a resolution to repossess ourselves of the
Harmony, as she lay moored under a
mullet of the heavy seas of the
though her top masts were struck, as
no provisions or water on board;
consequence of which it was agreed, that
I should remain behind, and join the
mate and crew, (who were to proceed
to lat. 27, and 40 leagues W. of Fern
with provisions, &c. having secured
passage for that purpose.

According to the 2nd under the 1st A-
pril 13 hours, embarked in the
course of the day on board two boats,
one vessel then lying in the harbor,
