Dorothy, dau. of Col. Thos. Drew of Charles City Co.; she died 18 Jan. 1673,
bur. Weyanoke, Char. City Co., tomb removed to St. Paul's, Norfolk.

p. 237 Floyd, Charles, Burgess for Northampton 16 Nov. 1714 & 1718 assembly.

p. 246 Graffenreid, Christopher de, son of Baron Christopher de Graffenreid of Bern,
Switzerland, founder of Newbern, N.C; he m. in Charleston, S.C. 22 Feb. 1714
Barbara Tempest Needham, born Hertfordshire, Eng.; they moved to Williamsburg, Va.
& kept an ordinary. In 1734 he patented lands in Brunswick Co. but died shortly
thereafter. In 1739 Mrs. Barbara de Graffenreid advertized her "dancing assemblies"
in the Virginia Gazette.

p. 250 Hamlin, Stephen, patented land at Middle Plantation, York Co. 1637 and
later in part of Charles City Co. now known as Prince George Co.;
Burgess for Char. City Co. 1654, died before 1666, leaving son Stephen.

Hamlin, John, Burgess from Prince George Co. Nov. 1714 & 1720-22 assembly;
grandson of immigrant; captain in militia, lived at "Maycocks" on James
River, conveyed him by Roger Drayton 1696.
