KONRAD OSANNER

Konrad (Kunz) Osanner, the first Osiander on record, was born about 1410. He was a resident and Steuerer in the cloister at Wassertrüdingen on the Wörnitz in Mittelfranken. Whom he married and when he died are not known. His only child known to us was a son, Andreas. (Some records give the Osanner-Osiander surname as Hosemann).

ANDREAS OSANNER OF GUNZENHAUSEN

Andreas Osanner was born 1443/44 in Auhausen and died after 1524 in a home for old people in Nuremberg at 82 years of age. He was a blacksmith, and a counsellor and citizen of Gunzenhausen. He married Anna Herzog sometime before 1498. Anna was born in 1458 and died in 1540 in Nuremberg. They had two known children, both born in Gunzenhausen:

ANDREAS OSIANDER, PREACHER AND THEOLOGIAN

Rev. D. Andreas Osiander, son of Andreas and Anna (Herzog) Osanner, was born 19 DEC 1498 and died in Königsberg, Prussia 17 OCT 1552. The next section will be devoted to the career of this prominent 16th century theologian who is known as the reformer of Nuremberg.

Andreas was married three times and had a total of seven children. He first married Katharina Preu (Praun) 2 NOV 1525 in St.

Lorenz (Lawrence) Church in Nuremberg. Catharina, born before 1508, was the daughter of Heinrich Preu, citizen of Weissenburg am Sand, and She died in childbirth 14 JUL 1537. Andreas and Catharina had five children, all born in Nuremberg, as follows:

1) Katharina, b. 1526, buried in Nuremberg 16 OCT 1562. m. Nuremberg 30 JAN 1548 Hieronymus Besold (b. same place 1522, d. there 4 NOV 1562). In 1547 Hieronymus was preacher at New Hospital in Nuremberg.

2) Agnes, b. about 1530.

m. I. Königsberg 19 JAN 1550 Andreas Aurifaber (Aurifaber is latinization of Goldschmid). Andreas was born in Breslau in 1512 and died in Königsberg 12 DEC 1559. He was doctor of medicine and professor of medicine and physics. He was the son of Valentin Goldschmid, citizen of Breslau, and wife Ursula Kirstein. Ursula was married previously, to a Mr. Lufft in 1538. Lufft was born in Wittenberg and died in Königsberg in 1549.

m. II. Königsberg 1561 Johannes Funck (b. 14 FEB 1518, d. same place 28 OCT 1566. Johannes was court chaplain at Königsberg. Because of his part in the Osiandrian Controversy he was sentenced for high treason and beheaded.

3) Veronika, b. AFR 1533. m. 1553 Johann Freudenhammer, deacon at Königsberg and preacher at Schippenheil (d. 5 JUN 1522, epitaph in Adenstedt, Alfeld district.

4) Lukas, b. 16 DEC 1534. 5) Klara, b. 8 JUL 1537, d. Nuremberg 9 JUL 1537.

The second wife of Andreas Osiander was Helena 18 SEP 1517. Andreas and Helena were married in St. Lorenz Church, Nuremberg. Helena, kin to the Kunhofer family, died in Nuremberg JUN 1545 in childbirth. There were no children from this second marriage.

The third wife of Andreas Osiander was Helena von Magenbuch. They were married in St. Sebald Church in Nuremberg 26 AUG 1545. Helena was born same place in 1523 and died in Hohenacker (Waiblingen district) 8 SEP 1597. She was a botanist and hobbyist in alchemy. From 1584 to 1596 (well after her husband's death) Helena was court apothecary at Stuttgart. She was the daughter of Johann von Magenbuch, doctor of medicine (Stadtphysikus und Kreis-Leibmedikus) at Nuremberg. Helena's mother was Prisca Hunnia von Schweinitz. Prisca married a second time, to Johannes Rucker, in Königsberg in 1556. Johannes was born 1526 in Nuremberg and died in Denkendorf (Esslingen district) 6 DEC 1579. In 1578 he was provost there. He had left Konigsberg on account of the Osiandrian Controversy. In 1558 he was pastor at Pfaffenhofen (Heilbronn district). Johannes was in 1560 dean at Kirchheim unter Teck.

There were two children born of Andreas Osiander's third marriage. They were:

1) Ursula, b. 1546.

m. Kirchheim unter Teck 17 MAY 1570 Johannes Hutzelin. Johannes was magistrate in Tübingen in 1567. He was deacon at Kirchheim and dean at Blaubeuren (Ulm district) from 1596 to 1617. He was abbot at Hirsau (Calw district) when he died 9 FEB 1621.

