Dr. Nathaniel Henry Rhodes,* son of John Rhodes and Mary Talbird, daughter of Henry Talbird, his wife, was born Feb. 2, 1783, and died July 10, 1817. He married, ~~July~~ ^{Aug} 14, 1806, Mary Hamilton, daughter of Gov. Paul Hamilton and Mary Wilkinson, his wife, who was the daughter of Edward Wilkinson, of St. Pauls Parish. They were married by the Rev. Dr. Holinshead of Charleston. They had the following children:

1. Paul Hamilton, born Nov. 12, 1806; died Jan. 4, 1808.
2. Mary Wilkinson, born Jan. 8, 1808; died Jan. 8, 1851.
3. John, born April 11, 1809; died Nov. 15, 1831.
4. Edward Leecraft, Born April 7, 1810; died Jan. 7, 1811.
5. Nathaniel Henry, born Nov. 27, 1811,; died July 8, 1812.
6. Anne Henriette, born March 12, 1813.
7. Rebecca Brandford, born ~~Sept~~ ^{Sept} 12, 1814; died Oct. 27, 1834.
8. Julia Henrietta, born May 20, 1816; died April 18, 1818.

All of the above children died in childhood, except Mary Wilkinson, John, Anne Henrietta, and Rebecca Brandford.

*Dr. Rhodes represented St. Helena's Parish in the South Carolina House of Representatives from 1816 until his death on 10 July 1817.

John studied medicine, and died unmarried at the age of 23.

Rebecca B. married Hon. Frederick A. Porcher, of St. Johns Berkeley, Feb. 27, 1831, and died Oct. 27, 1834, leaving no children.

Mary W. married Hon. Lawrence E. Dawson, of Charleston, Dec. 26, 1826, and died at Carlowville; Alabama, June 8, 1851, leaving four children.

Anne H. married her first cousin, Dr. Morton Waring, of Charleston, Dec. ^{25 by Rev. Mr. Young in Grahamville} 30, 1830, and now (1888) resides at Florence, South Carolina. She had four children who grew to adult age.

Hon Lawrence E. Dawson died Feb. 8, 1848, at Carlowville, Ala. Dr. Morton Waring died at Florence, S. C., and Hon. Frederick A. Porcher, died in Charleston, S. C., Oct. 16, 1888.

After the death of her first husband, Mrs. Nathaniel Rhodes married Richard B. Scriven, of St. Pauls Parish, ^{9 Dec.} 1819.

Dr. Talbird thought that the state of his wife's health demanded a milder climate than could be found in Missouri. In addition, he felt that the inertia of age was creeping over him, and that he was no longer physically qualified for the duties of a large pastorate. He therefore announced to the church his intention to resign its pastorate. The members did all they could to retain him. They proffered to supply an assistant pastor, but considerations connected with the state of Mrs. Talbird's health induced him to persist in leaving them. He went to Starke, Florida, and became the pastor of a little church of about thirty one members. There again the Lord blessed his labors. The religious sentiment of the entire community became
