KEARSE

The ancestry of Kearse families goes back to I200 A.D. when the name was first used in Germany. It refers, states Cofer's book on German surnames, to a tribal chief who ruled in I200 A.D. in the Palatinate area; hence the name is over 760 years old. The first record to be found of the name is that of Tomas Kearsse, who owned a hide of land (80-I20 acres) near the town of Trier. The microfilm abstracts from the German State Records show the next record to be that of Gerhard Kearsse, who owned IO8 acres at Heppenheim in the Palatinate in I2I5, the year following the previous record; his property included a manor house. In 1284 Oscar Keirsse is mentioned as a Knight who went on the Crusades, Moblem where Christian fought Arab for the posession of Jerusalem. In Ц45 A.D. the city of Darmstadt records show that Paul Kearse owned a castle there and owed feudal service of 40 men-at-arms to the local Landgrave (ruler). In 1533 the Hesse records show that Count Hans Kearse defeated a company of Swedish infantry after a fierce battle at Graachin the Saar. In a list of Property Deeds for Munich in I630 Albert Kearse is shown as transferring 200 acres of land to the Count of Rechberg and Rotherdawen. In the Hanover State records in I620 Johann Kearse is registered as Master Silversmith at the town of Linden. The Land Rolls of the German States show Kearse property owners during the I600-I800 period as follows: Gustav Kearse, 200 acres at Letts in Westphalia, I665; Karl Kearse, I00 acres at Langenhagen, I704; Adolphus Kearse, 85 acres at Weetz, 1738; Josephus Kearse, II2 acres at Mainz, 1770; Otto Kearse, 120 acres at Saalfield, 1790.

From I760 to the early I800's more than I4 Kearse families and individuals of the name emigrated from Hamburg and Dutch Ports to the U.S.A. and Canada. A search of the Abstracts of the Dutch Ship's records for Amsterdam and Rotterdam shows a Wilhelm (William) Kearse and a Jakob Kearse as sailing for the U.S.A. on the ship "Albert" on May 3rd, in the year I768 A.D.
