Dear Dr. Peeples:




Dear Mrs. Danko:

Our family is engaged in assemblying information on the South Carolina DuPonts. Of particular interest to us is information about Charles Henry DuPont, planter, lawyer, soldier and jurist. He was Chief Justice of the Florida Supreme Court from 1859 to 1868.

Enclosed are copies of information I have assembled, some of it tentative requiring confirmation. I have been in communication with Mrs. Marion DuPont Hopkins Beckwith who has given me copies of material she obtained from you, and which has portions of Henry A. DuPont's Early Generations of the Du Pont and Allied Families. I find on page 304 of this work that Henry A. Du Pont says he was not able to ascertain the names of all of Josiah's children, only identifying Elizabeth Goodbe. Our information suggests that Joshia had seven children, Abraham (1768), Ann (1770), Gideon (1772), Juana Isabel (1775), Maria Magdalena (1777), Isabelle (1779) and Rebecca (1789). This information is from the St. Augustine Historical Society, with the hispanic names the family used during the period they lived in Spanish Florida between 1790 and 1802, Isabelle being the Spanish form for Elizabeth. The family returned to the U.S. in 1802 because of Indian raids on their plantation. Joshia died shortly after returning to South Carolina. His eldest son, Abraham (1768), became a planter in St. Lukes Parish, married Frances Rumney and had a daughter and two or three sons. Abraham (b.1768), the father, died when Charles Henry was a small boy. The widowed mother remarried, and young Charles Henry moved from South Carolina to Ohio (Cincinnatti area) to live with his older sister, Eliza. Eliza had married Edward Meredith Longworth of St. Lukes Parish, S. C. and the family immigrated to Ohio. Charles Henry returned to the Beaufort District of South Carolina before entering Franklin College in Athens, Ga. to study law, and after graduation (1826) he entered law practice in Qunicy, Florida shortly following the acquisition of Florida by the United States.

143 Westview Drive, Biloxi, Mississippi 39531. NOTES: Abraham DuPont (1658-1731), the French emigrant to South Carolina, and Anne Faucheraud had six children. The wife of his oldest son Abraham (1699-1761), Jane DuPre was the daughter of Cornelius duPre (son of Josias duPre) and Jean Brabant who was the daughter of Dr. David Brabant and Magdalene de Bordeaux. Anne Goodbe who married Gideon DuPont (1712-1790) was the daughter of John and Hannah Cooke Goodbe, St. James Parish at Goose Creek above Charleston, S. C. (See Will Books, pp. 23, Mar1744 and 3c, Apr1762). Gideon and Anne Goodbe DuPont had eight children, 6 daughters and 2 sons. The second daughter Anne (b. 15July1744) married her first cousin, Josiah DuPont. He was the second son of Abraham and Jane Elizabeth DuPre DuPont, and they had five sons and a daughter. Although Peeples shows only 2 sons and 2 daughters for Josiah and Anne DuPont, Hall shows at least another daughter, Ann (1768-1854), who married Augustemus Buyck in 1800. Abraham and Frances Rumney DuPont had a daughter, Eliza, and three sons, Joseph, Josiah and Charles Henry, the judge. The Archives at the University of Georgia, Athens, nouses records of the faculty and the Phi Kappa fraternity of Franklin College, the predecessor of the University in this location. These records reveal that a Joseph M. DuPont was a contemporary of Charles Henry at the College. He was from the Beaufort District also and it is recorded that he died October 1824. Unless indicated otherwise, most of this information has been supplied by Mrs. Lewis or has been taken from genealogies researched by Rev. E. H. Peeples, 8 Moon Shell Road, milton Head Island, S. C. 29928 and by Mr. ohn

CHRONOLOGY OF CHARLES HENRY DUPONT

· . .

	Jan. 27, 1805	Charles Henry born to Abraham and Frances Rumney DuPont in Beaufort, S. C. He had an older sister, Eliza F. DuPont, and one or two brothers. The father died when Charles Henry was a young boy. His mother remarried (Towers), and Charles Henry went to live with his sister in the vicinity of Cincinnatti, Ohio, Eliza's husband, Edward Meredith Longworth, had lived in South Carolina until immigrating to Ohio. Charles Henry passed his youth in Ohio working on a farm and attending school.
	August, 1822	Charles Henry DuPont enrolled in Franklin College, the forerunner of the University of Georgia at Athens, registered as a resident of the Beaufort District of South Carolina.
	October, 1824	Joseph M. DuPont, thought to have been Charle's brother, enrolled in Franklin College as a resident of Beaufort.
	August 2, 1826	Charles Henry DuPont graduated from Franklin College.
	1827	Charles Henry DuPont moved from Beaufort to Gadsden County, Florida, where he purchased land near Quincy and began the study and practice of law.
	Nov. 16, 1828	Charles Henry DuPont married Mary Ann DeGraffenreid Hobson, reported to have been born in Georgia and to have lived in Greensboro, Ala., she had an uncle in Columbus, Ga., presumed to be Louis DeGraffenreid.
