Dear Robert,

Forgive me for not replying to your letter of February 29, sooner. Sometimes I get caught up in so much activity that I fail to fully discharge all of my responsibilities. I am grateful for your letter and the genealogical notes of Anne Bradbury Peebles.

I do not know any of the Peeples family of Camden County. I have met an E. W. Peeples who operates a Texaco Station at Kingsland and have tried to talk to him about the family. He had been friendly, but showed little interest. I have written to several Peepleses in Camden Co. and have had none to reply. I did receive a letter from Mrs. J. W. Bailey of St. Mary's whose husband is a Peeples descendant. Most people are either interested in their past or their future so, perhaps the Peepleses of Camden Co. are interested in their future. In any event, it was indeed good to hear from a Peeples.

I have done historical research for a number of years and have written many historical articles. Genealogical research is much more difficult. It is not just hunting a needle in a hay stack, even the haystacks are hard to find. There has been some reluntance on my part to seek out my "ancestors of record". Naturally, I have been curious, but there didn't seem to be a starting point, and no one seems to know anything. Anne B. Peebles book and your letter ended all that. However, there has been another reason for my reluctance, I have had no desire to bask in artificial reflected glory of long dead ancestors. My objective is to discover who they were and what kind of people they were. In other words, I would like to construct a little flesh and blood around the statistics. You mentioned that the Peeples stock is excellent and as far as I know this is true. I might add though, that in this branch of the family there are a few colorful twigs. Dr. William Lewis Peeples had a son, William, Jr., who created enough material in his lifetime to fill a novel.

Strong family tradition has been difficult for me to evaluate. I note that Anne B. Peebles placed considerable faith in it. This one is slightly different from the four brother moving to South Carolina tradition. There were susposed to be three brothers in South Carolina and one is susposed to have moved to Georgia, one moved West and the other remained in South Carolina. This might indicate that John Peeples, Jr., son of John of Beaufort, was the father of Isham of Camden. However, this would make Isham of Camden the first Isham in his line which seems unlikely to me. Isham of Camden's first son was named John Alexander, but was known as Alex which would indicate that there might have been another John Peeples at the time, John, Jr., who people might have confused with John Alexander if the middle name had not been used. Two of Isham of Camden's sons, John Alexander and William Lewis, named sons John. As far as we know Isham of Camden was not a "Jr.". At least, the record does not so indicate. Since he was not a "Jr." there is a strong possibility that his grandfather was named Isham. In any event, the best candidate for hisgrandfather would be Isham of Beaufort. If, however, Isham of Beaufort was his grandfather, John, Jr. can not be his father.

The notes of Anna B. Peebles indicate she thought that Henry, son of Isham of Beaufort, was the father of Isham of Camden. This is a strong possibility. Mrs. Bailey of St. Mary's indicated in her letter that her husband's family tradition was a "Henry" was the father of the Camden Co. Peeples clan. Isham of Camden had a son named George Henry and he was known as G. Henry. He was born 12 years after his brother John Alexander and perhaps he was named after his grandfather, Henry, who by this time could have been dead, thus eliminating a conflict in names. Isham of Beaufort's wife was named Elizabeth and Isham of Camden had a daughter named Elizabeth. Appearently, there is little know about Henry, son of Isham of Beaufort. Anna's book mentioned who he married, but I wound wonder where she located this information and where Henry was married. If you will notice, in my notes, I have located a Henry Peebles in Warren County, Georgia. I would not say this Henry is who was the son of Isham of Beaufort, but I can not properly place his among the Warren Co. branch in Anna's book.

The census records indicate Isham of Camden was born in Georgia, only one census indicates Camden Co. He could have been born in Warren Co. How, ever, this Henry in Warren Co. seem to have been a man of wealth and this fact doesn't really fit what I know about Isham of Camden. If Isham of Camden's father was Henry, son of Isham of Beaufort, there is a good chance he moved to Camden Co. before Isham of Camden was born. But if so, what happened to him? His other children? Are there files of old newspapers for St. Mary's, Savannah, Beaufort, Charleston, etc.? In Florida old newspapers are on microfilm at the University of Florida. Another thought, Isham of Camden's name might have been Isham Henry. William Lewis Peeples named a son Isham H.

