Chas. E. Pendleton was the fifth child born to his parents. He was reared in south Georgia and educated in the common schools. When quite young he engaged in the newspaper business with his father and remained with him until his death. In 1870, after his father's death, he took charge of the *Valdosta Times* and has been editor and proprietor of the same ever since. In 1882-83 he represented Lowndes County in the legislature. November 29, 1879, he was married to Miss Alice Peoples, daughter of Richard A. and Sarah (Camp) Peoples, of Valdosta, Ga. To this union are born five children, viz.: Catherine, May, Chas. E. Jr., Lucile and Virginia. Mr. Pendleton is a member of the Swedensborgian Church.



**OL. TYLER M. PEOPLES**, a prominent attorney of Lawrenceville, Ga., was born in Franklin County, Ga., March 19, 1838. His father, Wm. J. Peoples, an attorney by profession, was solicitor general of the western circuit of Georgia for a number of years, and was a member of the Whig party. He is said to have been a fine judge of law, but was not much of an orator, although he made some public speeches, and was very popular, both socially and professionally. He was born in South Carolina in 1810, died in 1865, and was a son of Henry Peoples, of South Carolina, who was of Scotch extraction, and a merchant by occupation.

The mother of the subject is Nancy (Lee) Peoples, a daughter of Samuel Lee of South Carolina, and is of Welsh descent. She was born in Georgia in 1817 and is still living.

Col. Tyler M. Peoples is the eldest of five living children, the others being Eugenia, Henry L., Carrie and Susan. He was taken to Gainesville, Ga., when but two years of age and received a good literary education from Emory College, Oxford, Ga. He then read law with his father, was admitted to the bar in March, 1859, and practiced his profession in Lawrenceville until 1861. He then organized a company of State troops for six months, and went out as captain. At the expiration of six months he took the company into the Confederate service as the Ninth Georgia artillery and served in the western army until after the battle of Chickamauga. He was then attached to General Longstreet's corps, and served in the army of northern Virginia until the close of the war, having acted as captain during the entire service. At the close of hostilities he returned to Lawrenceville, resumed his profession and practiced in all courts. The following year, 1866, he was elected judge of the county court of (Twinnet) County, and filled that position until the office was abolished. In 1875 he was elected to the State legislature from that county, served in the session of 1875-76, and took an active part on the judiciary and finance committees and acted as chairman on the committee of public printing. He was elected to the State senate from the thirty-fourth senatorial district in 1882, and while a member of that honorable body served as chairman of the penitentiary committee and as a

member of the judiciary and public printing committees. He purchased the *Gwinnett Herald* in 1872, and has since published it as a weekly Democratic organ. It has a circulation of about one thousand. In 1880 he was a delegate to the Cincinnati convention that nominated Hancock and English, and in 1888 he was a delegate to the national convention at St. Louis that nominated Cleveland and Thurman. He was a member of the State Democratic executive committee for six years.

He was married in 1865 to Miss Alice A. Winn, daughter of Major R. D. Winn, of Georgia. They are the parents of six children, namely: Ellen B., Wm. J., Lillie, Winn, Minnie and Archie.

Col. Peoples is a Master Mason, and he and wife are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church.



**T. PENDLETON, M. D.**, of Columbus, Ga., was born in Sparta, Ga., December 13, 1847, and is a son of Dr. E. M. and Sarah J. (Thomas) Pendleton. Dr. E. M. Pendleton was born in Elton, Ga., March 18, 1815, was a local Methodist minister, and died January 27, 1884. He was a son of C. N. Pendleton, a native of Colquhoun County, Va. Sarah J. (Thomas) Pendleton was born in Mount Zion, Ga., March 21, 1818, and was a daughter of Micaiah Thomas.

Dr. T. T. Pendleton is the eldest of a family of four living children, viz.: P. T., Wm. M., Susie F. and James C. He was educated at the common schools and at Emory College, Oxford, Ga. In July, 1861, he enlisted in the First Georgia

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
