Dear Cousin Robert,

How kind you were to answer my letter and I am so grateful for your valuable information. I found it waiting for me when I returned a few days ago from a trip I had hoped to make to Charleston-Summerville but wasn't sure until the last moment that it was going to be possible. A lonely week among family and old friends, marred only by the serious illness of my aunt (in law), Dora Boyle (Mrs. Wm. A. Boyle) of Summerville. But she was on the mend before I left to return to Pensacola.

It certainly would be valuable, in my opinion, if the "S.C. Hist. and Gen. Mag." would publish your study of the Ladson history. My request to you, which you so graciously answered, emphasizes this,

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for I had written to the Historical Society for Xeroxed copies of Ladson information. But among the many copies sent me, there was no reference to Thomas Ladson's first wife, Sarah Raven, or his children of that marriage. This points up, too, the need for accuracy since it would have been tempting to guess that Elizabeth Gibbes's husband was the John Ladson mentioned in the will of his mother, Martha Elmes Ladson. I was sent a Xeroxed copy of a portion of that will, and the Gates fit (partially). Your account of the will of James Stangrave of Newberry, South Carolina, is both amusing and sad, isn't it? For the last year I've been very interested in trying to discover why my forebears left Europe, whether they stopped for a time in Barbados or

another isle, and how they fared in S.C. One could guess that Thomas Stanyarne left home in anger and his father never came up & hoped his returning. I would so like to have a copy of the Stanyarne history and so my check is enclosed. But please make the copy when it is entirely convenient to you for today I've just started another year of school teaching, will be busy, of course, with school organizations and so will have to "slow down" on family research.

While in Charleston, I visited the Fireproof Bldg. once for several hours but only began to scratch the surface of my list of family history questions. There is never enough time, is there?

One of the questions that has puzzled Mary Soule and me

has been the quit claim deed of 12 January 1697 in which George Smith and Dorothy, his wife, renounce claim to monies from John Archam of Jamaica "unto my sd. wife Dorothy..." Is this the wife of Dr. George Smith, son of 1st Ldg. Thomas Smith, and was she married first to a John Archam in Jamaica? Was her maiden name possibly Archam since Archam Smith who married Edith Waring bears this name? Mary and I thought that you might know since you have been searching into Smith history much longer than we have. I am descended from the 2nd Ldg. Smith's children Anne who married Benj. Waring; Sabina who married Thomas Smith (of Boston); Henry who married (2nd) Elizabeth Ball; and from Archam Smith, son of Dr. George Smith

and Dorothy Archar (who married
Edith Waring).

Was delighted to hear that
Hilton Head has active local
theater and that you and
Miss Cora are taking part in
"The Music Man." This is a
favorite of mine. Knot (my husband)
and I saw Van Johnson as
Prof. Harold Hill in London in
1961 and loved it. Van Johnson
was not the authentic "con"
man Rob't Creston portrayed
so well, but his performance
was remarkably fine and he
was much more believably as
the lover.
