Also, this is the area of SC where my grandfather ministered for our 50 years. Further, JHL and Anne Jaudon Luther were the parents of Anne Luther who married William Bagby. They became the Southern Baptists' first missionaries to Brazil and they were a preeminent among "mission minded Baptists" for many years.

I do not intend to include a great deal of family lineage, but, knowing it would reassure me. She was a remarkable lady!

Recently I was searching the Internet for family and SC history. I found an electronic text of a diary kept by "Meta Morris Grimball (Mrs John Berkly Grimball), The Grove Plantation, St. Paul's Parish, SC" It covered the years 1860 -? Is that part of our Grimball kin? The diary makes good reading, although, I haven't given much attention to it as yet.

A History of South Carolina Baptists, by Joe King, has provoked a question about Elias Robert. At the time Pipe Creek and other Baptist Churches were withdrawing from the Charleston Association to unite with the Savannah Association, Joe writes, "In 1800 Elias Robert was dismissed to the Savannah Church." What do you know about Elias. No other reference is in Joe's book; but, apparently he was of some prominence - else why make that statement??

My talk seems to be developing as an autobiographical pilgrimage showing how others of our family moved westward (not just the 90 to MS.) Some historical perspective (religious, national, etc.) will be added at critical times in the journey. It will be closer to "story telling" as opposed to scholarly. Nonetheless, I'm "in it up to my ears." Perhaps you have some suggestions? They will be welcomed.!
