

ROLLER FAMILY

The 19th annual reunion takes place tomorrow at Tollerton's Grove.

HISTORICAL SKETCH

The members of the Roller family will in accordance with past custom - hold their annual reunion tomorrow. The family is one of the largest in this section of the country and a special pains have been made to make this, the 19th reunion, a banner one. Tomorrow's reunion will be held at Tollerton's Grove and should the day prove suspicious, the gathering will be the largest ever held.

The following historical sketch of the family, which was published at the time of the first reunion, 19 years ago, is by request of the members of the family, reproduced:

"Agreeable to announcement a large number of relatives gathered in the grove near Washingtonville, on the 3rd inst. The crowd was not as large as expected but this was owing probably to the threatening appearance of the weather. However enough were there to make it one of the most enjoyable of the many reunions that have been held in this vicinity.

At an early hour the meeting was called to order and on motion of A.L. Jones of Alliance, General Roller was chosen chairman being the oldest member of the family now living. He assumed the chair and made a few well chosen remarks. On motion, A. L. Jones again, with conjunction with Issac Roller, were both appointed Vice Presidents, Simon Roller was chosen Secretary and Frank Roller as a-sistant Secretary.

Issac Roller, who was present, was the first white child born in Green Township.

A beautiful hymn was then sung by the choir, followed by prayer delivered from lips of Rev. Wm. B. Roller of Greenford. Reverend Roller then delivered the address of welcome.

The report of the historical committee was then read by Rev. Wm. B. Roller. Another hymn was sung by the choir, after which was read a letter from Dr. L. Firestone of Columbus expressing regret at his inability to be present and address the reunion. The prayer was delivered by Rev. John R. Roller of Mt. Union, Ohio.

At this point it began to rain and the order of exercises was seriously interrupted. After the shower-dinner was partaken of, at the conclusion of which the enumeration of those present was taken by W.E. Roller and Urban Weikert, and which should have been printed had the Secretary handed in the names according to agreement. His failure to do so forced us to omit them.

REPORT OF THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

Your committee would respectfully report, dating back to the 7th generation as follows: Jacob Roller was a native of Wittenburg, Germany, born of poor parents. He came to America about the year 1740 or 45 being 21 years old when he landed in America. He sold his time to a farmer, working 3 years faithfully to pay his passage across the Atlantic. Soon after this he married Miss Mary Hammer, a German lady who was also from Wittenburg, Germany. By this union they became the parents of seven sons and two daughters-viz: Sons-Jacob, Michael, John, Balsar, Philip, Henry and Caled - Daughters-Margaret and Mary (The above named parents lived and died in Pennsylvania.)

The marriages of the children were - Jacob Roller married Miss Susan Weston whose family consisted of three sons and one daughter. Michael Roller married Miss Nancy Weston to whom were born seven sons and two daughters and this family is all among the sleeping dead. John Roller married Miss Catherine Smith; their family consisting of five sons and four daughters, one son still living viz; Issac Roller, residing in Limaville, Stark County Ohio. Balsar Roller married Miss Alice Rose which family consisted of three sons and eight daughters, one son

and one daughter still living viz; J. R. Roller and Nancy Calvin. Philip Roller married Miss Jane Moore; and they were the parents of seven sons and five daughters. This family remained in Huntington County Pa., Our latest information of this family is that one son, Joshua, is still alive. Henry Roller married Nancy Ricket; This union resulted in six sons and four daughters and resided in Fairfield Co., Ohio. The parents are both dead. Of the remaining members, your committee has no definite information; but hope through this reunion to learn something more of their whereabouts. Caleb Roller married Miss Elizabeth Hardy which family consisted of one son and four daughters; two of this family are still living viz: Mrs. Eliza Poorman and Emandy Calvin. Margaret Roller married Mr. John Burley; their family consisted of six sons and two daughters. This family remained in Huntingdon County, Pennsylvania, of whose further history your committee has not received further account. Mary Roller married Mr. Joshua Igo; and their family consisted of five sons and three daughters. The parents and part of this family remained in Pennsylvania. Some of the children are in the west, of whose history we hope to learn something at this meeting. Jacob Roller, the Federal head of this history, settled in York County Pa. where he engaged in chopping cordwood at Griob's Iron Works; he afterwards removed to Bedford County Pennsylvania - now Huntingdon County Pa. - just before the Revolutionary war, and being on the frontier they had to live in forts; their fort was named Standing Stone, now the town of Huntingdon, and during the 7 years of the Revolutionary struggle to throw off the British Yoke and become a free people, the Roller family was ready and willing at every call to respond to the cause of sweet liberty, and for the seven long years, they never went to work but with their guns, to quell the Indians and thus worked and guarded our frontier while Washington with his noble band was giving the death knell to oppression and breaking the yoke of Great Britain's tyranny over the American Colonies. Jacob, the eldest son was killed by the Indians on the 3rd of August A.D. 1783. In 1795 John Roller and Balser Roller removed to Eastern Tennessee, and in fall of 1802 removed back to Beaver County Pennsylvania, near Greersburg-

