about sixty miles north of Charleston, or as it was then designated, Charles Town, and at one time there were about eighty families there. Among them were such familiar names as Gendron, Robert, Richebourg, Rembert, Jaudon, le Grand, Horry, Huger, Gourdin, Dubose, Gignilliat, Gaillard, Boisseau, Dutarte, St. Julien, Mayrant, Michaud, Porcher, Postell, Ravenel, and others. Rev. Pierre Robert continued at the head of the church at French Santee until 1715, when he resigned on account of the infirmities of age. Richebourg was called to succeed him. He died in 1715 at Santee and was buried in that locality but the exact spot is not known. We have no record of his wife's death. They had three children:—Pierre, Jr., Jean (John), and Elias. — Prob + 1 Dau Mary Marie

The earliest Huguenot church in Charleston is in a good state of preservation today; though more than two centuries old, and on one of its inner walls may be seen a tablet placed there by some of the descendants of Pierre Robert with the following inscription on it:—

We know little of the descendants of the second and third sons of Rev. Pierre Robert. Jean or John Robert, the second, married Margaret \_\_\_\_\_ and left four children:—Thomas, John, Ann, and Mary. We have no further record of them. Elias Robert, the third son, married and left descendants. He had a son named Abraham. It is said that his descendants added an s to their name, becoming Roberts, and in this manner have been lost to the Robert clan.

PIERRE ROBERT, JR.

Pierre Robert, Jr., the eldest son of Rev. Pierre Robert and Jeanne Brayé, was born at Basle, Switzerland, in 1675, between the first of the year and May 9th, as he was baptized on this latter date. The register of the French church in Basle records this ceremony on that date in the following manner:—

Le Registre de l'Eglise Francaise de Basle ce Dimanche 9 de Mai, 1675; a ete baptize un fils de St. Pierre Robert

et de Jeanne Brayé, presente par le Sieur Rene Frey, le Sieur de Beaulieu, et Demoisells Elizabeth Tudore,— Pierre.

When eleven years old Pierre, Jr., was forced to leave Switzerland by the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes, and was brought to South Carolina by his parents in the year 1686. He there married in 1701 Anne Marie Louise le Grand, daughter of Louis le Grand, Esquire, Sieur de la Fresnaye, and his wife, Anne de Magneville, both of Caen, in Normandy. The marriage settlement was signed in the house of the bride's uncle, Isaac le Grand, Esquire, Sieur d'Anerville. It was executed before Henry Auguste on September 10, 1701, and was witnessed by Isaac le Grand and Jacques le Grand. There was but one child born of this union, Pierre Robert, III. He was born at Santee, South Carolina, in 1704, and died there in 1740. This Pierre Robert, III, married in 1728, Mary Lynch, and had four children:—Lynch, Jonah, Mary, and Susannah. We have no further record of them.

Pierre Robert, Jr., must have lost his wife (Anne Marie Louise le Grand) about the time of the birth of his son, Pierre, III, as the records show that he married, in 1696, Judith Videaul, daughter of Pierre and Elizabeth Videaul, and grand-daughter of Pierre Videaul and his wife, Magdalaine Burgaud (both of La Rochelle, France). In the "list of French and Swiss refugees to Carolina" we find the following item:—Pierre Videaul, born in La Rochelle, son of Pierre Videaul and Madelaine Burgaud, was among the inhabitants of Santee who applied about the year 1696 to be naturalized; with his wife Jeanne Elizabeth and their daughter Jeanne Elizabeth, born in London, and with their children Pierre Nicholas, Marianne, Martha Ester, Judith, Jeanne, and Madelaine, born in Carolina." The children are evidently given in their order of birth and it would not be difficult from the above data to hazard the guess that our Judith was born in South Carolina about 1690. Her surname has been given in some of our family records as *de Bordeaux*. Just why this additional name is used it is quite impossible to say, except that such a custom of giving dual names was rather common among the early French settlers of this country. The additional name usually referred to the community whence they came in this manner their identity was
