Dear Rebert,

I thank you for the lean of the booklet "Folks In America". It contains some information on the descendants of George Michael Folk (1808 - 1852) which I did not have. During her later years my mether spent considerable time, while visiting the Low Country, in gathering data on the descendants of Jacob Folk (1772 - 1845) who settled in Colleton County. I note that all of her data concerning the descendants of George Michael is included in the booklet.

Up-to-date data on the descendants of John Francis Folk would be greatly appreciated. However, I should mention that my records will not show female lines extended beyond the point of the marriage of a Folk female into a family of another name. To make such extension would require more time than I now have remaining to me as a life-portion; and this applies also to the forty or fifty other families on which I am endeavoring to compile records. You may pass the word along concerning my efforts regarding the Folk family, but please emphasize the point that my time is too limited for correspondence in this connection.

Captain William Copeland. However, he evidently is the same person of that name and rank whose record of revolutionary service and pension is contained in File S-17889 at the National Archives, Washington, D.C. The said file shows that he was bern in County Dewn, Ireland, in 1753; came to America (South Carolina) when about 16 years of age; lived in York District, S.C., during the Revolutionary War; later moved to Greenville District, S.C.; and afterwards moved to Pendleton District (new Pickens County and Anderson County), S.C. The division of Pendleton District left him in Pickens County, where he was living in 1833. He evidently was not related to our Jacob Copeland, at least not through any immediate common ancester.

I am serry not to have any information on the Platts family. One Mrs. Platt (widow) is listed on page 35 of the 1790 census (printed edition) for Charleston District, St. Barthelemes Parish (nee Colleton County), S.C., as head of a family consisting of 2 males under 16 years of age and 2 females. It is likely that this Mrs. Platt was the ancestress of Mary Elizabeth Platts (1811 - 1836) and Mahala Elizabeth Platts (1829 - 1897).

In the Council Journals of Colonial South Carolina, "The petition of Faits Soigeler shows that he came from Retterdam (Holland) to South Carolina. He has a wife and 5 children (2 bound out, and the others being John George, aged 21 years; Nicholas, aged 18 years; and Jacob, aged 13 years) in right of which he prays for a grant of 250 acres of land". The petition was read and approved on 15 March 1753; and the grant to him (Faitz, also Faits, Seigler) was signed on 3 September 1754. As to the 2 children who were "bound out", as mentioned in the said petition, the lack of other information concerning them seemingly points these out as being William (lived in Charleston, S.C., in 1790) and Michael (our ancestor; lived in Charleston, S.C., in 1790). If Michael was a son of Faits / Faits/ Fritz (or Frederick Zeigler, as we shall call him) he apparently was born not later than 1745.

The land (250 acres) granted to Frederick Zeigler was situated on Mine Branch above Amelia Township in Berkley County?; - that is, on a branch of the Congarde River cither in the lower part of the present Lexingten County or in the upper part of the present Calboun County, in South Carolina. On 15 May 1758 the grant was delivered to Christopher Guenlen, which indicates that Frederick did not settle on the said land; and, since no subsequent mention is found of him, it appears probable that he died before 15 May 1758. He is not listed in the 1790 census for South Carolina.

Michael Zeigler (b. Ca. 1745; d. 1809) served with the Americans against the British and Teries during the Revelutionary War, as is shown by records in the State Archives at Columbia, S.C., and in the National Archives at Washington, B.C. According to family traditions he was twice married, the first wife weing Martha Piquet (Picet) and the second wife being Mrs. Mary Maxwell ?. My mether (b. 1864) many times stated that her mether. Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Fell (b. 1835). Proquently said that Martha Meldred Zeigher (b. 2 Dec. 1815; d. 19 June 1858) was named "Martha" in hener of her grandmether Zeigler, and that the Piquet (Picet) family came to South Carelina from Paris, France. She thought the spelling of the family name was as is written herein, but was not absolutely certain; however, the name was presenaced as though the spalling were "Pee-ke". The second wife died in 1838 and her estate was administered by James W. Maxwell who apparently was a sen by her first marriage. It is family tradition, handed down among the descendants of a prother (Henry Menree Zeigler) of Martha Meldred, that the second wife was a widow when ahe married Michael Zeigler. One of the sons of Michael and Martha Zeigler was Jacob Zeigler.