now Darlington and in the year of 1803 on the 2nd of March, they moved on Section 36 Green Twp. Columbiana County Ohio., just as the county was organized. This twp. is now included in Mahoning County, Then and unbroken wilderness as there was only one family in the township viz: Elisha Teeters.

INCIDENTS:

The first white child born in Green Twp. was Issac Roller who is with us today. There was a great storm January 4th 1804. 3ft. of snow fell in 24 hours. In 1810, the wet harvest-wheat grew on the stalk. The nearest grist mills were in Little Beaver, some 30 miles distant. Grain was then carried on pack horses. Thus we may see some of the difficulties and hardships of our forefathers in their pioneer life.

Michael Roller moved from Pennsylvania to Ohio in 1805 and settled on Section 35, in Green Twp. Columbiana County, now included in Mahoning County. Caleb Roller removed from Pa. to Ohio in 1814 and settled in Columbiana County Ohio and afterwards removed to Green Twp. where he spent the remainder of his earthly pilgrimage. These four brothers are buried in the cemeteries at Washingtonville, where 2 acres of land were donated by Michael and Balser Roller for cemetery and church purposes.

In the War of 1812-Henry, son of John Roller, - Joseph, son of Balser Roller, and William and Jacob, sons of Michael Roller, served as soldiers under General Harrison. Thus all who were of sufficient age were in the service of their country.

Jacob Roller, son of Michael Roller, was the first Justice of the peace in Green Township; also filled the office of County Commissioner and 12 years a Representative in the State Legislature and Associate Judge in Columbiana County under the 1st State Constitution of Ohio.

Wm. Roller, son of Michael Roller, also filled the office of Justice of the Peace in Green Township; afterwards removing to Stark County then to Richland County, Then to Hancock County Ohio, where he held the office of Associate Judge in that County

and where he spent the remainder of his life. Thomas Roller, son of Michael Roller, filled the office of County Auditor in Mahoning County. He Emanuel Roller, son of Caleb, filled the office of Coroner in Columbiana County and also Deputy Sheriff in Mahoning County. Joshua Roller, son of Philip Roller, filled the office of Representatives in Pennsylvania, and other minor offices. Jacob B. Roller, our venerable president, son of Balser Roller served as a township officer for a number of years, and six years as County Commissioner even at the advanced age of three score and ten.. He is now, and has been from its origin, associated with the Pioneer and Historical Association of Columbiana County, Ohio and had the honor of being its 1st president which office he filled for three successive years.

Many of the departed members of the Roller family filled offices in their respective townships with credit to themselves and satisfaction to the public and preferring private life were generally well to do farmers.

In conclusion, looking up this brief history of the Roller family, your committee feel to say, in the justice to ourselves and to our blood kindred, and in gratitude to a kind providence, by whose inerring hand we still are lead, that in a moderate scale at least the Roller family in everything that is enobling to the human race, physically, intellectually and morally, have honored their name and acted a very conspicuous part in filling man's mission in this world.

ROLLER HISTORY

William Roller, son of Michael Roller, son of Jacob Roller of Wittenburg, Germany, married Nancy Teeters. This family con-

sisted of three sons and 5 daughters. The sons were Michael, Wilson and George Washington, and the daughters were Agnes, Mary, Susan, Lucinda and Charlotte.

William came from Richland County Ohio to Hancock County, and settled near Findlay remaining there the remainder of this lifetime. These families in the following pages are the direct decendents of the said William Roller.

Mary Roller married Moses McAnelly. To this union were born four sons and four daughters. The sons were William, Jefferson, John and Moses; the daughters were Mary, Nancy, Lucinda and Charlotte. The parents, William, John, Mary and Charlotte are deceased.

Agnes Roller married John Moore. This family consisted of four sons and six daughters. The sons were Ross, Bruce, Duff and Dorr. The daughters were Susan, Nancy, Mary, Amanda, Lucinda and Emma. The parents and children are all deceased.

