THE OLD PAPWORTH AND THE NEW

It is well known to students of heraldry that since 1940 the Society of Antiquaries of London has had in hand the preparation of a new edition of Papworth's Ordinary under the terms of the bequest of Lieutenant Colonel G. B. Croft Lyons. It will therefore be asked why this moment is chosen to reissue the original Papworth and what relation the new Papworth will bear to the old.

The answer to the first question is simple. Though the editorial work on the new Papworth has reached the stage when we may hope that the publication of the first portion is only a few years off, that first portion will come down no later than the year 1530, so that it must be many years before a revised Papworth coming down to modern times can see the light. In these circumstances the old Papworth, with all its faults, may be thought to have a good many years of useful life still before it.

The second question, as to the relation between the old Papworth and the new, cannot be quite so briefly answered. Basically the old Papworth is Burke's General Armory turned inside out, and Papworth's most important achievement was to devise a special and remarkable system of arrangement and to give effect to it. To this, however, he added a second achievement, only less remarkable, in the addition to Burke's material of a substantial number of entries from the mediaeval "Authorities", to which he gives references A to Z in his initial reference list. Most of these are Rolls of Arms, but they include also Glover's Ordinary and Sandford's Genealogical History.

This means that Papworth takes his material from sources of very unequal value. Where it comes from Rolls of Arms referred to specifically, we at least know what we are dealing with, but inevitably in many cases, Papworth used inferior texts, and for the purposes of the new Papworth, it has been found necessary to collate a very large number of original manuscripts and apply criticism to them.

Glover's Ordinary, a compilation by the Elizabethan Herald, Robert Glover, from unspecified sources, embodies important

additional mediaeval material, but in tantalizing form because one does not know the nature or therefore the value of the sources Glover used. In the new Papworth this material will be, so far as possible, verified and where necessary corrected.

Sandford's History is a valuable authority because Sandford gives references to his sources. The same cannot, alas, be said of Burke's General Armory, from which the bulk of the material in Papworth's Ordinary and almost all the post-mediaeval material, is derived.

It is necessary at this point to say in the plainest terms that Burke's Armory, bible of the heraldic stationer though it be, is an utterly uncritical and unreliable book. Not only does it contain large numbers of coats of arms of no authority whatever, but it gives many, both of these and of the authoritative coats, in confused and garbled form, sometimes giving the same name or arms twice over, in a correct form and an incorrect form, without realising that one is meant for the other.

Burke's is the fourth in a series of printed General Armories or Alphabets of Arms, of which the first is contained in the second volume of Joseph Edmondson's Complete Body of Heraldry, published in 1780. This is stated to contain "upwards of Fifty Thousand Coats Ancient and Modern with their Crests and Mottos and the Dates of the several Instruments by which they were respectively granted Collected from Register Books, Pedigrees, Heralds' Visitations, Church Gatherings, and other Manuscripts deposited in the Bodleian. Harleian and Cottonian Libraries, the British Museum, the College of Arms, the Libraries of the several Colleges in Oxford and Cambridge and other Public as well as Private Repositories", together with "a Collection of New Arms, Crests, Mottos, &c., which have been granted at the Herald's Office since the Year 1770".

This, of course, leaves open the question whether criticism has or has not been applied to the ragbag Herald Painters' alphabets, inaccurate and altered copies of Visitations and similar material in the Harleian, Cottonian and other manuscript collections mentioned, of which Edmondson made use, and I think the conclusion must be that, though Edmondson was more critical than Burke, he was far from being truly scholarly, and indeed, if he had set himself to check and verify the material he used, he could not possibly have turned out his printed works as he did.

Without an analysis, which hardly seems worth while, one cannot

be positive, but my impression is that each of these works contains a larger proportion of inaccurate and confused material than its

All those coats for which no authorities are cited have been derived from heraldic works of repute, and trustworthy other sources.

In consequence of the decease of Mr. Papworth in July 1870, after a pair illness of several years' duration, it was found that this Work could not completed according to the original scheme of publication, and the Subsci tion list was therefore finally closed.

As, however, there was a general desire among the Subscribers that Work should be completed, the continuation of it was entrusted to Papworth's relative and friend, Mr. Alfred W. Morant, whose qualificat for this undertaking were not unknown to some of them. It may there be sufficient to mention here that his taste for such subjects had led to take a friendly interest in this Work almost from its commencement. to watch and further its progress; and he had, in the course of his heraldic pursuits, arranged a large collection of foreign coats of arms similar plan, and compiled several other manuscripts on this and kinsubjects.

