

MILAM Family Records

Dear Myrtle,

Did I write you once before?
If I did not, I surely meant to.
Mr. Luther White has called
me asking about his grandma
Harris, saying he'd a letter from
you asking about her, and that
you had a letter of inquiry from
a Kinsman in So. Car. Dear me!
Myrtle, I do hope this will be a
break-through over dear Milam
line. Ofest your great grand-
mother Martha (William) Harris,
wife of Jim H. (or C. The Census gives (William Coleman Harris)
C.; but the Masonic tombstone at
Locust Creek in the Milam plot gives
S. which I believe Farrell) Harris,
was a sister to my gr. gr. fa.,
Thomas Ferrill or Farrell Milam;
both children of Clementine Milam
& ca 1781-1810, probably Halifax
Co.

I have been researching over Milam's
for nearly 12 years now. Goodspeed's
History of N.W. Ark. 1889 gave
biographical sections of all
Thomas J. Milam, Sr.'s children.

Thomas F. Milam, Orderly
Sergeant in Confederate Army
died at a Van Buren hosp.
Mar. 14, 1862 after he & son's
Lucas Coleman (my gr. fa) & Thomas
F. Jr. had enlisted in Arbuckle
Division at Ft. Smith Nov. 10, 1871.
Thomas F. Jr. missed each
roll call after Dec. He is
buried in Conf. Cemetery there at
Van Buren; but we can't find
grave or record of location.
If we could locate, would
put a Govt tombstone at
grave marker. I have tried,
also, to get state to clean up
the cemetery. Farbes promised
to investigate, but nothing
was done. Maybe if you
have time, you could
ask about records, as
there should be records of
burials there. No one else
in the family will help me do
any way and think me crazy for
being interested in dead people espe-
cially Curtis. I have Mama nearly 94 to
care for and am tired down & can't
do my personal research - just write!

but I did not find the Harris family included. Maybe it was because Martha was not able as the cost was \$25⁰⁰, so Papa said, for each biography and then that entitled each donor to receive a book. Your library has this. Go see Mrs. Livinburne, a Crawford Co. Historian and a good one who has many old books in her possession. She has two books which discuss the McLains. I have been told that she has one book which definitely says Colenau McLain was son of John McLain. This would be John McLain, Jr. b. at Lynchburg, Brunswick Co. Va. Dec. 24, 1753, I believe as I'm hurrying from memory - John, Jr. was a soldier in the Rev. throughout the Rev. War, and was at Valley Forge & crossed the Delaware with Washington's group when they took Trent's Town, N.J. (Trenton, N.J. now). John was a pensioner and in his pension application gave exact birthdate, place of residence & Rev. service. He carried his Bible with him during the war & wrote his itinerary (?) & diary in the fly-leaves. I am told this.

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Bible is preserved somewhere.
John, Jr. died in Madison Co. Ala.
1837 or 9. His entire War record
may be had from the National
Archives, Washington, D. C. for
a dollar or two. I have Colenso's
War of 1812 service in S. C. But
he took Bounty Land for service
and did not give much personal
info. except proof of military
service. Also served 1839 in Indian War in Florida.

Thomas J. Milam was b. 1810 in
Lawrence Co., S. C. but Colenso was
not in 1810 Census of Lawrence Co. S. C.
I believe Colenso Milam was son
of Thomas Milam, younger brother
to John, Jr. who were sons of John
Milam, Sr. Other sons were Samuel,
Bartlett, Gerrill, Benjamin, and James.

* John Milam, Sr. was son of Samuel
Milam and Martha Gardner who
were married in ~~the~~ Augusta (?) Co.
Ga. Sept 8, 1724 & John was b. 1725.
Other sons of Samuel & Martha
were Thomas who marr. Mary
Adams, relative to Pres. John Adams,
and Archibald who marr. Mary
Wilson, who were parents of.