Susan Roller married first a Mr. Anderson, and 2ond marriage to John Darrah. To this first union two daughters were born, Sarah and Susan. The 2nd marriage resulted in two sons, Sandford and Albert and two daughters Mary and Agnes. The parents and children are all deceased. (That is of the 1st marriage. That 'all the children' does not include the 2nd marriage for sure yet)

Lucinda married George Hemming. This family consisted of four sons and three daughters. Sons were Madison, Richard, Roller and Albert. The daughters, Emily, Irene and Alda. The parents and Richard are deceased.

George Washington Roller married Susannah Harrison. The result of this union were seven sons and three daughters. The sons were Napoleon B., Michael Valentine, William Henry, John Ross, Wilson Monroe, George Washington and Alber Westourn. The

daughters were Nancy Jane, Orlita Amelia, and Mary Elizabeth. The parents, Orlita A. Napoleon, Albert, and William are deceased.

Charlotte married Hugh Mathason. This union resulted in one son, name unknown, parents deceased.

Michael Roller married Elizabeth Swindler. To this union were born three sons and five daughters. Sons were William, George, and Henry. Daughters were Sarah, Mary, Philena, Ida, and Irene. The parents are deceased.

Roller, son of Michael Roller, son of Jacob Roller of Wittenburg, Germany, married Martha Ruckmann of Hancock County near Findlay Ohio to which union were born four sons and three daughters. The sons were James Thurman, Jay, Michael, and Willeam. Daughters were Florence, Elizabeth and Mary.

ANCESTOR'S SERVICES

My ancestor's services in assisting in the establishment of American Independence during the War of the Revolution were as follows:

Jacob Roller Sr., captured Tories as they occupied a cabin in Canoe Valley, Pa., after passing Brush Mountains. Tories left their rifles outside the cabin, entering it in search of food, found nothing but a pot of boiled mush and some lard. While engaged in appeasing their appetites Samuel Moore and his companion, Jacob Roller Sr., who were on a hunting expedition, saw the rifles and immediately secured them. When Mr. Moore walked in with his gun cocked and called upon the Tories to surrender, the order was cheerfully complied with, and they were marched to Holiday Fort. On the way thither one of them became insolent and informed Moore and his companion that in a short time they would repent arresting them. Roller being an athletic man, when they arrived at the fort, he fixed a rope to the Tory's neck, and hoisted it over a beam and drew him up. Moore persuaded his companion to desist. They were afterwards taken to Bedford. From Jones History of Juniata Valley, Pa. p256

A History of the Roller Family prepared by the late Dr. J. R. Hewitt of Sharon, Pa., also mentions Jacob Roller Sr., as having built the Fort in Sinking Valley, Pa., in 1777, where he lived, giving protection to his people and recruiting soldiers for the Services against the British.

The said Jacob Roller Sr.

is the ancestor who assisted in establishing American Independence, while acting in the capacity of Patriot while maintaining a fort in Sinking Valley, Pennsylvania from 1777 to 1781

AN UNTITLED NARRATIVE

On a dark rainy day in the early summer of 1787, an old bald eagle or a wily panther, setting far upon any of the rocky ledges on the west side of Brush Mountain, could have seen a party of four men rapidly walking up the Indian trail leading through the gap at the head of Sinking Valley.

They were all clad in the customary manner of Pioneers of that day. Their clothing, being a mixture of Pioneer and Indian fashion, the chief article being the hunting shirt of either home spun or tanned deer skin, had a long loose frock open in front, sometimes laced with thongs of doe skin and reaching halfway down the thighs lapping over the waist belt a foot or more. The cape was large and handsomely decorated and fitted tightly around the neck to keep the rain and snow water off the shoulders. A strong and much decorated belt was tied around the waist and fitted with loops and sheath for axe and knife. A pair of drawers or breeches and fringed leggins covered their legs, while moccasins of dressed deer skin served instead of shoes. Although they were all dresses similarly, their appearance was quite different. Two of them were well armed with flint lock rifles and the customary powder horn and bullet pouch hanging from one shoulder, and a large sheath knife and hunting axe hanging from their belts. The two other forlorn creatures, evidently prisoners, were tied together with their hands behind their backs with thongs of deer hides. Their colthes, and especially their moccasins, showed signs of very hard wear and tear. They had evidently been on some long, arduous and unsuccessful expedition.

Who were these men? They were Jacob Roller, Sr. and Samuel Moore on their way to Fort Holliday with two of John Weston's Tories, whom they had captured.