Jacob Zeigler (b. 10 Aug. 1782; d. 28 Aug. 1838) married (1) Mary /"Pelly during or about 1803. She died in 1804/5, leaving so known issue surviving her. A complaint filed in court in 1811 shows her name as MMary", while a letter written by one of her nephews in a later year shows that she was commenty known as "Pelly".

In 1805 Jacob Zeigler married Miss Ann Daniel (b. 24 June 1791; d. 7 Dec. 1861).

daughter of James and Ann Daniel, who was the mether of all his known children.

Family bible records and the tembsteme at her grave, as well as consus and other official records, show her given name as "Ann". Some family bible records compiled Shawar after her death erroneously show her maiden name to be the same as the surname of born Ann her mether's first husband. The mether was a widewed lady when she married James Daniel. One of the daughters of Jacob and Ann Zeigler was Martha Meldred Zeigler.

Martha Meldred Zeigler (b. 2 Dec. 1815; d. 18 June 1858) married (1), on 1 January 1832. Jehannes /"John" Weissinger (b. 20 Mar. 1801; d. 21 Dec. 1843) and (2), about 1845/6, Henry Hutte (b. ca. 1815; d. 12 Apr. 1865). One of the daughters of Jehannes /"John" and Martha Meldred Weissinger was Elizabeth Ann Weissinger (b. 18 Nev. 1833; d. 29 Jan. 1904) whe, on 23 December 1858, married Jacob Levi Felk.

I knew mething of the Piquet (Picet) family beyond the tradition concerning the first wife of Michael Zeigler, as previously mentioned herein. In 1703, 1704, and 1705 one Michael Picquett (also Piqued and Pequett) obtained warrants for lands in old Craven County, S.C., and "took up large tracts on the Santoe (River)". I expressed my epinion to you that he might have been an ancester of Martha Piquet (Picet), assuming that the varied forms of spelling apply to the same family name. In 1705 one John Abraham Mette also took up lands "on the Santoe", and it is stated of him that "Mette was a Huguenet". Michael Picquett (etc.) doubtless also was a Huguenet.

Dear Rebert,

Your copy of the John Francis Folk material is returned herewith, together with the transcript of records from the bible of Jacob Levi Folk and the letter (1958) from William Folk. I thank you for permitting me to examine all of these.

All of the thirteen heads of Zeigler (etc. - including Sugler) families listed in the 1790 census for South Carolina were not descendants of Frederick (Faitz) Zeigler. Some of them were descendants of other immigrants who also came to South Carolina prior to the Revolutionary War. I have not learned the relationship (if any) between Frederick and the said other immigrants.

There are conflict, confusion, and error in some of the accounts (both printed and unprinted) of the Daniel families in South Carolina prior to 1800. It seems to be certain that our James Daniel was neither a descendant of Governor Robert Daniel nor a descendant of John Daniel who is said to have married Drucilla Harrison (two other printed references show her name as Priscilla Harrison), daughter of Benjamin Harrison who was a signer of the Declaration of Independence. There was a William Daniel who settled near Bamberg?, S.C., but I have not found a single authentic document to support the story that he had 14 children. The same story is recited concerning a William Daniel who died (1796) in Kershaw County, S.C.; however, one writer states that he had 13 children while another writer states that he had 12 children - (14, 13, or 12, - take your choice). The will of William Daniel (O'Daniel) who died (1796) in Kershaw County mentions only 7 children.