It was at that time ascertained that at least three-fifths of the manus had been published in the 696 printed pages; and the remaining two-fiftl it were left by Mr. Papworth sufficiently arranged for reference. Morant, besides the necessary and laborious technical revision of the from p. 696, has had to insert in their proper places the remainder of coats contained in the several Rolls referred to under the letters A copies of which Mr. Papworth had prepared for the purpose: and alarrange and enter numerous additional coats collected in the course of n years by Mr. Papworth. Mr. Morant has likewise added the coats of new creations, together with a number of others from his own collect The manuscript also required the necessary preparation for the press, in parts some rewriting to adapt them to the author's final plan as car out in type. This plan has been adhered to throughout the remainder (Work, mainly through the kind assistance of Mr. Weston Styleman Wa whose appreciation of it in the first instance is noticed in the Intr tion. He has kindly supplied many special details connected with arrangement of the coats, and his willingness in affording advice has Y. Jenyn's Ordinary, partly printed by Nicolas, 8vo., London 1829, from MS. in the f 451 Sh. Weller extended to the Editor and to Mr. Wyatt Papworth, thus ensuring. hoped, the same degree of accuracy in their revision as was attained author. Only the revision of the type, and the matters connected wit publication were undertaken by Mr. Wyatt Papworth.

The unpublished portion contained very few references to the authority (Withie's additions to Glover's Ordinary, contained in a copy in the Botts

Museum); an omission considered not important.

It has been thought advisable to reprint Mr. Papworth's original Introduction, with such alterations only as were deemed necessary, rather than to insert an elaborate essay by another hand.

Many inquiries having been made whether an Index of Names was to be supplied, it may be well to record that Mr. Papworth had no such intention. This Dictionary of Coats of Arms having been originally founded on the Encyclopædia of Heraldry published by Sir Bernard Burke, which comprises a Dictionary of Armorials wherein the Names are given alphabetically followed together, especially as the latter is to a great extent an Index to the former. The additional entries from the Rolls and other sources into this Dictionary, although numerous, hardly appeared to need an Index to themselves, many of the names being merely variations in the spelling of those to be found in the Encyclopædia.

The two Tables which will be found at pp. xvii and xix have been inserted in order to facilitate the use of the Work.

A List of the Subscribers to the Work, under the final arrangement that was made for completing it, is appended, together with the number of copies which their payments entitled them to receive. As anticipated in the scheme for continuing the publication, the balance then in hand, though somewhat increased under that arrangement, has been found insufficient to defray the expenses. The sale of the remaining copies will probably repay Mr. Wyatt Papworth the amount advanced by him for the purpose of completing the publication, and may, it is hoped, eventually yield some remuneration for the great labor and time expended by his late brother in the preparation of the manuscript, and in the collection of the material. The assistance, however, of the Subscribers in extending a knowledge of the Work is carnestly requested.

Additional Title-Pages have been furnished for the convenience of those who may be desirous of binding the Work in two volumes.

Mr. Wyatt Papworth has only to add his thanks to the Subscribers for their patience during the long, and at last fatal, illness of his brother, which tended so much to retard the progress of this publication; and for their support of the scheme proposed by him for the completion of the Work now happily achieved.

INTRODUCTION.

The object of this Work is to enable the generality of persons, though be slightly acquainted with heraldry, to ascertain with facility the names the families by whom any given coats of arms are, or have been, borne. For this purpose a very large number of coats have been for the first time arrange in alphabetical order, so that any of them may be readily found; and the names of the respective families are attached.

The Plan of the Work is simply this: the arms are blasoned (i.e., technically described), and are arranged in alphabetical order by the names of such of the respective charges as are first mentioned in the blason; so that the inquirements but to blason the coat, and the first charge that he names shows underwhat title in this Dictionary the coat is to be sought. When there is to charge, the tincture of the field is to be considered as the charge, and such coat will be found under the head of that metal, color, or fur. Again; who there is no charge, if the field be party, the ordinary employed to designed the direction of the partition gives the place of a coat of this kind in the alphabet; thus, for example, per bend will be found under BEND. In like manner, when there is no charge, coats that are barry, bendy, gyronny, put etc., will be found respectively under BAR, BEND, GYRON, PALE, etc. Coats which are billety, crusily, or otherwise semy, follow a similar rule; for if they be no other charge, those of which the field is semy are regarded as charges but they are considered as parts of the field when there is another charge.*

In a few cases, the different modes of blasoning of which arms are capalmay make it necessary to refer to more than one title.

Some of the charges, such as the ordinaries and others much in use, for heads so comprehensive, that several divisions and subdivisions became indipensable: there it will be seen that further alphabetical arrangements have been observed; sometimes by the tinctures only, and sometimes by the charge