It was no accident that Roller and Moore were in the woods hunting that rainy day. They had been notified by their friends and spy, The Cayuga Chief, John Logan, that Weston's expedition

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had failed and the tories were staggering back to their homes, fearing to enter any house still occupied to ask for food. These two men came upon an empty cabin, the occupants having fled to the nearest fort for protection. They uncautiously set their rifles against the cabin, entered it, and searched for food, finding nothing; however, but part of a pot of boiled mush and some lard. In their condition, anything bearing resemblance to food was a god-send, and they fell vigourously to work at it. While engaging in appeasing their appetites, Roller and Moore happened to pass the cabin, saw the rifles and immediately secured them when they walked in with their guns cocked, and called upon the tories to surrender; which peremptory order they cheerfully complied with, and were marched to Holliday's Fort. On the way thither, one of them became insolent, and informed Roller and his companion that in a short time they would repent arresting them. This incensed Roller, and, being an athletic man, when they arrived at the fort he fixed a rope to the tory's neck, hove it over a beam, and drew him up. Moore, fortunately, was a less excited man, and persuaded his companion to desist. They were afterward taken to Bedford; but whether ever tried or not, we have not been able to ascertain.

This one adventure of Mr. Roller and Mr. Moore proving their bravery and everlasting vigilance in protecting the liberty, lives, and property of the patriotic cause, during the war of the rebellion, has made it possible for all their descendents to become members of two of the oldest patriotic societies of America.

It is the leader of this expedition that we are most interested in, as he was a most notable person those days, was still in the very prime of life, compact of frame and resolute of manner. His blue eyes were without guile; and the lines of his countenance all spoke of frankness and sincerity, while the

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cut of his mouth and the squareness of the lower part of his face gave tokens of firmness and courage. There was an engaging frankness and an unstudied repose and simplicity of manner about him, which invited confidence covering a deeper, a wilder, nature in him, which when aroused, as in the present occasion could bring forth most violent and daring actions.

Such a man truly was Jacob Roller as his brave and daring life here in the unbroken forests of Sinking Valley had amply proven. He was a true child of the forest, familiar with nature on all her varied moods, though versed in the woodcraft of his day and a bitter enemy of the wily and untutored savage. Being shrewd, patient, tireless, knowing no fear, he was a true and loyal nature's nobleman--every inch of him, and every fiber of his body.

Born in Wuttemberg, Germany in 1724 of Huguenot parents, not finding sufficient outlet for his adventurous spirits in his native country or not caring for the restricted life of a soldier, he and his young wife, Mary Hammer, sailed for America, the land of adventure and freedom. They sailed from Rotterdam, Holland on the good ship "Two Brothers", captain Thomas Arnot commanding, touching at the port Cowes, England on the way out. This was the last view they ever had of their native land. (Europe)

They landed in Philadelphia August 28, 1750, and took the usual oath of allegiance to the King of England. How long they lived in Philadelphia we do not know, but the next we hear of them they are living in that part of Lancaster County, which later became York county. Here they lived and raised a family of seven sons and two daughters, several of which were born in Sinking Valley. Evidently the hunting and fishing were being washed up in their community and as he possessed an "itching

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toe" and his feet were full of the "wonder lust," he could no longer resist the call of adventure, beckoning from the land of the "setting sun" beyond the mountains, the valley of the Blue Juniata. So, sometime about 1774 or 1775, he came to the Valley of the Sinking Springs in Bedford County, and took out a patent for a tract of land 370 acres of virgin forest. Here he and his seven boys cleared a farm and built a log cabin. Several years later, this log cabin was enlarged and surrounded with a strong stockade, and was known as Fort Roller, a place of refuge for all the settlers of lower Sinking Valley. It was also an outpost of Fort Roberdeau located several miles further up the valley to protect the lead mines. There is no record of either of these forts having been attacked by the Indians, but there were many alarms reported, when the neighbors gathered here for protection, and it was during one of these Indian alarms that the family of Jacob Roller, Jr. was fortified here. He and a friend by the name of Rebault returned home to look after their crops and were ambushed, murdered, and scalped and their bodies left laying in their corn fields.

There is an interesting letter still extant, written in 1780 or 1781, in which, one Abe Keller, writing to Colonel George Crogan from Fort Roller, says, "The wild bulls (bison) are pasturing around the fort, it being the only place they can get green grass, as it was burned over several times, We could kill them all easily, but just take one as is needed".

