## MRS. THOMAS COKE GLOVER, MOTHER OF CONFEDERATE REUNIONS

Recently in *The Confederate Veteran*, an lengthy article appeared attributing Lizzie Glover as being the founder of Confederate reunions. She was the widow of Lt. Col. Thomas Coke Glover, C.S.A. of Campbell County, GA. Thomas Glover was born Jan. 28, 1826 at Augusta, GA and was killed at Winchester, VA on Sept. 19, 1864, and is buried at Stonewall Cemetery at Winchester.

Glover, a son of William Kent Glover (1792-1873) & Susan McGill of Augusta, GA, was elected a delegate to the Georgia Secession Convention from Campbell Co. and returning home on July 19, 1861, he organized Company A of the 21st Reg. of Ga. Volunteer Infantry. He was promoted to major in July 1862 and Lt. Col. in April 1864. His company was assigned to the Army of Northern Virginia and also to Stonewall Jackson's command and participated in the battles of Second Manassas, Harper's Ferry, Sharpsburg, Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, Drewry's Bluff, Spotsylvania, and the Peninsula. Glover was severely wounded at Sharpsburg.

Upon hearing of the fall of Atlanta, Col. Glover remarked, "I fear all is lost, but I shall not live to see it." He was correct as he fell at the 3rd Battle of Winchester while leading his men and is buried there with a handsome marker. Some 3000 Confederate lives were lost on that ridge at Winchester.

Glover was highly accoladed in Henry W. Thomas' 1903 History of the *Doles-Cook Brigade* where it was said, "no braver or truer man than he ever drew the breath of life. He was always at his post of duty ready to lead his men to battle. His own safety was of no consideration to him when or where duty called. Col. Glover was to the 21st Georgia

what Stonewall Jackson was to the Army of the Valley. In James Cooper Nisbet's *Four Years on the Firing Line*, Glover was depicted as "the most daring, desperate fighter I ever saw."

Thomas Coke Glover moved from Augusta, GA to Campbell County and by 1850, had established himself as a leading citizen and a physician. There he met Elizabeth Susan Camp "Lizzie" (1829-1915), formerly of Greenville, SC, the daughter of Benjamin Camp a prosperous planter. In June of 1868, Lizzie Glover, who personally knew about 30 of the men who had returned from her late husband's brigade, organized a reunion at the Campbell County Courthouse to "talk over the war". Only twelve men attended, but they brought their families, sharing their stories and singing the songs which they learned on the battlefields. It was such a success, they decided to make it an annual event and the following year, a dinner was organized, and all 30 former soldiers that made it back, attended.

This spurred Lizzie Glover to contact veterans of other regiments, hoping to arrange other reunions to help reawaken the pride they once felt. She could be seen on horseback traveling extensively to carry the torch for Confederate Remembrance. The movement took root and reunions cropped up on other states. Until 1878, she had to contend with the Reconstruction-era officials who prohibited "rebel societies and activities".

By 1889, there were ten reunion groups organized in the states of Louisiana, Tenn., and Mississippi who met and formed the United Confederate Veterans. She aided the United Daughters of the Confederacy and in 1896, the Sons of Confederate Veterans held their organizational convention in Richmond, VA and recognized Lizzie Glover from the pulpit as the "Originator of the Reunions". She was again honored in 1902 at the Dallas, Tx. SCV reunion.

In 1915, Lizzie Glover had moved to Corsicana, TX to live with her children and 14 April 1915 she passed away, being interred at Oakwood Cemetery beneath a simple stone. Her efforts were not forgotten and in 1951 a bronze and stone marker was erected to her memory by the Campbell Co. Chapter UDC at the site of the old courthouse which read,

Lizzie Glover was again recognized by the Sons of Confederate Veterans on May 31, 1997 by placing a plaque at her grave which read,

ELIZABETH CAMP GLOVER

MOTHER OF CONFEDERATE REUNIONS

IN 1896 THE SCV RECOGNIZED THIS  
SOUTHERN LADY AS THE ORIGINATOR  
OF THE CONFEDERATE REUNIONS. IN  
THE CENTENNIAL YEAR THE SCV  
HONORED HER AS "THE MOTHER OF  
CONFEDERATE REUNIONS". SHE WAS  
THE WIDOW OF LT. COL. THOS.  
GLOVER OF CO A, 21 GA INF. CSA. HE  
DIED IN THE BATTLE OF III  
WINCHESTER.

IN 1867 AFTER THE WAR BETWEEN THE  
STATES WITH "FOR GOD AND  
COUNTRY" HER MOTTO SHE RODE THE  
COUNTRY SIDE OF CAMPBELLTON CO.,  
GA TO ASSEMBLE THE COMRADES OF  
HER FALLEN HUSBAND TO A BASKET  
DINNER AN TO "TALK OVER THE

WAR".            THUS            BEGAN            THE

TO BE 86 YEARS OF AGE, DYING AT  
CORNICANA, TEXAS, APRIL 14, 1915.

Quite a dedication ceremony was held with dignitaries from several Southern states present, along with many historians, soldiers, officers, color guards, Glover descendants and others. Lizzie Glover has certainly left an imprint on this earth, one that will continue throughout the passage of time.

Alice Glover gives acknowledgment that she has been paid in full for property of former husband Michael Rogers from his Executor Rev. John Rooker the one half of which was willed to Jonas Robers after my death...that she has enjoyed said property since his death. Witnesses, John Springs & Stephen W. Fox.

SC Archives land records listed under Glover name [note<all of this land was formerly leased from the Catawba Indians in the time period 1785-1840. The Catawba Indians were given a tract of land 15 miles square (144.00 acres) in 1763 by the Treaty of Augusta at the end of the French and Indian Wars. This was a reward by the British to the Catawba Indians for their fighting in the wars on the side of the English. The land was located primarily in York County, SC and covered the present-day towns of Rock Hill and Fort Mill. A portion of the land was in Lancaster County and that part is today the Indian Land township of Lancaster County. All of the reservation was leased by the Catawbas to white settlers by 1828. It is the only case on record of rents being paid to individual Indians. The Treaty of Nation Ford in 1840 ended the Catawba ownership. In 1841-43, according to the terms of the treaty, the white renters were required to have the land surveyed and furnish proof to the
