The Heritage Library is Coming to Beaufort

he Heritage Library was approached by the Santa Elena Foundation in Beaufort to open a branch of our Library in their new building at 1501 Bay Street, Beaufort, to focus on genealogy research. This building was the Federal Courthouse building at one time and the second floor was the courtroom and judge's chambers. The Foundation has set aside the judge's chamber on the second floor to be our branch library and it is a beautiful room with big windows, a view of the water, lovely shelves and storage and our own restroom.

We have recruited some experienced genealogy researchers to staff the branch, and we welcome Nancy and Carroll Crowther, Ruth Ragland, Joan Schor, Weedy Servaes, Charlene Shufelt, Peter Somerville and Mary Somerville to the branch library staff. We will have a soft opening in February and our grand opening in April to coincide with the grand opening of the Santa Elena History Center and the 450th anniversary of Santa Elena.

Today, the Charlesfort-Santa Elena site is a National Historic Monument, important for its associations with the 16th-century conflict between Spain and France for control of the New World and with officers Spaniard Pedro Menendez de Aviles and Frenchman Jean Ribault. In addition to being a landmark, the site is also considered archaeologically significant.

We are honored to be a part of the celebration of this history, and look forward to your visit to our new site.

Beth credits her history-crammed hometown, Springfield, IL, for her interest in both history and genealogy.

When in high school, she and her best friend decided to go on a mission — to find Ann Rutledge's original gravesite. (Ann was supposedly Lincoln's first love when he lived in New Salem, IL.) They located the original Rutledge family gravevard, abandoned with rusty barbed wire and no gate. They climbed over the barbed wire. Beth got caught on the wire and ended up with a tetanus shot. They came to the conclusion that without DNA there was no way folks could have known that they had the right body when they moved it to the cemetery in Petersburg and placed the stone, with Edgar Lee Masters' poem, on the new gravesite. If you ever visit Ann Rutledge's grave take the scene with a big grain of salt.

Genealogy was an interest of Beth's when she was young but it really took off the summer she worked at the Illinois State Archives in Springfield between college and graduate school. She had a variety of tasks to accomplish but most interesting to her was to help folks who would write in with genealogy questions.

Beth never gave up her interest in history and genealogy but years passed without devoting any time to either. When she retired from a 40 year clinical psychology practice in July 2013 she had two goals — bridge and genealogy — and both are well represented on Hilton Head.

Beth joined the Heritage Library as a volunteer in 2014. Usually on Fridays, she helps patrons figure out their family history. She feels most useful when they are researching Irish ancestors, especially if they have "crossed the pond" (have gotten the immigrant ancestor back to Ireland). If you have

Irish roots, why not reserve some time with her on a Friday. Just call the Library, 843-686-6560, for an appointment.

She also moderates a monthly Irish Genealogy Group which meets at 10 am on the second Friday of each month at the Library. Usually, she presents some information and then the group does what it does best - helps each other. The monthly meetings have been very satisfying, with all members both learning and teaching. You don't need a reservation, just come. They won't throw you out if you are not Irish, but you will get more out of it if you are. There is no charge. However, you might want to call first to confirm that they will be meeting that month. Beth feels very strongly that genealogy without historical background is a waste of time and energy. So, any group she leads, or any presentation she gives, is strongly tied to history.

Several times a year, Beth presents programs on Irish history and genealogy at the Library and at the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute of the University of South Carolina Beaufort. She did one presentation at each location last fall and has one scheduled for each in the spring.

Ancestry Research

lemson University's Pan African Group is continuing to work with us on genealogical research. They will be here from May 7 through May 14. The students will start two new projects: researching the history of members of the First African Baptist Church on Hilton Head Island and beginning a genealogical study of Daufuskie Island native families. They will conduct oral histories and

collect documents, photos, and mementos.


Heritage Library volunteers are also embarking on a new project. They will work with Campbell Chapel A.M.E. Church in Bluffton to help trace the genealogy and history of its founding members.

The End of Family Tree Maker Software: What does it mean?

y now, you probably know that after December 2015, Family Tree Maker Software (FTM) will no longer be produced and sold. It will continue to be supported, though, through January 1, 2017. Simply stated, the company



What does this mean for you?

Right now, it has NO impact on you if you currently use the Family Tree Maker Software. If you own the software, you can use it for as long as you want. It is yours and it will not "disappear." If you own the software on a disk, you can even install it on a new computer. However, if you use the software AND sync your tree to the online ancestry trees, you can only sync through the end of 2016. If your goal is to produce a nice print-

ed product, you currently get much better options and final product from the software. I will continue to use FTM on my computer, taking care to back it up on flash drives, external drive, and in the cloud on Carbonite.

Second, I suggest that you not rush out and buy new software to replace FTM. There have already been several companies advertising "special deals" for FTM users and there will be others as we get closer to 2017. The Heritage Library is planning to investigate options and present a panel/program in the fall of 2016 to give you some thoughts on other software to replace FTM. If you do buy other software right now, you have to go through some "hoops" to transform your files to GEDCOM files to import into other programs. We are also following this issue and right now do not recommend that you tackle this. Most reports indicate that you will lose data if not done correctly. By waiting, other companies may adjust their importing process to allow an easier transfer of all data from FTM to their software.

Finally, being an optimist, I still hold onto the hope that Ancestry will heed the comments of its many users and reconsider this decision; selling off this portion of the company to someone who will continue to improve and update FTM, or coming up with another solution.

For those who currently do not use any software product, I suggest that you be patient and not rush out and buy anything now. Wait for the Heritage panel/program on suggested options to be given at the Heritage Library in the fall of 2016.

So, relax, and continue to use your FTM software as long as it works on your computer. It is yours and no one can take it away from you.

The following presentations were given during 2015: Historical Sites, Mitchelville, Gullah Culture and Heritage, The Role of Women in the Development of Hilton Head, Early Explorers, Civil War Medicine, and Santa Elena.

The end of the year was the time to look at our successes. First, our numbers are up. In 2014, there were 51 attendees at the Ft. Mitchel Tours. In 2015, there were 268 people who came to hear about Ft. Mitchel — 146 individuals attended the regular tours on Thursdays and the other

122 people had a delicious dinner at The Old Fort Pub followed by a tour of Ft. Mitchel led by General Mitchel (Lou Benfante). Not included in these numbers, are 311 people who visited Ft. Mitchel on History Day. In 2014, 711 people attended our on-site and off-site presentations. In 2015, there were 1384 attendees.

Second, our History Department volunteers are very generous with their time. Some present lectures on Tuesday mornings at the Library. Some are at Ft. Mitchel on Thursday mornings. Others are making presentations to clubs, organizations, church groups, and timeshare guests. January will start a new season for us, and we are excited about some new presentations that are in the works. Our New Year's Resolution — to make sure everyone knows how great The Heritage Library is.
