Evaluating the Baynard Museum

The Heritage Library has signed an agreement with the Savannah College of Art and Design (scad) for historic preservation students to perform a structural study of the Baynard Mausoleum in the Zion Chapel of Ease Cemetery. The study has been paid for by matching funds initiated by J. Ward and Carol Mathis.

The scad classes, HIPR446 Cemetery Preservation and HIPR747 Conservation in Cemeteries, began in late March under the direction of Dr. Thomas Taylor, Professor of Historic Preservation. Dr. Taylor and nine graduate and undergraduate students were on-site at the mausoleum on May 17 and 18. The Library asked our contractor, Kyle Mulligan, to provide some scaffolding and to remove the mausoleum door so the students could see the inside structure.

The students were broken into three teams: one worked inside the mausoleum; another outside the

mausoleum; and a third was assigned to study and record the gravestones in the cemetery. It was a pleasure to see the students so enthusiastic and dedicated to their task. On Saturday, May 18, several of the students and Dr. Taylor came to the library to research the records and maps that are available here.

The final report from the classes will be presented to the library by June 17 and a presentation of the results will be scheduled in the fall. Dr. Taylor mentioned that one of the construction protocols that was the norm at the time the mausoleum was built may have led to the larger problems we have today. The metal anchors that were used to tie the stones together have corroded. One of them has actually lifted the front left corner of the roof -- amazing given that the roof probably weighs over 2000 pounds.

It was exciting to have the study accepted as a project for SCAD and we look forward to the final report and presentation.

LIBRARIAN'S CORNER

Finding Adoptive Parents

One of the most difficult requests we get is from a patron who was adopted and wants help in locating birth parents. So I held out little hope when Ray and Margie Evenson came to the Library in search of his biological parents. As they had already discovered, sealed adoption records are a formidable brick wall.

But Ray had few pieces of information. He had known since childhood that he was adopted but the matter was never discussed. When his adoptive mother moved to Florida, Ray's brother found the adoption papers while closing her New York home. The papers gave Ray's birth mother's name, Ruth Kleine, and address, but nothing else. Ray and Margie had done what searching they could but with little progress.

In 2010 Ray and Margie moved to Sun City. They joined the Genealogy SIG (Special Interests Group) there who referred them to me at the Library. The only new clue I could find was a reference in an Ancestry.com family tree to a Ruth Kleine, Ray's mother's name. I then sent an inquiry to Ancestry which was forwarded to the person posting Ruth's name. An answer came immediately and I connected the responder with Ray. The responder turned out to be Ray's biological sister. In one day's exchange of phone calls and emails, Ray discovered the name of his father, who was Ruth's second husband, and learned that he had five sisters and a brother. DNA testing has confirmed the relationship. Amazingly, Ray's biological family and his adoptive family had lived only a few miles apart in New York during his childhood.

Ray and Margie have made several trips to New York to meet his new family and they keep in touch. When my husband and I had dinner recently with Ray and Margie we were interrupted with a phone call from a newly found nephew hoping to visit him.

Finding birth parents is not easy, but it is so satisfying when everything falls into place.

Editor's note: Volunteers at the library are researching available records to try to determine who actually lived in Mitchelville during the Civil War. Some of this is based on similar research already done; some of it will be completely new. Elizabeth Hanson plans a regular feature in the Observer on its progress.

The People of Mitchelvillle

Our Mitchelville committee has created a Mitchelville Timeline as a research guide. Committee members are working with Lowcountry Africana, the Mitchelville Preservation Project, the Gullah Museum, the

Coastal Discovery Museum, and other resources, to produce an accurate and detailed record of as many as possible of the 1500 people who lived in Mitchelville from 1862 to 1868. Members are looking for people, especially descendants, who can provide information about Mitchelville residents from that period.

They are also eager to find family photographs. They have already been able to locate one family descending from Mitchelville, complete with the family's ancestral chart.

The March research visit of the Pan African Studies students from Clemson University was a great success – the students were eager to work and participants said they were wonderful to work with. Each student paired with a community partner and a Library genealogist volunteer to assist him or her. The community partners were: Tom Barnwell, Murray Christopher, William and Dorothy Driessen, Bill Ferguson, and Dorothy and Vernie Singleton.

I'yanna Purnell worked with Bill Ferguson and Sunni Winkler. I'yanna said, "I could do this every day. I don't think I could be able to stop until I had found 'everything'. I think I've found a new hobby."

Henrietta Sweeney worked with Nancy Burke and did research on her own, starting to work on some names furnished by Cal. Henrietta plans to continue her research back at Clemson. Monica Magcalas

worked with Murray Christopher. She was very excited when they found the death certificate for Murray's great, great grandmother Margaret, wife of Samuel Christopher.

Kamairi Fayall worked with Thomas Barnwell. She is a pre-law student and found the research, in her words, "fun". The students will continue their research at Clemson, investigating those things that made Mitchelville successful and those that caused the town's demise.

The students will return in October to continue their research on the people of Mitchelville. We will be working to have a Mitchelville presentation at the 350/30 celebration.

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James Manuel Rose, 1941-2013

The Heritage Library has suffered a blow in the loss of our champion and friend, Dr. Jim Rose, who has succumbed following a long battle with cancer.

He joined the Library's board of directors in 1999 and throughout his service was an advocate for local African-American genealogy,

a field in which he was nationally known.