Mr. Roller died after 1803. He was preceeded in death by his wife, Mary, for in his last will recorded in the court house in Huntingdon County, he says, "I order and direct that Catherine Wiskee (? Wicker), spinster, my covenanted housekeeper, have got and received all and every privilege and property as specified and mentioned by and in an article of agreement made and executed

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between us bearing date, twelfth of February One Thousand Eight Hundred and three reference thereunto being had, may more fully be seen.

I also order and direct that all my property real and personal be put and offered to public sale the amount of such goods after date to be equally distributed and divided among my children now surviving, and the heirs of of my eldest son Jacob Roller deceased to receive amongst them an equal share with one of my other children now living viz, Michael Roller, John Roller, Baltser Roller, Mary Roller, alias Mary Igou, Margaret Roller, alias Margaret Burley, Phillip Roller, Henry Roller and Caleb Roller".

Mr. and Mrs. Roller are buried somewhere on the farm near Fort Roller

All but one of their sons and daughters and many of their and many of their grandsons and daughters have intermarried with many of the old pioneer families of Huntington and Blair counties, such as Igou, Burley, Moore, Reese, Hewitt, Huyett, Dysart, Henderson, Bell, Knode, McCoy, Dean, Hunter, Hileman, Hoover, Patterson, Metz, Ross, Fluke, and Rhule, Whittaker, Isenberg, Pipers, Blackburns, and many others.

THE ADVENTURES OF JACOB ROLLER, JR

In 1781, Jacob Roller, Jr., and a man named ^RFebault, were massacred by Indians in Sinking Valley. Few particulars of this massacre are known, and many contradictory stories still exists in regard to it. We give Mr. Maguire's version of it, but would at the same time state that he did not vouch for the authenticity of it, as he gathered it from the exaggerated rumors that in those days followed the recital of current events.

Roller, it appears was an active and energetic frontiersman, bold, fearless, and daring; and the common belief was that his unerring rifle had ended the days of many a red-skin. Be that as it may, however, it is certain that the Indians knew him, and marked him out for a victim long before they succeeded in despatching him. Several small roving bands were in the habit of coming down into the valley after the mines were abandoned; but no favorable opportunity offered for a long time to kill Roller.

On one occasion, four of the settlers had met at Roller's house for the purpose of going on a hunt for deer. Early in the morning, when just ready to start, Roller heard the breaking of a twig near his cabin. He peered out into the deep gloom of the misty morning, and discovered three Indians crouching near an oak tree. It was very evident that the Indians had not been close enough to the house to ascertain the number within, and the inmates were in a state of doubt as to the number of savages. Profound silence was observed, and it was resolved to shoot from the window as soon as the light was sufficiently strong to render their aim certain. The Indians were evidently waiting for Roller to come out of his house. At length, when they thought the proper time had come, the settlers gathered at the window, and thrust out their rifles as silently as possible. The quick eyes of the savages saw, even by the hazy light, that there were too

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many muzzles to belong to one man, and they took to the woods with all the speed they could command, leaving behind them a quantity of venison and dried corn, and a British rifle.

On another occasion, Roller had an encounter with a single Indian in the woods, which probably stands unparalleled in the history of personal encounters between a savage and a white man. Roller left home about seven o'clock in the morning, in search of deer. He had ranged along the edge of the mountain an hour or two when he heard a rifle-shot but a short distance from him, a minute had scarcely elapsed before a wounded doe came in the direction where he stood. To shoot it was but the work of an instance, for the thought of the presence of Indians never entered his head. Yet it appears that it was an Indian who fired. The Indian mistook the crack of Roller's rifle for that of a companion left at the base of the mountain. Under This impression, the Indian, anxious to secure the doe, and Roller, intent on bleeding her, both neglected one of the first precautions of that day, --viz.; to reload their rifles. Roller was leaning over the doe, when he heard the crust of snow breaking in a thicket near him. He jumped to his feet, and was confronted by the Indian, --a tall, muscular fellow, who was quite as large as Roller. The savage, well aware of the fact that neither of the rifles were loaded, and probably satisfied in meeting "a foeman worthy of his steel," deliberately placed his gun against a tree by the side of Roller's, and, drawing his tomahawk, he cast a glance of savage delight at the white man before him, drew his tamahawk and stood on the defensive. The savage made a spring, when Roller jumped aside, and the Indian passed. The latter suddenly wheeled, when Roller struck him upon the elbow of the uplifted hand, and the hatchet fell. Fearing to stoop to regain it, the savage drew his knife, and turned upon Roller. They clinched, and fearful struggle ensued, Roller held the savage's right arm, so as to render useless his

