Barnwell Co. Court House
Deed BK. VII p. 137

1715 acres ~~mortgage~~ on Duck Branch waters
of Coosawhatchie which was mortgaged
by Wm. Mc Bride to said Arthur R.
Stokes on or about the 17th day of Nov. 1860

This deed recites foreclosure proceeding by Arthur
J. Stokes against Ann Haselton Robertson now
Ann Haselton Marcock as Admrs. of Mc Bride
and the heirs at law of Mc Bride (who died
intestate) Ann Haselton, Ida, Isabel, Burwell,
Sarah, Wm. —. This action was tried at old
Gillisonville Court House, Court of Equity, Beaufort
Dist, now Beaufort Co.

That A. Russell Stokes, shortly before the
Civil War sold the said plantation to one Wm. Mc Bride,
but Mc Bride failed to pay for same, and
this deponent is informed that shortly after the
death of Mc Bride, which occurred during the 60's
the lands were sold under foreclosure brought
by Arthur R. Stokes against Ann Haseltine
Robertson, formerly Mc Bride etc.

So, we now find out that Wm's wife was Ann Haseltine ^{or ton} & they had quite a few children -

I found last week in Hampton Court House that Rebecca Peoples McBride was living in 1874.

You might look up this Equity Case in Beaufort Court House involving Clara McBride Paul + ~~her~~ sheriff's sale of a 2700 acre tract of formerly Burwell McBride. * Clara bought it for \$350.00 + gave it to her son.

What happened to all those children? Ann was living in 1869, date of transaction on reverse side. Are there any McBride photographs in existence? With

all of that money, they should have been painted, but maybe they were unimaginative! James -

* This record stated Burwell had 6 tracts of 2700 acres each.
