meetings will be called at Group bureau headquarters in the Realty Building for general discussions after the census gets well under way, and the decennial counting will doubt-lessly be expedited. The population and housing census will last 15 days, while 30 days will be allowed for finding out facts about farms in the

finding out facts about farms in the county.

Since there is no set salary for enumerators, only estimate can be made of the amount of money they will make while in government employ. Washington headquarters estimate the average, energetic enumerator should make \$4 or \$5 a day.

Without exception the enumerators, most of them women, are assigned to districts away from their own immediate neighborhoods, Mrs. Roos reports.

The supervisor said every enumerator who made a preliminary report during the day said no one had shown hesitancy in answering questions, and that only co-operation had been found in any home.

Even more than co-operation was found in some homes. That was hospitality. Several census takers were asked in for "a bite of breakfast or a cup of coffee."

The first day's enumeration was not without its humorous incidents.

The first day's enumeration was not without its humorous incidents. One woman interviewed, for instance, had to change some of her answers when she suddenly declared to the interviewer:

"Oh, I forgot about my husband!"

In one case a husband had to run down a street to overtake an enumerator to get his financial report straightened. He just happened to come home as the enumerator left, and was told by his wife that his yearly earnings had been specified at \$8,000. He caught the enumerator to explain \$8,000 was the amount his business made, not the amount of his salary.