You have been doing genealogical research much logger than I have and I'm sure you know much better than I what records are available and what are not. I also realize the problem in the South where many court houses have been burned. However, there is one possible source of information that might not have been checked. A law book company publishes a digest of supreme court cases for the states of Georgia, S. C., N. C., Va. The book is called the Southeastern Reporter. This service started in 1887 and continues. Prior to the publication of this book, each state had its own publication, ours is called the Florida Report. I don't know what the Ga. and S. C. publications are called, but they contain all cases reaching the supreme court in each state. Most law offices would have a set of the publication.

My guess is that L. A. Peeples was Capt. Lodowick A. Peeples, Ephæaim Peeples was Capt. Lodowick A. Peeples' brother and A. M. Peeples was Capt. Lodowick's brother. I believe all three brothers lived in Camden County at one time or another, and they all seemed to be in some way related to Isham of Camden. Perhaps, they were Isham's first cousins with a common grandfather, Isham of Beaufort. At this point I am inclined to believe Isham, Sr. of Beaufort was Isham of Camden's grandfather and that Henry, Thomas or James was his father, and I tend to lean toward Henry.

Some of my other ancestors include Langley Bryant of St. Mary's, Jeremiah Johns of Camden Co., and the Tutens of Beaufort Dist. I can only find two foreigners and they are both on my mother's side of the family. One is

the Sweetser family of Massachusetts, but, it least they have lived in the South for about a 100 years, and the other, is the Noda family from the Canary Islands, but they too, have lived in Florida for about a 100 years. Then I had to ruin it all by marrying a girl from New Jersey.

I'll now get to work on additional research and maybe I can find who Isham's father was. And more inportant, at least to me, maybe I'll discover the personalities of all these people.

Again, many thanks for your help and incouragement.

Dear Robert:

The information on the Peeples's chart showing a William Peeples as marrying "Ann Eliza" came from the book on the Peebles-Peeples family. We don't know if he had children and we don't have dates.

According to the Manning's records of Barnwell County, the tombstone Red Hill in Cometery shows "Marie Louise" Peeples, wife of William Woodbury Moore, two children survived.

> We do not have a copy of Our Family Circle by cousin Annie Miller (Is she living?). I'm enclosing a check for \$25.00 for one. Also, please send us a copy of Tales of Ante Bellum Hilton Head Island. I'm sure we'll enjoy having both.

> I have so far been unable to find Isabella Mew and her parents in the 1850 S.C. Census. Maybe I need to go to Georgia. Any help you can give me on this would be deeply ap preciated.

I'm glad you have a copy of Rev. M.M. Brabham's book about the Buford's Bridge people. I have only a xerox copy. Incidentally, it was not John Peter Whiester who slew his father, but his twin brother, William Henry - a terrible human tradgedy. I've read the write-up of the whole thing in the old Barnwell newspapers.

I have been unable to secure a copy of the reprint of the radio talk (WIS -Columbia, S.C.) given Nov. 10, 1935 by Mr. W. P. Houseal, titled Famous Churches of the Palmetto State. I found a reference to it in the unpublished thesis. German Churches in S.C. Prior to 1787, by Rev. Marion W. Clark. In his thesis he says John Adam Epting and his group (including my Johannes Nicholas Priester, im. to S.C. 1749), "landed in Baltimore, made a tedious journey through the Shenandoah Valley of Va. to Rowan County, N.C., where they stayed for over a year at the earlier Organ Church settlement near the banks of the Catawba River. From there, having received "the necessaries of life, with hospitality notable for German people," they pushed on southward along the course of the Catawba. "eventually starting at Crimis Creek in present-day Newthe Catawba, " eventually stopping at Crim's Creek in present-day Newberry County, S.C.

Besides the check, I'm also enclosing Bill's and my lineage charts which I thought you might be interested in. I have accumulated xerox mopies of many old legal documents in compiling these.

Please see if you can help me find Isabella's parents. She was probably a granddaughter of either McKamie or John Mew. is sometimes spelled Mmeares." Let me know if you spot errors.



