Graphic Arts Master J.M. McSweeney Dies

John McLaurin McSweeney, one of the founders of Chowan College, School of Graphic Arts, Murfreesboro, N.C., died April 15 in St. Pe-

tersburg, Fla.

Mr. McSweeney was born in 1900 in Columbia, a son of Miles B. McSweeney, the governor of South Carolina at the time. He was a master printer and for 11 years was head of a printing school in Philadelphia. He was with Parker Brothers Inc., a North Carolina printing company, before going to Chowan. He also published two newspapers in Florida and wrote a syndicated column.

At Chowan, he obtained an old Linotype machine as a gift from the Raleigh News and Observer and with it started what has become a well-known graphic arts school. He retired as director of graphic arts at
