sister, Miss Mary Neyle Thomas of Milledgeville.

As a husband and father he was gentle, loving, considerate and kind. As a friend, generous, unwavering and true, and in his death the country and community has lost a valuable citizen. He has fought the good fight, answered the last roll call, crossed the river and joined his former comrades in army in their bivouac under the shade of the trees beyond, where the bugle note disturbs not and the war cry sounds no more. May the God of Heaven, He who tempers the winds to the shorn lamb, bind up the wounded, bleeding hearts and comfort the stricken souls of the loved ones he has left behind.
