Abstract of the Will of-

JAMES GREEN (Sr.)

(father of Samuel Green who married Sarah Norton)

"
IN THE NAME OF GOD.....etc.....

I, JAMES GREEN, SENIOR, of South Carolina and Colleton County,etc.....

- Names - Dau: SUSANNAH, bed and furniture and 3 slaves
- Son: JOSIAH, 2 negro boys
- Son: BENJAMIN, 1 negro boy
- ours ← Son: SAMUEL, 1 Mustee boy, named July.
- Grandson, JAMES GRAY, 1 negro girl
- Dau: ANN, choice of mares
- Dau: MARY, 1 negro boy which son James must buy for her.
- Dau: ANNE, 1 cow and calf
- Son: SAMUEL, 1 negro girl, Deborah; and a mare

It's interesting to note that Samuel mentions these 2 in his will. He still had them.

All the rest of my property to son JAMES - he to pay all debts.

Son JAMES shall have the care of the children and what is given them til such times hereinafter mentioned.

Dau: SUSANNAH to have her share at age 17, or marriage
Sons to have their share at age 20,

But all the rest of my daughters together with my grandson are to have what is left them directly after my departing this life; and further, my will is that if SUSANNAH or BENJAMIN or SAMUEL or JOSIAH should die their estate should be equally divided between those of the above four living;

And my will is that son JAMES shall give 3 cows and calves to son BENJAMIN, and one saddle and bridle when he is at age and receives the rest of his estate.

I appoint my son JAMES sole executor.

IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN

I, JAMES GREEN of Colleton County in the Province of South Carolina, being sick and weak in Body but of Sound and Perfect Memory blessed, for the same and knowing the uncertainty of Life and the certainty of Death & being desirous to settle my worldly affairs whilst I have opportunity do therefore make this my Last Will and Testament in manner and form following but first and Principally I commend my Soul to Almighty God, my Creator assur'dly beleiving that I shall receive a full pardon and free remission of all my sins and be saved by the previous Death and Merits of my blessed Redeemer Christ Jesus, and my Body I commit to the Earth from whence it was taken to be buried in such decent manner as my Executor (hereafter named) shall fit and as touching such worldly Estate as the Lord in his Mercy hath blessed me with all my Will is that the same shall be employed & Disposed as hereafter by this will and Testament shall be exprest, and therefore do revoke renounce and make void all Wills and Testaments heretofore made by me and do hereby declare this to be my Last Will and Testament.

Imprimis. I will that my just & Lawful Debts be first paid.

Item. I give and bequeath one younge Horse Colt and one younge Negroe boy to Jonathan Thomas Jun. son of Jonathan Thomas & Ann Thomas.

Item. I give will and bequeath all the rest of my real and Personal Estate to my brother in Law Jonathan Thomas Sen. I constitute and appoint my loving brother Jonathan Thomas to be my Executor to this my Last will and Testament.

In witness hereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the second day of May, Anno Domoni one thousand Seven hundred and forty.

I noticed an error -

Pg. 49 -

Re: Republican Hall -

It is stated:

"When Sarah Green Tucker Pope died he (William Pope)
married (2) in Jan. 1798, Sarah, daughter of his cousin
Joseph James Scott, by whom he had a second set of children.

She brought him a fine plantation on EUHAW CREEK known by
the name of REPUBLICAN HALL, which he sold to Henry McNish,
...etc...."

It was not Sarah Scott (his 2nd wife) who brought to
William Pope the fine plantation called REPUBLICAN HALL on
the Euhaw.

It was the 1st wife of William Pope, Sarah Green Tucker
who brought this plantation to him. You will note by refer-
ence to his will - he says that he leaves Springfield, two
hundred acres Pine Land, and Walnut Hill, to his sons William
and John Ethat they must acknowledge immediately after
his decease by a proper instrument of writing, etc., that they
will receive the same in consideration and full satisfaction
for whatever right by inheritance they may have to that
plantation situated on the Euhaw known by the name REPUBLICAN
HALL, which I got by their mother and sold to Mr. Henry McNish.

were the sons of Sarah Green Tucker Pope - ~~and the only sons~~ * *
of William Pope and Sarah Green Tucker Pope -

Republican Hall was a Samuel Green plantation.
