

of Brynfenigl, representative of MARCHUDD ap CONAN, Founder  
of the VIII. Noble Tribe of North Wales and Powys;  
Owen Tudor was ancestor of the Royal House of TUDOR).

Owen (Orleton, co. Pembroke, bart.; descended from IWWA-  
AP-CYNDDELW, Lord of Llys, Llifon, co. Anglesey, Steward to

Owen Brogyntyn (Lord of Edeirnion, Dinmel, and

EDITH, last Prince of Powys-Fadoc. OWEN BROGINTYN was  
one of the most distinguished warriors of his age. Entering  
with his brothers into an alliance with OWEN GWYNEDD,  
Prince of North Wales, and Ruva ar Tewdwr, Prince of  
South Wales, to resist the renewed attempt of Henry II. of  
England on the principality, contributed materially to the  
victory obtained over the English in 1165, at the battle of  
Crogen. "Beneath Castell Crogen," the present Chirk  
Castle, whence the battle field is still called "Adwyr Bed-  
dall," or the Pass of the Graves, OWEN BROGINTYN made a  
grant to God, St. Mary, and the monks of Basling Work  
Abbey, of a "certain water in Penthielin, called Telienteigil,  
or Pemblemere, (Bala Lake in Merioneth) and all the pasturo  
of the said land of Penthielin." From this chieftain derived:  
I. THE HUGHES'S, of Gwerclas, Barons of Kymmer-yn-  
Edeirnion; II. LLOYDS, of Dolgyllyssyn; III. LLOYDS, of

Open ap Griffith Vychan (Lord of Glyndwrwy in  
Merioneth, the OWEN GLENDOWER, of English writers; repre-  
sentative of GRIFFITH MAELOR, Lord of Bromfield, eldest son  
of MADOC, last Prince of Powys-Fadoc, he had five daughters,  
viz. I. ISABEL, m. ADDA AP IOBWORTH; II. ELIZABETH, m.  
Sir JOHN SCUDAMORE, Knt., of Ewyas, Holme Lacy, and Kent  
Church, co. Hereford; III. JANET, m. JOHN CROFT, of Croft  
Castle, co. Hereford; IV. JANE, m. HUMPHREY, Lord Ruthyn;  
V. MARGARET, m. ROGER MORNINGTON, of Mornington, co.  
Hereford. The hereditary Arms of OWEN GLENDOWER, were  
those of GRIFFITH MAELOR, viz. Poly of eight ar. and  
gu. a lion ramp. sa.; but he assumed, with the claim  
to and title of King of Wales, the arms of LLEWELYN AP  
GRIFFITH, Prince of North Wales, as appears by his privy  
seal presented to the Cymruadorion Society by Sir Samuel