Moses Scott Milam who married
Elizabeth (Patty) Boyd in Bedford Co. Va.
& were parents of Benjamin ^{Rush} Milam
of Alabama fame. Moses S. Milam
was also a Rev. soldier & took Bounty
land in Ky. where he moved about

1795. I have a copy of a letter
written by Moses' Grandson 1890
giving all his children.

Samuel Mclam, Jr. had a brother
John & both are on record in Va.
1715 when their name was spelled
Mileham. Later the eh were dropped
as they were silent in pronunciation.

I have found no one who
has a record of their passage
into Va. But Hotten's List of
Persons of renown gives
one John Mileham who
died in Elizabeth City 1623.

Since women & wives were
brought into Va. 1619, this
John could have had a wife
& chil. Then there were a
John and Benjamin Mylom
in Mass. by 1623. I have a
list with birthdates of all their
chil. This is from Pope's work.

Thomas Mclam & Mary Adams had
a son Benjamin Mclam who marr'd
Elizabeth Jackson, daug. of David &
Mary Jackson. He became a
Rev. prisoner of the British & when
the Continentals stormed Guilford

Court House, N.C. June 16, 1781,
the British cruelly shot hundreds
of these Continental soldiers (prisoners)
among whom was Benjamin Mclam.

He & Eliz. had 7 known chil. An older
sister of Eliz. Anne Jackson had

married a John Wilson whose
will of 1779 proves him to
have been a very wealthy
man with his estate inventoried
at £100,000 which counting a
pound (£) at \$5 would be \$2,000,000, today.
I have the marriage of some of their
ch. w. which says, dcl. of Anne, or
son of Anne Wilson.

I think our Col. James Wilson was son
^{son of John son of Samuel} of Thomas by his 1st wife. In 1785 Halifax Co.
Twp Dist Thomas Wilson had 3 in family -
no dwelling, but one other building.
I believe he was a widower then
with 2 ch. & had a slave caring
for his ch. living in this other
building. June 12, 1786 his execs.

Elizabeth Talbert (TALBERT) in
Halifax Co. Va. In 1790 he was
in Laurens Co., with bros. John,
& Benj. & he had 2 sons - 16 & 3
females in family. I have him
1800 & 1810 & he had a very large
family. Coleman sold ^{Laurens Co. Va.} 24 A.
of land on Duncan Creek to Oswald
Beavers in 1819 for \$2. I have a
photostat copy of the deed he gave.
That was the same year John Jr.
removed to Madison Co. Ala. from
Laurens Co. S. C. Ala. has no 1820

census, but I do not have the
Tenn. State. But I believe Thomas J.
Coleman, & John, Jr. removed from
this wagon train west; but no
proof as of yet. But if they went
through many Indian lands, they
had to have passports, records of
which are preserved. So all
possible proofs have not been
researched.

The first Census I find of
Coleman was in Franklin Co.
Middle Tenn. 1830. Page 80.

2 males - 5; 1 m. 5-10; 1 m. 10-15; 1 m. 15-20
and 1 m. 40-50, the last being Coleman
& the eldest son being Thomas J., my
gt. gr. fa. who married Margaret
Amanda Bell, daug. of James and Margaret
(Smith) Bell, in 1831 in Franklin Co. Tenn.
The 2nd boy was William A. Miller
who was married in 1840 & living next
door to Coleman in Coffee Co. Tenn.
Coleman's females¹⁸³⁰, were 1 f. 5-10
(Martha); 1 f. 10-15 (Elizabeth b. 1818);
1 f. 30-40. I think this was Coleman's
2nd wife as no wife released her
dower right in his deed which he
painfully (?) signed COAL MABA, 1819
Afterwards he signed with an "X"
and witnessed. In 1840 Coleman's
wife was dead & he had another
daug. 5-10 which would be Sarah
living with Elizabeth & Charles

1850.7

Sansom both 32 & Sarah 13,
but should have been 18,
as she married a Gammill
very wealthy at that time but
old enough for her father - I
have census of her family 1870.

Hardin Co., Tenn.

