Dear Robert:

Your letter of 22 October, with enclosures has been received. As you went to so much trouble I hate to tell you that I have most of the information; as I wrote you I have a complete history of the Glover family. Miss Beulah Glover, of Walterboro, has been a wonderful help to me and loaned me all of her data so that I could make copies as her eyesight is very bad now. Then too I recd. information from Mrs. Stanley. Since I am trying to give as much personal information for each male ancestor as possible I did want a bit more on Col. J. H. Glover and an authority as to how he became "Col" As you know it was the habit in ye old days to give various titles to older men. I do appreciate all that you have done for me and also the data sent by Richard McConnell. I shall contact him as soon as I can and send him a copy of the descendants of Adam Hubley and Margaret (Glover) Jenkins. As they had many children and grandchildren it will take some time as I am not a fast typist.

When I made the Glover chart and put Col. William Sanders and Margaret Moore as parents of Margaret Sanders, I fully intended to put a note at the bottom of the page, as I was not at all sure. I have Sanders data but it does not mention Margarets parents. I have some information on Charles Worth Glover in case you are interested. The following will probably interest you however, Gen. William L. Snow, U.S.A compiled a history of the Glover family for his wife Isabel O'Hear Lock who was a Glover descendant, the following is taken from it. "About 1870 Mrs. Sarah Wilkinson (Glover) Waring had Mr. Henry W. DeSausure, of Charleston, prepare for her a family history!" It seems that Mr. DeSausure claimed that Charles Worth Glover was the progenitor of the South Carolina Glover Family, there were no records to show who were the parents of Col. Joseph Glover, it was claimed that he was born on an Indian reservation. Gen. Snow made a thorough search of the records in South Carolina and in Washington so was convinced that Mr. DeSausure had made a number of mistakes, I will not go into that further as the main interest in all of this is Mrs. Sarah Waring. She was the daughter of Joseph Glover, M.D. and Elizabeth S. Young, dau. of Francis Young of Young's Island. Sarah married Paul Hamilton Waring. At first glance I thought that Paul Hamilton Waring was the son of Dr. Morton Waring, Jr. and Henrietta Rhodes but the dates do not work out. Sarah was born 1805 d 1876. I do not, as yet, have anything on the Rhodes-Waring connection.

I wish that I had known that Eleanor Marshall had been in South Carolina, I would have enjoyed meeting her very much, we did have a nice chat over the phone several years ago. You mentioned that you still have my files ready for a trip to Charleston, I hate to admit it but I have misplaced my copy, I must have taken it out of my file for some reason, I still want data which I hope can be found in Charleston. Were you able to find anything on Mrs. Jenkins' Clark relatives in Bft.? The reason I ask is two-fold, if you could not find anything in Bft. I do not think that the Charleston records will be of any help either, in that event you would be able to concentrate on Talbird references. I have a vague idea as to what I had given you so it might be well to

I was in Beaufort Thérèse and I called on Col. Miller, Pigeon Point Road, Beaufort, whose grandmother, Selena Florence Talbird, married John Talbird Henery Oct. 31, 1852. He had no family information but suggested that I write his sister, Mrs Chas. D. Williams, of Vidalia, Ga. which I did, and received a very nice letter in reply in which she gave me some family data. Her mother, Kate Estell Henerey, married John Rogers Miller. (Note: The name is spelled Henerey not Henery as I have been writing). Mrs. Stanley sent me the data re the marriage which had "John T. Henery". I have no idea how he got the name "Talbird" Mrs Williams may have made a mistake? however I intend to find out. Mrs. Williams' aunt, Belle Morgan Henerey, married Edmund Ravenel Middleton, the Millers and Middletons are buried in Bonaventure Cemetery Sav. Ga.

Here of late I have received letters from various family connections, Mrs Shultz (Sara Cole) has sent me Cole data; Mrs. Dawson (Mary) has sent me quite a lot of interesting information and says she has more for me. Eleanor Marshall says she has some Talbird data for me and I received a nice letter from Doris Talbird Coleman. A few years ago I did not know I had so many charming cousins that of course includes two new "cousins" who live on Hilton Head Isl.

In regard to the Johnson and other family data which you have recently acquired, I must admit that it was very hard to copy. As I knew the Johnson and Verdier history I managed to sort it out. My grandfathers sister, Claudia Talbird, married Dr. John Johnson and Dr. Johnsons brother, Joseph Johnson, M.D. married a Verdier. Their daughter, Eliza Johnson, married Porter Danner whose grandmother was a Talbird. *Charles R. Danner (Charlie) is a cousin of mine and is quite interested in my history, his son, by the way, is an Episcopal Minister and hopes to go to Bft. this Summer. The Johnsons and Verdier lots are in St. Helena Ch. Yd, just South of the Church. Uncle John Johnson and his wife are buried in the Talbird lot - the North East corner of St. Helena's Ch. Yd. There is a bronze plaque in memory of Uncle Johnson and his wife in the Church, which was put there by his children, at least it was there. Is Mrs Scheider related to the Johnsons and Verdiers also? Would be interested to know, is she related to the ~~Bowman~~ ~~Sydney~~ ~~Wood~~ ~~Byzvek~~?

