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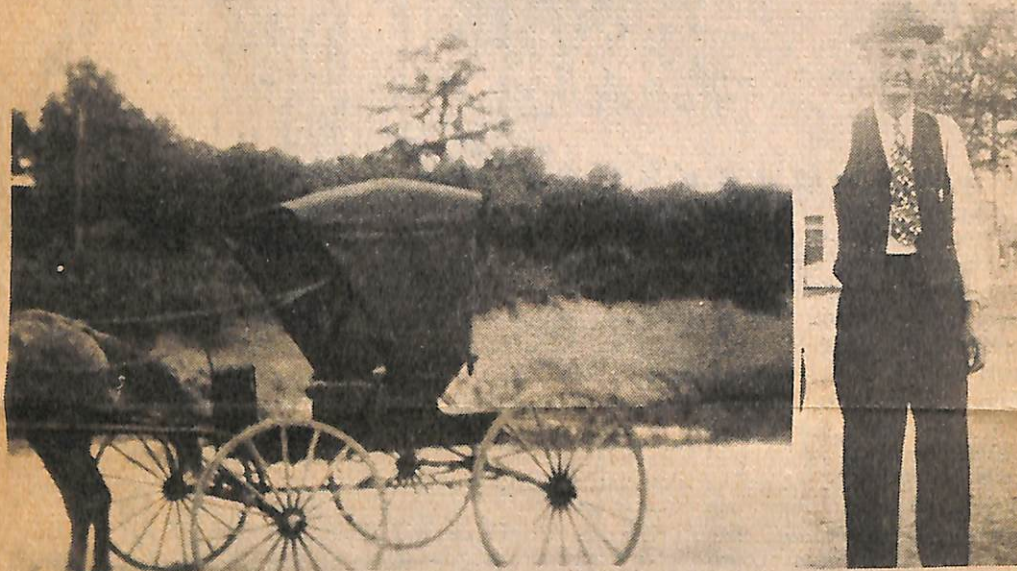

Horse And Buggy To Air - conditioned Olds

The small frame building at 14 Third St. West in Estill has the distinction of being one of the oldest in town and of having a story to tell which would defy the imaginations of those of the younger generations. Built in 1909 by the young Dr. Johnston Peeples, just out of medical school, and serving as base for his 50 year medical practice, it has just been given a new lease on life by the new owner, the Reverend Clarence Fennell, who with his daughter, Mrs. Delores Strong, operates The Estill Fabric Center there. They are pleased to have this excellent location for their business, having operated it successfully for seven years and hoping to be there for many more.

have to give the \$2.00 back to the patient to pay for the medicine!

He traveled approximately 100 miles every 24 hours on house calls, charging \$3.00 for a call within five miles radius, \$5.00 for one farther away. He delivered many, many babies, always in the home unless an emergency called for an office delivery, charging \$25.00, which was increased to \$50.00 only some time after WW II. If paid in cash, he frequently refunded \$5.00 to the patient for the privilege of naming the baby

He did not keep a ledger, only a stick file on the wall, and as a result had no ac-

counts receivable at his death.

Anecdotes about Dr. Peeples and the practical jokes he and his friends played on each other would fill a thick book if written down, bringing back to those who knew him the memory of his wonderful sense of the ridiculous and the fun he got out of every-day living. His "down-home" medical practice meant much to untold numbers in this area, and his off-beat wit brought chuckles to all he touched, young and old alike.

April 15, which is Easter Sunday and the date of the Lawtonville Cemetery dinner, marks the 20th anniversary of Dr. Peeples' death. His wife, Mahala Folk Peeples, died January 25, 1978. Dr. Peeples has one surviving brother, C.L. Peeples, and one surviving sister, Mrs. C.F. Brewton, both of Estill. Mrs. Peeples has one surviving sister, Mrs. Robert R. Peeples, also of Estill. Dr. and Mrs. Peeples reared six children, all of whom are living, only two in Hampton County: Otis in Estill and Barney in Hampton. The others are Johnston in Columbia, Charley in Augusta, Ga., Mahala in Orlando, Fla., and Paul in Greer.