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knife, while the Indian grasped firmly the hand in which Roller held his hatchet, and in this manner they struggled until they both were tripped by the carcass of the doe; still both retained their hold. Roller fortunately grasped his knife, lying beside the doe, with his left hand, and thrust it into the side of the Indian. The struggle now became terrible, and by one powerful effort the savage loosened himself and sprang to his feet; but Roller was as quick as he was. In attempting to close again the savage stabbed Roller in the shoulder and in the arm. Roller had dropped his hatchet in regaining his feet, and the combat was now deadly one with knives. They cut and thrust at each other until their buckskin hunting-shirts were literally cut into ribbons and the crusted snow was dyed with their blood. At length, faint with the loss of blood, the combat ceased, by mutual consent, as it were, and the Indian, loosening himself from Roller's grasp, took his rifle and disappeared. Roller stanching, with frozen snow and some tow, the only dangerous wound he had, managed to reach his home. He was stabbed in four or five places, and it was some weeks before he felt recovered from his wounds. The skeleton of the savage, with his rifle by his side, was found the succeeding summer on the top of Warrior Ridge.

The time of Roller's death is not positively known. Mr. Maguire thought it was in the fall of 1781. From subsequent evidence three Indians came down from the mountain, avoiding the fort of Jacob Roller, Sr., which was located at the head of Sinking Valley, and passes on down through the valley to the house of Bebault, whom they tomahawked and scalped.

From thence they went to the house of Jacob Roller, Jr., who was alone at the time, his family being at his father's

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fort. He was murdered and scalped while at work in his corn-field. His absence from the fort at night creates alarm, and early next morning a party went down to his house to see if anything had befallen him. While searching for him, one of the men discovered blood on the bars, which soon led to the discovery of his body in the field. From the footprints in the ground, it was plain that the murder had been committed by two men and a boy between twelve and fourteen years of age. Roller had been shot and scalped, his head shockingly mangled with a tomahawk, and the region of his heart was gashed with a dozen cuts and stabs made by a sharp scalping-knife. The inference was that, after shooting Roller, the men induced the lad to tomahawk and stab him. In other words, they gave him a lesson in butchery and courage.

Bebault was found shot and scalped, although still alive,-- a shocking spectacle to look upon. He was so much exhausted by the loss of blood as to be unable to give any account by the transaction.

The bodies of both were taken to the fort and buried, and, as soon as possible, a large party, consisting of the Rollers, Beattys, Rickets, etc., started in pursuit. They followed the trail for nearly fifty miles, but at last lost it, and were compelled to return without overtaking the murderers.

Every settler knew Roller, and his death cast a universal gloom over the valley. The manner of it alarmed the settlement to such an extent that such fall crops as were still out were suffered to rot upon the field, as no force could be spared from the forts, and people would no longer risk their lives to the mercey of the marauders.

THE ADVENTURES OF JACOB ROLLER, JR

Jacob Roller, Jr., was the oldest of seven brothers, all powerful fellows, and active frontier-men.

There are quite a number of the descendants of the seven brothers, who reside in various places,--some in the west, but probably a majority of them at Williamsburg, in Blair County, Pennsylvania.

THE ROLLER FAMILY

FORT ROLLER

This was another one of the many fortifications built in Blair County at or about the time of the erection of Fort Roberdeau, many of them being private enterprises and this was one of them. We find that Jacob Roller, a frontier man of more than average hardihood, energy and daring, was for many years, during the Revolutionary period, a very prominent figure in the locality of Hollidaysburg and surrounding vicinity, and it was he who erected this fort or stockade, for the defense of his family and his neighbors from the Indians. This may have been a fort, but we are inclined to the belief that it was only a stockade. This fort or stockade must have been contemporaneous with or later than Fort Roberdeau, for there could have been no defence in Sinking Valley prior thereto, as General Roberdeau has to take a military force with him.

It is stated that there is an original petition in existence from the people in the Juniata region asking protection from the savages, which was read in the Pennsylvania Assembly, February 14, 1781, and which contains the name of Jacob Roller and other names, still familiar in Sinking Valley and in all parts of this county. When they sought protection then, they probably undertook to protect themselves by building the forts and stockades that figure in our early history. These forts were of the Revolutionary period, rather than of an anterior one.

Mr. Jones, in his History of the Juniata Valley, refers to this fort. He also refers to an encounter by Roller with the Indians in which he came out the victor and the savages dreaded him very much on account of his well known and successful fighting proclivities. Indeed, he was in continual quarrel with the redskins and his name was a terror to them.