2) Elisabeth, b. 1548, d. Buchsweiler 22 MAR 1589.

m. Kirchheim unter Teck 13 JAN 1574 Jakob Hagmajer (Hagmeier).

Jakob (b. Blaubeuren 1546, d. Buchsweiler/Elsass 9 OCT 1610)

was in 1569 magistrate at Tübingen, in 1572 deacon at Kirchheim, and in 1576 preacher at Dettingen (Kirchheim district). In 1581 he was preacher and in 1587 senior minister at Buchsweiler.

Andreas Osiander had a niece named Anna*, presumably the daughter of his sister Margarete. Anna entered the pages of history by becoming the German Lutheran wife (in 1532) of Thomas Cranmer, the first Protestant Archbishop of Canterbury. Thomas Cranmer was born at Aslacten. England 2 JUI 1480 and was burnt at the archbishop of Canterbury. born at Aslacten, England 2 JUL 1489, and was burnt at the stake by the Catholic Queen Mary 21 MAR 1557. Some of his posts were court chaplain and advisor to King Henry VIII of England, archdeacon of Taunton, and prelate of London. See the Andreas Osiander historical section below.

Rev. Br. Lukas Osiander, father of Andreas Osiander the Younger, was born in Nuremberg on 16 DEC 1534. He attended school in Nuremberg and Königsterg and entered Tübingen University 13 APR 1553. He was recipient of the doctor of theology degree. In 1555 Lukas was head deacon at Göppingen, in 1557 pastor, then dean at Blaubeuren (Ulm district), and from 1562 to 1594 court chaplain, superintendent, and counsellor of the consistory at Stuttgart. From 1594 to 1596 he was preacher at the Stuttgart collegiate church, and from 1596 to 1598 prelate and Landschaftsassessor at Adelberg. On from 1596 to 1598 prelate and Landschaftsassessor at Adelberg. On account of his candor he was held in disfavor for a time (about 1598) by Duke Frederick. From 1598 to 1603 Lukas was head preacher at Esslingen. He received the imperial coat of arms on 29 NOV 1591. He died in Esslingen 17 SEP 1604 and is buried at the Stuttgart collegiate church.

Lukas Osiander was present, in 1564, at the Maulbronn Colloquy and was one of the composers of the Maulbronn Formula. He took part in the Mompelgard Colloquy with Theodore Beza in 1586. Lukas corresponded with Jeremias II, Patriarch of Constantinople, in an effort to establish a dialogue between the Lutheran and Eastern Orthodox churches. His most important works are his BAUERNPOSTILLE (Farmer's Postil), his BIBLE WORK, and OUTLINE OF THE MAGDEBURG CENTURIES.

Lukas Osiander was married twice. In 1555 he wed Margarete Entringer. Margarete was born in Tübingen JUN 1524 and died in Stuttgart 16 JAN 1566. She was the daughter of Johann Entringer (a merchant and castellan at Hohentübingen) and wife Anna Palm. This was Margarete's second marriage*. Soon after Margarete's death Lukas married Tabitha Engel at Waldenbuch (Böblingen district) on 15 MAY 1566. Tabitha was born in Oberstenfeld (Ludwigsburg district) 25 DEC 1539 and died in Tübingen 22 MAR 1625. She was the daughter of Veit Engel and wife Elisabeth Sigel. Veit Engel was dean at Waldenbuch from 1553 to 1571.

Lukas Osiander had four children by his marriage to Margarete Entringer. They were as follows:

- 1) Monica, b. about 1559, d. Kirchheim unter Teck in 1612. Monica married M. Johannes Schuler 9 APR 1578 in Stuttgart. Johannes was born 1554 in Goppingen. He was appointed magistrate at Tubingen 17 FEB 1574. By 1579 he was deacon at the Stuttgart collegiate church. Johannes was pastor at St. Leonhard's in Stuttgart by 1582. He is known as the Reformer of Neidlingen. He was from 1586 to 1614 dean at Kirchheim. Johannes died in Kirchheim in 1616.
- 2) Andreas, b. Blaubeuren 26 MAY 1562.

3) Jonannes, b. 26 APR 1564. (s. Vb) 4) Paul, b. 12 OCT 1565, d. young.