During 50 years of practice Dr. Peeples treated patients over an area that extended from Tillman to Fairfax and from the Savannah River to Grays and beyond. His mode of travel ranged from a horse and buggy all the way to an air-conditioned Olds, one of the first air-conditioned cars in Hampton County.

Dr. Peeples' medical practice was unusual in many ways. His wife, lovingly known as "Miss" Mahala, was not a trained nurse, but was an excellent office nurse, the only one he ever had. His \$2.00 office fee included diagnosis, treatment, and medicine. He never wrote a prescription, saying that if he did, he would

Decision Delayed by Council On Proposed Use of Election Machines for Balloting Here

Voting machines for Columbia elections, as recommended by the city board of election commissioners and advocated by Councilman Lester L. Bates, were referred to the city attorney, Glenn O. Schultz, for further investigation, at city council meeting yesterday.

Although the councilmen and Mayor Fred D. Marshall agreed that anything which would make elections more honest was admirable, hesitancy was shown on their part to invest \$32,500 in the 25 machines deemed necessary for Columbia by the election board. The legality of the city's purchasing these machines was also questioned, and the possibility of renting instead of buying the machines was mentioned.

Councilman Bates, who had proposed some months ago that voting machines be installed here, maintained that they would "not be an expense to the city, but to the candidates," and pointed out that the "city could pay over a period of ten years."

Councilman Fred Mays asked that council be given more specific details as to the precise number of clerks and managers which could be dispensed with, and an estimate of the money that would be saved. According to the letter of recommendation from the election board, some of the expense of elections would be saved the city

matter should be turned over to the city attorney for further conference with the election board. Mr. Bates was appointed to confer with the group also, and council agreed.

Councilman Farr advocated widening some of Columbia's narrow streets in the metropolitan section by narrowing the sidewalks. He maintained that traffic would be speeded up about 33 per cent, and said, "There is no other way to handle the extraordinary traffic situation in Columbia, which under present conditions, is getting worse." This would be in addition to the main trunk lines, which are already under survey by the city.

If the streets are properly widened it will create angle parking, and four-way traffic, he said. Mayor Marshall pointed out that the \$27,000 federal grant is intended to take care of the entire situation, and that if necessary to have more money, we'll ask for it."

Douglas McKay, Sr., appeared before council to ask if the acquiescence of council had been given concerning the city's taking over the water and sewage system of Kilbourne Heights, when and if this suburb should be incorporated into Columbia. Decision was promised within the next two weeks.

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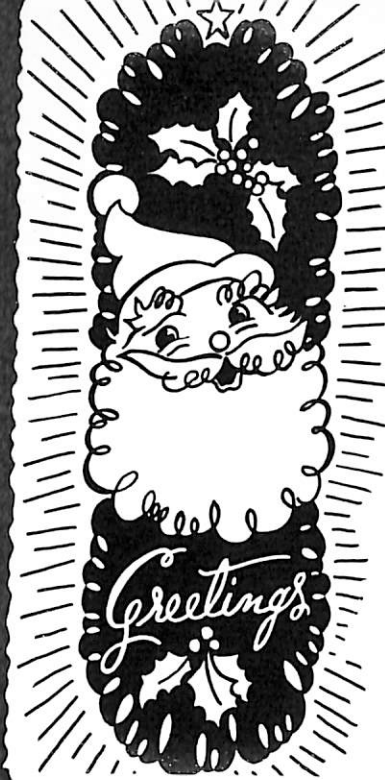

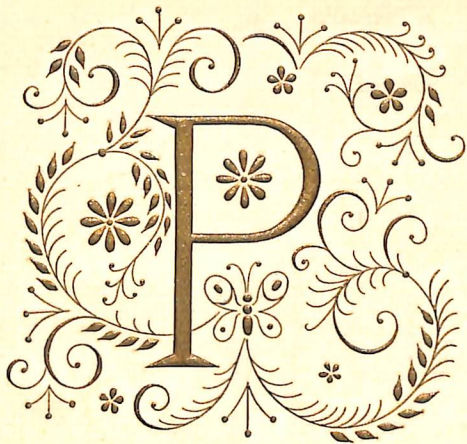
