I have information from three different sources with three different surnames for Sarah-all unproved-but, if whe was a Coles, maybe you have something on her.

He called me a few nights ago, to my surprise, and said he had been in touch with you on his Lawton line-I sent him a copy of your Milam chart, as I was so excited at all the information it contained. I hope you don't mind. My husband's great aunts gave me the information that his Diataphus was a son of John Milam by his first wife Parthenia? Paul has a researcher working on this now.