Was truly sorry to hear about the death of Mr. Andrea, I believe I sent you the name of his book "S. C. Colonial Soldiers and Patriots" Mrs. Stanley has a copy of it and a copy is in the Chas. Library, it probably does not mention Talbird as Mrs. Stanley would have checked. As I wrote you some time ago I contacted Mr. Alan T. Coleman and sent him some Crawford data, and never had an answer much less "Thanks". He had a request for information in the SCHM Vol. 67, Apr. 1966, p 124 re Thos. Tipoin 1790, of Bft. and Dr. Pierre Bodet. In the SCHM Vol 66, Jan 1965, p 60, I saw the following: History of Medicine in S. C. 1670-1825, by Joseph Ioor Waring, M.D. Chas. The Chas. Medical Asso. 1964 - listed for \$7.50. It mentions locations of doctors one was Beaufort. My grand-uncle Thomas Talbird, M.D. lived and practiced medicine in Bft. and Dr. Bettison Wm. Blakewood graduated at the S.C. Medical College, I would like to have a copy if it shows those men. If you ever go to the SCHS. building I would appreciate it if you will check it for me. As to my going to Charleston, it has its good

and bad points, Heywards first cousin, Washie Jenkins Rhett (Mrs. Richard Rhett) and I are very good friends and she lives on Church Street. She has invited me many times to pay her a visit and she quite often has a room for rent, and runs a very nice Tea Room, as her husband died many years ago. I do know my way around that section of the City, all very good, but: I have absolutely no sense of direction whatsoever and could get lost by going around the corner, another reason is that Tom lives on Sullivans Island and would want me to be with them but apart from all of this it would be far cheaper for me to have a professional Genealogist to do the work for me, my travel expenses alone would take care of most of that. I enjoy this work very much but must admit I am not a professional so it would be a case hit or miss. I feel sure that I could as well or even better than some I have had but in the long run it does pay. Mrs. Stanley was wonderful and am hoping that she will be able to do more. I do not want to impose on you so if for any reason you feel that you do not or can not continue please let me know, you really have been a wonderful help in giving me information and finding it for me, which I appreciate very much. Any data I have and you do not I will be delighted to share with you.

As to the Clark family it seems rather a hopeless case. Some time ago when I was in Beaufort Therese and I contacted the Baptist minister, she wanted data on a Sams connection and I thought I may be able to find something about the Clarks, the minister was busy but he left word with his secretary to show us the map of the Church Yard. I did not see any Clark listed but frankly I do not think I searched too hard. I did remember checking some of the Church record books many years before that, however as the minister was not there we did not see them. The Minister who is there now seems to be a very nice man so will probably be glad to let you see what he has. I was doing some research work for the City, as I remember, and in one of the books I saw a notation as to help for Mrs. Foy, Mrs Jenkins Grandmother. She, as I have told you, was born in England and met and married Mr. Wm. Bernard Foy, who was French, in Canada, he died at sea when they were enroute to S.C. How or why she went to Beaufort I do not know. The books I saw were large and heavy and were probably minutes of the Vestry or what have you. I was told that the Baptists do not keep records of baptism or death, I failed to ask about marriage. It is a sort of forlorn hope but might be worth a try. The 1850 Census shows James S. Clark age 39, and Eliza age 16 (Mrs. J's not grandfather and mother) so James was born ca. 1811 and Eliza 1834. I would figure that James S. Clark's father was married in the 1800's. I do not think the above mentioned books are indexed but must show the year. Mull this over and see what you think. Another suggestion is to find records which show positions held under the British rule. I have an idea that the Clark "Cousin Charlie" mentioned may have been Collector of the Port of Beaufort. The last man who held that position as far as I know was Robert Smalls (Negro, who was at one time the Representative to Congress) he held the position up to 1910 at least. Calhoun Thomas' office was the Customs Office at that time. I do not know what became of the records, if any, however Smalls was a smart old man. They could be in the Probate Judges Office Bft. Court House. There must be some records of the period prior to the Rev. I would think that the S.C. Hist. Soc. must have some if not the Archives in Columbia. If you decide to make a trip to Chas. or Columbia let me know in advance so that I can get some Talbird data assembled, it will

probably will not take long to check the Clark data
so it will pay to have other work on hand so as
to make the long trip worthwhile.

don't know her parents names
Their daughter Beulah, who mar. James Deacy Lawton,
has been very kind and helpful in sending me information.
I do not know why since I have met only a few of Hayward's
relatives. Speaking of the Tison book - I have a very dear
friend who married Ed Tison (decd) of Sas. She was Dorothy
Barnes of Beaufort, we knew each other as children.
