Being 19 years old in 1820 and subject to compulsory 4 yr. military training, he emigrated from Germany to Charleston, South Carolina where he lived for a while with his uncle, Leonhard Weissinger. Sometime before his marriage he moved to Barnwell District, S.C. He settled on a plantation near Midway, S.C. where he was successful as a merchant, planter and large slave holder. He died of erysipelas which resulted from a mosquito bite on his leg and was buried in the family cemetery on his plantation.

THE WEISSINGER FAMILY

The WEISSINGER family is descended from ancient Suevian stock. The Suevians were a Germanic people, separated into many distinct tribes, mentioned by Caesar as dwelling east of the Rhine River, and by Tacitus as extending to the Elbe River and to the Baltic Sea. Early in the 5th century France and Spain were overrun by a horde of Germanic Suevians. During the medieval period the various tribes of the Suevians were organized into the German Duchy of Swabia, which comprised Baden, Wuerttemberg, part of Bavaria and part of Switzerland. A part of Bavaria is still known as Swabia, the inhabitants being a cross between the blond Teutonic race and a thickset, broad-headed Alpine race.

The first authentically occurring member of this family, beyond whom nothing is definitely known, was ANDRAS WEISSINGER, who was of noble Swabian stock and was living in 1474. In 1643 there also appeared a Weissinger ennobled, but this latter noble line soon became extinct. Yet to this day the Weissinger family are numbered with the most esteemed inhabitants of Bavaria and Wuerttemberg.

The family coat-of-arms shows "a silver shield, divided into two parts by a red beam (cut in spiked or pointed fashion, as a saw, on the upper edge) sloping diagonally through the center, surmounted by a blue open-visor helmet with two buffalo horns (the right one silver, the left one red) ornamented at the tips with a peacock's feather". The red beam with its spiked or pointed edge betokens nobility. The open tournament helmet likewise betokens eminent descent, with the buffalo horns denoting fitness for war, and the peacock's feathers denoting pride and dauntlessness. The motto:

"Am werthigen Alten
In Treue halten!
Am kraeftigen Jungen
Sich staerken und freuen!"

may be interpreted thusly: "In faithfulness hold to the worthy past; Strengthen and rejoice in the vigorous present!"

The following line, descended from ANDRAS WEISSINGER, is found at an early date settled at Weilhaim-on-the-Teck, a town situated on the Lindach River (a tributary of the Danube at its circle) 26 miles northwest of Ulm, in the Duchy of Wuerttemberg:

LEONHARD WEISSINGER - of the Court, born 8 April 1654, died 10 June 1739, married as his third wife, on 20 Nov. 1683, ANNA MARIA STEELTSLIN, born 10 March 1644, died 17 Aug. 1745, daughter of Martin Steeltslin and his wife, Anna Katharin Doerner. Martin Steeltslin was "of the Court and barber"; formerly barbers were also practitioners in the surgery and dentistry of the day, and the occupation was considered not an humble profession. VIII. JOHANNES WEISSINGER, was born 15 Feb. 1801 (according to the family register and records of the Parochial Office at Weilheim-on-the-Toeck). Reaching the age of 19 years, and being subject to a compulsory four-year term of service under the German military system, but having no inclination for military training, in 1820 he emigrated, landing at Charleston, South Carolina where he lived for some time with the family of his uncle, Leonhard Weissinger, who had previously come to the United States. Prior to 1833 Johannes Weissinger moved to Barnwell District, S. C. where on 1 January 1833 he married MARTHA MILDRED ZEIGLER, daughter of Jacob Zeigler and his 1st wife, ~~Maria Piquet (or Peet, pronounced "pee-see")~~. They settled on a plantation near Midway, S. C. where John was successful as a merchant, planter and large slaveholder; dying 21 Dec. 1843 he was buried in the family cemetery at his plantation.