Margarete (Entringer) Osiander was married previously, to Casper Leyser on 20 DEC 1547 in Tübingen. Casper was born in Winnenden 20 JUL 1526 and was dean there in 1550. He was pastor at Nürtingen Ende by 1553 and died there in 1554. Casper and Margarete had at least one child, Polykarp Leyser, who was born 18 MAR 1552. Polykarp, stepson of Lukas Osiander, was a student of theology at 14. By 1570 he was magistrate at Tübingen. In 1573 he was a preacher in Austria. Polykarp was recipient of the doctor of theology degree in 1576. In that year he was appointed bishop, professor of theology, and Konsistorialassessor in Wittenberg. From 1585 to 1590 he was at Braunschweig, then back to Wittenberg again. On 22 OCT 1590 he was knighted and elevated to the rank of peer (Prague). In 1593 Polykarp was court chaplain and member of the consistory in Dresden. He died in Dresden 22 FEB 1610. Of parti-interest is the fact that on 17 MAY 1580 he married Elisabeth Cranach of Wittenberg. Elisabeth (b. Wittenberg 3 DEC 1561, d. there 19 SEP 1646) was the daughter of Lucas Cranach the Younger, court painter and Burgermeister (mayor) in Wittenberg, and his wife Magdalena Schurff. Readers of these remarks who have a general knowledge of art history will recognize the Lucas Cranach Elder and Younger duo as very gifted and famous Protestant artists of the Reformation period.

Rev. D. Andreas Osiander the Younger, father of Daniel Osiander, was born in Blaubeuren (Ulm district) 17 MAR 1562. On 28 MAR 1576 he was entered as a student of theology at Tübingen University and was appointed schoolmaster (Magister) there 12 AUG 1579. In that same year he was curate at Vaihingen/Enz. In 1584 Andreas was deacon at Urach, in 1587 dean at Güglingen (Heilbronn district), and in 1589 court chaplain and counsellor of the consistory at Stuttgart. On 23 AUG 1592 he received the doctor of theology degree at Tubingen University. By 1598 Andreas was prelate at Adelberg (Goppingen district) and from 1599 to 1606 he was bishop there. He was by 1606 professor of theology, councillor and provost at his alma mater. He was chancellor of Tubingen University at the time of his death 21 APR 1617.

Andreas Osiander the Younger married Barbara Heyland at Tübingen on 1 SEP 1584. Barbara was born in Tübingen 7 DEC 1565 and died there 3 AUG 1619. She was the daughter of Samuel Heyland, a professor of moral philosophy and ethics at Tubingen University, and wife Juliane Winter. Andreas and Barbara had eighteen children. Children 6 thru 11 were born in Stuttgart, 15 thru 18 in Tübingen. They were as follows:



Hev. Daniel Osiander, father of Daniel Osiander the younger, was born in Stuttgart 5 APR 1595 and died in Wildberg (Calw district) 19 SEP 1635. THE OSIANDER FAMILY OF FRANCONIA AND WURTTEMBERG

The Osiander family stems from the Franconia-Wurttemberg area of Germany and has brought forth a whole succession of prominent personalities. There have been 60 evangelical ecclesiastics (incl. 3 chancellors of Tübingen University, several professors of theology, 4 prelates and four deans). There have been 14 philologists and teachers, 12 medical men, 7 apothecaries, 28 civil servants and administrators, 22 merchants and business men, 18 artisans, 5 large landowners and farmers, 4 soldiers, and 2 "menial workers."

Especially prominent were the following family members:

Rev. Dr. *Andreas Osiander* (1498-1552), reformer of the city of Nuremberg.

Rev. D. *Lukas Osiander* (1534-1604), abbot of Adelberg.

Rev. D. *Andreas Osiander* (1562-1617), professor of theology and chancellor of Tübingen University.

Rw. D. Lukas Osiander (1571-1638), chancellor of Tubingen University

and provost of the city cathedral.

Rev D: Johannes Osiander (1657-1724), director of the consistory at
Tübingen, abbot at Hirsau, and ducal envoy for Württemberg to Sweden and Poland.

Dr. Johann Adam Osiander (1659-1708), professor of medicine at

Tübingen University.

Post Johann Adam Osiander (1701-1756), professor of Greek at Tübingen

University.
Res. 32. Johann Rudolf Osiander (1689-1715), professor of theology at Tübingen University.
