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D. F. Pope was Franklin Penny Pope, born 1814 at Fish Hall Plantation on Hilton Head, son of Captain William Pope & his 2nd wife Sarah Scott. Dr. Pope was principal heir of his brother, Joseph Adams Pope who died unmarried in 1846 leaving firm founders Jenkins Island plantation & its slaves. Dr. Pope built the Bluffton house in 1848, the year he married Mary C. (his 2nd wife), a daughter of Joseph James Pope about whom you'll hear more.

R. R. Pope was Richard Richardson Pope (sound familiar to you Savannahians?); he was full brother to Dr. Franklin Penny Pope, & was born at Fish Hall 1817, married Martha Julia Scott in St. Helena's Chapel of Ease, built his Bluffton house 1849 where 2 sons & 5 daughters were born; he died in Charleston 1873.

J. J. Pope was Joseph James Pope, born 1792 on Edisto Island, son of Joseph Pope of St. Helena's & his wife Theodore Thrus, granddaughter of the distinguished colonial artist, Jeremiah Thrus who painted many of our colonial ancestors. Joseph James Pope was married in Zion Chapel of Ease, Hilton Head by Rev. Philip Mathews in 1818 to Sarah Jenkins, younger daughter of planter Isaac King Jenkins who had died accidentally falling down the front stairs of his Jenkins Island Plantation House in 1800 just after her birth. Her older sister, Catherine Jenkins married in 1815 Dr. George

Wm. S. Stoney b. was the mother of Col. J. J. Stoney whose
Bluffton Waterfront home was also burned. Joseph James
Pope contributed a substantial amount towards building
the Church of the Cross. His valuable 2000-acre Leamington
Plantation on Hilton Head, now called Palmetto Dunes, had
a substantial 1½ story sand hill type cottage. You can
still see "Joe Pope Cemetery" there, burying place for the
Leamington slaves & their descendants. He resided
near present Allendale during the War & is buried there.
his wife in St. Luke's Church yard. Their chief seat was
Mullion Hill on St. Helena's Island; their distinguished
son, Col. Joseph Daniel Pope was first Dean of the School of
Law at the University of South Carolina.

Squire Pope was William Pope, born 1788 at Fish Hall,
son of Revolutionary War Captain William Pope & his first
wife, Sarah, daughter of planter Samuel Green and Sarah
Norfolk, another of the daughters of planter Jonathan
Norfolk & Mary Ann Chaplin of St. Helena's. Squire Pope's
mother was a wealthy heiress, owning Fish Hall, Springfield,
Pinelands and Coggins Point (now Port Royal) plantations
on Hilton Head. Squire Pope built the handsome Coggins Point
House in 1806 when he married Ann Scott. After her 1815
death he married in 1816 Sarah Lavinia, daughter of his
uncle John Pope & Elizabeth Thrus. In 1832 they moved
to Skull Creek Plantation House which he bought at the
death of Thomas Henry Bankhead, renaming it Cotton Hope.
