John Heyward Glover (Wilson)(Joseph)(Joseph)(William)(Richard)
(15 Feb. 1789 d. 17 Sept. 1832 at his summer home near Danville, N. J.
buried Fontainebleau Plantation Cemetery) son of Wilson and Margaret
(Heyward) Heyward, widow of Daniel Heyward (her double first cousin)
He married in New York, Eliza Vincent (B 4 April 1798 in N.Y. d. 26 Jan.
1859 at Fontaine-bleau Plantation, buried Plantation Cemetery.)

as possible.