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The time of Roller's death is not positively known; Mr. Maguire thought it was in the fall of 1781. From after discovered evidence, three Indians came down from the mountain, avoiding the fort of the father, which was located at the head of Sinking Valley and passed on down through the Valley to the house of Rebault, whom they tomahawked and scalped.

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THE JOHN ROLLER FAMILY

There is a record that states that Johanes Roller came to Philadelphia August 11, 1750 on Ship Patience and this was thought to have been John Roller of Dunsmore and was probably our ancestor. From the old German records of Raders Church near Timberville, I have the dates and birth and sponsors of John Roller's family. His family evidently were members of Raders Lutheran Church. He was married three (3) times. He was an Elder in Raders Church in 1813.

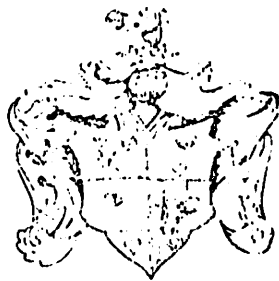

Historical

Among the enjoyable features of the first reunion was the reading of an historical sketch, prepared by a committee composed of Jacob B. Roller, William B. Roller and Simon Roller. This record has been preserved and with additional information acquired from time to time is now available for the purpose of this book. To these first efforts we are greatly indebted and will endeavor to quote as far as is practicable within our necessarily limited space.

Jacob Roller, the federal head of this history, was a native of Wurtemberg, Germany; born of poor parents, though established ancestry, the family enjoying the distinction of a coat of arms. He came to America about the year 1740 or 1745, being twenty-one years of age. He sold his time to a farmer, working three years faithfully to pay his passage across the Atlantic. Soon after this he married Miss Mary Hammer, a German lady who was also from Wurtemberg, Germany. By this union they became the parents of seven sons and two daughters, viz.: Sons, Jacob, Michael, John, Balsar, Philip, Henry and Caleb; daughters Margaret and Mary. The above parents lived and died in Pennsylvania.

Settling in York county, Pa., Jacob Roller engaged in chopping cordwood at Grubb's Iron Works; he afterwards removed to Bedford county, now Huntingdon county, Pa., just before the Revolutionary war, and being on the frontier they had to live in forts. Their fort was named Standing Stone, now the city of Huntingdon, and during the seven years of the Revolutionary struggle to throw off the British yoke and become a free people the Roller family were ready and willing at every call to respond to the cause of liberty, and for the seven long years they never went out to work but with their guns to quell the Indians. Jacob, the eldest son, was killed by the Indians on the 3d of August, A. D. 1783.

In 1776 upon the opening of government land, Jacob Roller purchased a section known as Sinking Valley, now Blair County, where his home was established. In this section today live many Rollers, descendants of his sons, Philip and Jacob, who did not move with

their brothers in their western migrations; also, the descendants of the Burleys and Igoes.

In 1795 John Roller and Balsar Roller removed to eastern Tennessee, but disliking the institution of slavery, in the fall of 1802 removed back to Beaver County, Pa., near Greersburg, now Darlington, and in the year 1803 on the 2d of March, they moved on Section 36, Green township, Columbiana county, Ohio, just as the county was organized. This township is now included in Mahoning county, then an unbroken wilderness, as there was only one family in the township, viz: Elisha Teeters.

Michael Roller removed from Pennsylvania to Ohio in 1805, and settled on Section 35, in Green township, Columbiana county, now included in Mahoning county. Caleb Roller removed from Pennsylvania to Ohio in 1814 and settled in Columbiana county, Ohio, and afterwards removed to Green township. These four brothers are buried in the cemeteries at Washingtonville, where two acres of land were donated by Michael and Balsar Roller for cemetery and church purposes.

Sons of these pioneers built substantial brick houses which are today, after one hundred years, outstanding landmarks in this section. On the hill overlooking Washingtonville from the east stands the house built by Joseph Roller, while a mile to the north is the former home of Jacob B. Roller. These were sons of Balsar Roller. Continuing farther through the valley to the neighborhood of Locust Grove, east of Greenford, we find the sturdy brick house built by Michael, son of John Roller.

Henry Roller moved to Fairfield County, Ohio, and established a family consisting of four sons and three daughters.

In continuing this brief history, interest centers on the four brothers who came to this section and their descendants, who have now become the rank and file of our reunion. Without means of an exhaustive search, we trust that we may accurately list to the fourth generation, which becomes in reality the grandparents of the greater number of our adult members today, and it will devolve upon them to continue individually in their respective families the record of their relationships.

