I wrote my nephew Joe Greene, in Silver Springs Md. so am sending it on to you if it happens to cover some questions that this can clear for you. I ask his brother Jim to send his information directly to Marian - so I do not know if he did or not.

Dr. Samuel Lawrie's son Tom (not Thomas) the other name is ac or is it aquarius? so it is Tom Aquarius Greene - I do not know Karen's other name. They lived in Brunswick, Ga at one time.

My brother Samuel (M^c) Lawrie was in War One. Went in on 1st call, Placed at Columbia until he finished and was a 2nd Lt. Then sent to Camp Hancock, Augusta, Ga and was to ship out about 3 days after armistice was signed. He was in 316 Machine Gun Battalion and one of 3 still in states teaching this new form of warfare. He had superior officers who wanted to learn this form of warfare in his groups of

privates and others. He was released from Camp Hancock after the war closed.

His oldest son Dr. Samuel Laurie Jr. is a nuclear physicist. Graduated in N. Y. - Was given 2 \$10,000.00 scholarships to study in Europe, Germany mostly, I think. So when he received his doctorate he went to a newly opened college in Ca. I guess he is still there.

Jim the 2nd boy took his army training and was so good in jungle survival he was sent to Colorado where he taught it. He was a 2nd Lieutenant. He married out there and is now in Scottsdale Ariz. He is in a supervisory position there now for Hembel Oil Co. I believe.

Bill the 3rd boy was in navy 4 yrs. After that he drowned in Fla.

Joe also took military training in the army.

If there are other questions that I can answer I will be glad to do so.

Marion sent me a copy of what she has on the Jenkins family.

Grand Pa and Uncle Basil were so young that they were first signed to climb tall pines to look out for northern ships at Charleston. He was later captured. Mama's father and 5 brothers went into the war and one did not return. His wife Grandma Martha Myrick had six brothers in war also and one did not survive.

Mama used to tell us a lot about her kin. But she died in 1959. And unable to talk for about 10 years before that.
