no provisions or water on board;
consequence of which it was agreed, that
I should remain behind, and join the
mate and crew, (who were to proceed
to lat. 27, and 40 leagues W. of Funchal
with provisions, &c. having secured
passage for that purpose.

Accordingly, on Sunday the 28th April
13 men fell sick embarked in the
course of the day, so that two American
men were then living in the Harmony,