Dear Dr. Peeples,

I began trimming a few obituaries I had torn from papers to put in my file this morning and saw the one for Mr. Perry Brannen. I was surprised to notice his wife had been a Peeples. It reminded me I had not sent the check for my book. I called her to tell her about the book on the off-chance she did not know you had had it reprinted. We both had stopped up noses and scratchy throats but she was very nice. I believe she might want to buy copies for her sons. I gave her your phone number. In the meantime, I am sending my check now before you sell out!

I received the charts on your wife and I hope one of these days to get time to play with it a while. It seems my entire life is controlled by others and some of the things I enjoy get put aside. As you probably have guessed I thoroughly enjoy the history of families even if they are not my own. However, for the first time I was looking through the index of the Peeples book and was amazed to find so many family names on Mamma's and Dad's side! I dare not look them up or I won't be able to lay the book down.

I might of mentioned I was a Branch Chief in the Corps of Engineers at the time of my retirement. For some reason my group (retired and the ones still working) like to meet once a year for a reunion. I am working (bad cold notwithstanding) on the one coming up on Saturday. Fortunately I kept my membership in the Officers' Club so I can get most of the work done for me. We are about to run out of places to have these reunions. We try to keep the price down because some have to come from their new homes away from Savannah such as Augusta and Summerville, quite a trek for us old ladies, and these ladies are older than I.

Grayson Ward (my Ulmer connection) and I drove over to see Mary Rentz and had a nice visit. She had a clipping from a Church paper about my Great Grandfather (Joseph Reid Youmans) and my Great Grandmother (Janette Amanda Zahler). She shared. She also had a list of the Colleton County men who served in the Civil War which included quite a few family names. I am convinced people have valuable information if we could stir them up a bit more. That is one of the major functions of our research group: to stir them up! We admit Sherman did a lot of damage but we believe some have papers of value if they would share. My local Zahler (Clara) has shared. Before her brother died I persuaded him to donate his old guns to the museum but he did not get a receipt and I am afraid an individual who came out to get them never got them to the museum. So never again will I recommend donating anything but copies. They don't blame me, however. I have asked some people who are involved with the museum to do what they can to find out what happened. But you aren't concerned with my stupidity since I don't have all that much Peeples blood so let me close for now and get the letter off before I forget again.

I got your name and address from Sonya Boree via the PRODIGY Service (an electronic bulletin board and mail service). She referred me to you as one who could tell me how to purchase the book by Ann Bradbury Peebles entitled, Peebles Ante 1600-1962. Please advise me whether the book is available and what it costs.

Also, are you familiar with a book by Edythe R. Whittey entitled, Peebles Family of VA, NC, KY, IL, MO, Etc.? I wonder if it's useful, where to obtain it, and what is it's cost.

As a possible distant relative of yours, I offer the following information - as you will no doubt notice, this field is new to me.

My patrilineal great-grandfather was Joseph Peeples (b. June 1848). The census of 13 Jun 1900 has him and wife, Annie (b. Apr. 1851) living in 2nd Precinct of Baltimore County, MD with five of their children: James (b. Dec. 1874); Mary E. (b. Jan. 1879); Arlindo T. (b. Dec. 1880); Olivia (b. Apr. 1887); and Paul F. (b. March, 1889). According to the census, all were born in North Carolina, as were the mothers and fathers of both Joseph and Annie. Joseph and Annie were married 28 years as of 1900. Altogether, Annie had given birth to 10 children, of whom eight were alive in 1900.

Joseph's son, Arlindo Thornwell Peeples, was my father's father. Arlindo's place of birth is listed on my father's birth certificate as South Carolina (v. NC on 1900 census).

Apparently, upon entering the military, Arlindo's name was inadvertently changed to "Orlando" T. Peeples (source: pension record filed 26 March 1926). The name, Orlando, was given my father, and was then passed to boys of my generation as a middle name. Arlindo was said to be a colorful character who was a U.S Soldier in 1900 (and beyond); who fought alongside Teddy Roosevelt; who later became an ordained minister (denomination unknown); and who played guitar, mandolin, and fiddle.

Arlindo married Ethel Mabel Harrison (her second marriage) and they had three sons and two daughters: Emmet (died shortly after birth); Marie; Alice; Joseph Hamilton; and Orlando Franklin (my father).