He received his doctorate in Interdisciplinary Studies, with a concentration in African-American genealogy. In the 1970's, he served as a research consultant with Alex Haley on the Kinte Library Project, a forerunner of Alex Haley's *Roots*. Rose and co-author Alice Eichholz, founded the Ethnic Genealogy Research Center at Queens College (N.Y.) The two of them also wrote *Black Genesis*, available online exclusively through ProQuest.* This key reference work includes an extensive compilation of African American resources for all 50 states, Canada, and the West Indies.

ProQuest has on their February, 2011, Web site an interesting story typical of Dr. Rose's research. He tracked the descendants of a woman named Indiana Jones, born into slavery in 1834, until the present day, including a veteran of WWII and a great-great-niece who was alive at the time.

He also had a keen interest in Beaufort County African-American heritage in general, and Mitchelville in particular. Recently he turned over to the Library his voluminous papers on the subject, which, when catalogued and indexed, promise to be a valuable addition to our archives.

Dr. Rose was the author also of *Black Roots in Southeastern Connecticut*, 1650-1900; Tapestry; Free Black Heads of Household in the New York State Federal Census, 1790-1830, and, published in April of this year, Generations: The WPA Ex-Slave Narrative Genealogical Database. Ari Wilkins, a partner with Dr. Rose in the Black Genesis Web site, said, "He was an accomplished researcher and lecturer and will be greatly missed."

President Linda Piekut Presents Lifetime Achiement Awards

At the April Volunteer Day, Linda Piekut made four Lifetime Achievement Awards. Two went to the our beloved Altstaetters, Gwen and Bill, who have been the lifeblood of the organization since its founding. Bill is famous for having served in every official capacity and some extra-official -- some more than once. Gwen

has served on the Board of Directors, managed the book store and public relations and, most recently, as chairman of the membership committee. She officially resigned as of the first of the year, but she is still very much part of the library.

Two others were recognized for their many years of service: Isobel Bittner, shown below, left, with Bill in

the old quarters of the Courtyard Building, and John Griffin, shown in 2005.

John, a native New Yorker, came to the Heritage Library in 1998, having served in the predecessor Genealogical Society of Hilton Head Island. Retired from NBC as Director of News-Technical Operations, he moved to Hilton Head in 1996.

From Linda's prepared remarks: John became interested in the Gullah culture on Hilton Head Island and has been instrumental in advancing the research of numerous native island families, and has the re-

spect of the Gullah community. He was awarded the Directors' Award twice, and headed a team from the Foundation making presentations at the annual meeting of the United States Colored Troops Association in October 2004 at Charleston, South Carolina...

In announcing Isobel's award, Linda said: Isobel Bitner has had a distinguished career in library science. She was born in Rugby, England, the next town over from the town where Esther was born. She earned her Master's Degree in History from Edinburgh University. She is a Chartered Librarian of the Library Association in London and has had a long career as a Reference Librarian in public, corporate and university libraries. She came to the United States in 1956 and joined the Heritage Library Foundation in 2000. In her years with the library, she has catalogued almost the entire collection of the library. Isobel also served on the Board, and was named Director of the Library in 2005. She announced to the officers at our staff meeting that she will be retiring at the end of April from her librarian duties. However, that doesn't mean she will be gone. She will be coming in on reduced hours to finish organizing of the Peeple's papers, a project that she would like to see through to the end.

The History Department

In February, we began weekly Historic Sites lectures on Tuesdays at 10:30 AM at the Library. We also resumed our weekly Fort Mitchel tours in conjunction with the Coastal Discovery Museum at 10:00 AM on March 7th.

With the help of Sondra Hardy and Dee Phillips, we created a new Power Point presentation on the His-

tory of Hilton Head Island, which has been very warmly received. Through the end of May, we have had 110 onsite attendees on our Tuesday morning history presentations. The presentation was also given to 47 attendees at the Spanish Wells Club on March 6 and to 115 members of the Sun City *On the Go Travel Club* on May 14.

We began the Fort Mitchel tours on March 7 and had

39 attendees through the end of May.

We will be working on several additional new presentations this year. We have created a 30-minute Historic Sites presentation which can be used in Hilton Head Island schools during the 350/30 celebration. Bill Altstaetter presented a lecture on the history of Spanish Wells Plantation to 42 members of the Spanish Wells Club on May 16. Sondra Hardy is creating a presentation on the "Role of Women in the History and Development of Hilton Head Island." We already have a booking for Sondra's new presentation at a Zonta Club meeting in September. We are also scheduled to do a presentation on the Battle of Savannah at the Spanish Wells Club in November.

We have begun a Marketing campaign to help publicize and create more interest in our programs among both Island residents and visitors. We will be making face-to-face visits to hotels and timeshares to meet the concierges and encourage them to recommend our programs to their guests.

We are involved in and working with the 350/30 Celebration committee and with the "People of Mitchelville," our Original Mitchelville Initiative. In preparation for the 350/30 celebration, we have been writing articles for *Hilton Head Monthly* magazine on different historic sites on the island.* We will also be preparing some Public Service Announcements (PSAs), 60-second and 90-second radio spots on our historic sites which will be aired by Monty Jett on his daily radio program on The Island, 93.5 FM and 1130 AM.

We appreciate the assistance and continued support of all the volunteers and officers of the Heritage Library Foundation.