Our James Daniel was one of the sons of the William Daniel (O'Daniel) who died in Kershaw County in 1796. William's will (4 Nev. 1795 - 9 Nev. 1796) names his children (order of birth not known) - Sarah Irvin (wife of James Irvin), David, Josiah, Sem, James, Mary, and William. His wife evidently died before the will was made. It appears that the father was bern in Virginia about 1732 and came to South Carolina, as early as 1754, with brothers John and James. The brother John evidently was the father of John, Jr. (md. Priscilla / Drucilla Harrison ?; settled in Laurens County, S.C.), William (md. Lucretia Bell; settled in Edgefield County, S.C., from Fairfield County, S.C.), and James (md. ; settled in Edgefield County, S.C., from Fairfield County, S.C.). The brother James evidently was the father of Richard and Joseph ("Jose") of Richland County, S.C., and of William of Lexington County, S.C.. The family name originally was "O'Daniel" - (Irish ?); but the "O" was dropped after the said brothers came to South Carolina. This is all that I know about our Daniel (O'Daniel) ancestry.

Copeland; Benjamin

b. Indian Creek, Cheraw District, S. C. He was at the siege of Charleston and was thereafter under Lt. John Houston, Captain Littleton Isbell and Col. Sumter. He was in the battles at Rocky Mount, Hanging Rock and Wateree. In addition, he served a tour of duty under Col. William Washington and was in the battles at Rugley's Mill, Cowpens, Guilford Courthouse, Whitsett Mill, Hobkirk Hill, Eutaw Springs and Dorchester. (Moved to Tenn.)

Copeland, Cornelius

He enlisted in the Third Regiment on 20 April 1777. N.A.853.

Copeland, Jacob

He served in the Sixth Regiment, Fifth Regiment and First Regiment during 1779 and 1780. N.A.246; N.A.853.

Copeland, Jacob

He enlisted in the Second Regiment on 4 November 1775. N.A.853.

Copeland, James

He enlisted in the Second Regiment on 12 January 1778. N.A.853.

Copeland, John

He served in the militia under Col. Pickens.

Copeland, John He served as a private and lieutenant in the militia under Capts. William Jenkins, John Burton, William Copeland, Wilson, Col. Bratton and Gen. Henderson during 1780, 1781 and 1782. C.S.; A.A.1472; Z284.

Copeland, Obediah

He enlisted in the Sixth Regiment on 26 March under Capt. Alexander Boyes and Col. Henderson during 1779 before transferring to the First Regiment. N.A.246; N.A.853.

Copeland, Reuben

He enlisted in the Third Regiment on 21 May 1779 under Capt. William Caldwell. S.C.H.& G., V, 152; N.A.853.

Copeland, Stephen He enlisted in the Third Regiment on 24 July 1776. N.A.853.

Copeland, William

b. County Down, Ireland He emigrated to America when he was about sixteen years of age. While residing in York District, he enlisted and served during 1780 under Capt. Matthew Kendall, Maj. Ross and Col. Bratton as a ranger. He became a captain and served as a mounted militiaman. In addition, he was commissioned as a captain of militia in a foot company under Col. Bratton and was sent by Gen. Morgan on a number of occasions to spy on Cornwallis. He was in the battle at Briar Creek. Thereafter, he served in a unit under Gen. Williamson. He was assigned the duty of guarding the jail and prisoners at Orangeburg. Thereafter, he was sent to assist in taking Friday's Fort. S.C.H.&G., V, 59;

Copelin, John He served in the militia. A.A.1472; S433.

Coplan, Reuben He served in the Third Regiment from 21 May 1779 to 1 July 1781. N.A.859.

Copland, Aaron See Aaron Copeland.

Copland, Iseme

A.A.1472A.

He served in the St. Bartholomew's Parish Volunteer Company under Capt. William Mills during 1775. S.C.H.&G., III, 137.

Copland, Jacob He served in the Second Regiment under Capt Blake during 1778. S.C.H.&G., V, 16.

Copland, James He served in the St. Bartholomew's Parish Volunteer Company under Capt. William Mills during 1775. S.C.H.&G., III, 137.

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