I have ¹⁸⁵⁰ census of Harris &
Milam in Hardin Co. E. Tenn.
where they moved 1841 or 2. Martha
& Wm ^{Harris} had 4 chd. ¹⁸⁵⁹ - third. Eliz. ^{had} no
chd. Alfred P. Milam, 21 was
living with Martha. Ashford ⁽³⁰⁾
and Rosa Milam lived near.
I think both were sons of [possibly
Coleman who had a new wife]
younger than most of his chd. &
was rearing a new family. He
had by this last wife Jane who
was possibly a sister to Wm L.
Harris & dad. of John & Jewel Harris,
as they live almost next door,
to the ^{John} Harris family; son Jesse L. Milam
& 5 daughters - Dickey Ann, Amanda,
Rachel, Dorcas C., & ? (I forgot
the other). Has this lady a date of
one of Coleman's children by No!
Jane? I have written Hardin Co.
many times, but could locate only
one Mrs. Milam who never answered
my letters).

I forgot to say 1st. name
below Coleman, 1830 was
Wm McBride

1M-5; 1M20-30:: 1f. 20-30, this
woman, I believe to have been
a Milam. All McBrides moved on
to Hardin Co.

3rd. name below Coleman was
Elizabeth Milam

1M5-10; 1M15-20:: 1f 30-40: 1f 60-70 (Elizabeth)
Evidently Thomas was dead now
& Eliz. had a dau. or dau.-in-law,
& her 2 sons with her or the older
son could have been hers.

On page 79 was John Milam
1M5-10; 1M30-40:: 3f-5; 1f 10-15; 1f 30-40.

Thomas definitely had a son John,
as did John McClark, Jr. who had
a John Milam, III. who died in Pontotoc
Co. Miss. Thomas's John got into
Court in Lawrence over a debt
& records said "John Milam,
son of Thomas, Boyee! they cleaned
him out - took his bed, dishes, cook
pot, and even his pig trough."

He lived about 150 years too
soon. Today he could pay on
installment & buy himself rich.

I talked with the Shaws
who grew up with Aunt Martha
in their home as she died 1922,
I believe. But they did not know

the names of her brothers & sisters). Ella said she remembered Grandma spoke of a brother)

Pleasant and sister Sarah. I found one Pleasant Colossal Milam who married in Mo., moved to Texas Co., Ark., & died in La. as relatively a young man. I wrote his great grand daughter, but we could prove nothing. In 1850 he gave his birthplace as Ga.

born Ga. 1828

& age 22 -

I know this is rambling, but it is full of years of research and several hundred dollars invested in research -

That I want is this lady's name who is a double cousin to Martha Harris's children.

Dear Myrtle,

Mr. White sent your letter on to me yest. As soon as I found she was Fannie (McKenzie) Miller's niece, I knew she had to be a McKenzie for Fannie was the only daughter of Abe and Mary (Dewitt) McKenzie. So this morn. I called Jim McKenzie in Ogallala and he told me she is Cora, his brother Alec's daughter and that her mother was a Shelby. I do not know whether her mother was grand daughter of Sarah ("Sally") or ~~Ellen~~ of Ellen. If she said double cousin, she was mixed up. Where the double comes in is that the 2 Shelby men and the 2 Harris girls were brothers and sisters. You remember Bradley who married Gertrude Dean and Millard Shelby who married Bessie Bearder? These boys were grandsons of one of those couples, I can't say which. I might manage to get Millard's address in Kansas City and find out. I do know these boys' mother was a Pruitt and sister to Rev. Hudson's wife and James Monroe Milam's widow, the latter Bertha Milam, still living but blind for many years. Bradley Shelby lived in Calif.

(Jane Harris married ?
Halden, grandfather of Leon
& Curtis Halden as her 3rd
husband.)

Bradley told me once where I
was just a girl of about 13 or
14 that he was my cousin. I
laughed at him, but he said
that his great grandma was a
Milam. If I had become serious
then and gone to see ~~my~~ Aunt
Martha Harris, I could have
got Coleman Milam's entire
family; wives, children, parents,
and maybe grandparents.

But I doubt if this girl
can help me unless she is
willing to hire researchers
to seek for records of
this family. She could try
her.
