Mr. Folk was born in Moselle, S.C. He graduated from what is now Clemson University and took a master's degree at the University of Virginia. In 1938 he moved to Washington and worked for the Agriculture Department. 101 9mon 1190

During World War II, Mr. Folk was called to active duty in the Army and assigned to Selective Service headquarters here. He remained in the Reserves after the war and rose to command the Reserve Selective Service unit, He retired in the mid-1970s as a colonel.

In 1946, Mr. Folk joined the World Bank and specialized in Middle Eastern affairs. From 1960 to 1962, he was an adviser to King Saud of Saudi Arabia.