It would be interesting and valuable should some member of the family take up this historical record, developing it into a comprehensive genealogy. We hope not less appropriate today is the thought expressed in conclusion by the first historical committee: "that in a moderate scale at least the Roller family, have honored their name in everything that is ennobling—physically, intellectually and morally."

Incidents

Reported At First Reunion

Rec Three of the sons of Jacob Roller were enrolled in the Continental army of 1776—Jacob Jr., Philip and Balser. They were assigned to the frontier, where they and their com-patriots repelled many an Indian attack. Standing on the dangerous picket line, they became a frontier guard to the settlements in the rear.

In 1812, and again in 1861, the Roller boys of Pennsylvania, Ohio and the West rendered valiant and patriotic service to their country.

W.C. In the war of 1812, Henry, son of John Roller, Joseph, son of Balser Roller, and William and Jacob, sons of Michael Roller, served as soldiers under General Harrison.

Jacob Roller, son of Michael Roller, was the first Justice of the Peace in Green township; also filled the office of County Commissioner, and twelve years a representative in the State Legislature and Associate Judge in Columbiana county under the first State Constitution of Ohio.

William Roller, son of Michael Roller, also filled the office of Justice of the Peace in Green township; afterwards removed to Stark county, then to Richland county, then to Hancock county, Ohio, where he held the office of Associate Judge in that county, and where he spent the remainder of his life.

Thomas Roller, son of Michael Roller, filled the office of County Auditor in Mahoning county. He spent the latter days of his life in Canfield, where he died.

Emanuel Roller, son of Caleb, filled the office of Coroner in Columbiana county; also Deputy Sheriff in Mahoning county.

Joshua Roller, son of Philip Roller, filled the office of Representative in Pennsylvania, and other minor offices.

Jacob B. Roller, son of Balser Roller, served as a township officer for a number of years, and six years as County Commissioner, even at the advanced age of three score years and ten. He was, from its origin, associated with the Pioneer and Historical Association of Columbiana County, Ohio, and had the honor of being its first President, which office he filled for three successive years.

The Virginia Branch

Kindred interest has been maintained through succeeding generations with the descendants of John Peter Roller, native of Erlangen, Bavaria, who came to this country, in 1751. He first settled in Lancaster, Pa., later removing to Virginia, locating near Mount Crawford in the Shenandoah Valley, where the name is today perpetuated, perhaps most conspicuously, in the founding of the Augusta Military Academy at Fort Defiance, a school prominent in this country.

From Erlangen also came Conrad Roller, the associate and friend of Muhlenberg.

Edward T. Vickers, resident of the Hunter community for the past 27 years, died Tuesday afternoon at the family home. He had been ill for the past six months.

Funeral services will be held at 3 p.m. Thursday at the Kinsey Funeral Home. The Rev. M. B. Beattie is to conduct the service. The body will be sent to Eugene, Oregon, for burial in a cemetery there. A son, Don Vickers, Gabbs, Nev., who was called here by the illness of his father, will accompany the body.

Edward T. Vickers was born Aug. 12, 1860, in Hancock county, Ohio, and he spent his childhood in that state. He married Miss Lorena Roller Aug. 12, 1886, at Arcadia, Ohio.

Mr. and Mrs. Vickers came west to Boulder in 1905, residing there until 1908, when they moved to Eugene, OR. They made their home at Eugene from 1908 until they moved to the Hunter community in 1916.

Mr. Vickers was engaged in farming all the time he lived in the Hunter section. He had been a member of the Methodist church for more than 70 years. Mr. Vickers was a member of the Ohio state militia for three years when he was a young man.

Surviving besides his wife are one daughter, Mrs. Harry Devereaux, Eugene, Ore.; two sons, Virgil V. Vickers, Seattle, and Don Vickers, Gabbs, Nev.; one sister Mrs. Emma Huston, Wenatchee, Wash., and three grandchildren.

A son, Clifford Vickers, died at Eugene in 1908. A grandson, Lowery Vickers, was reported missing in action in the battle of Bataan in 1942.

Hannah, who remained on the homestead, 59 acres; to Matilda, who married — Chapman, 69 acres; to Elizabeth, who married Benj. Gee, 59 acres; and to Nathan, 55 acres.

Jeremiah Callahan, a brother of William and James, came to Green in 1812, and settled near his brother William, on the section north. He had made a prior visit to Green with his brothers.

Jesse Callahan, another brother of William and James, came about 1808 and worked with them for a time, and then returned to Pennsylvania. He finally removed permanently to Columbiana County. His son, Thomas, has lived many years at the northeast corner of section 34.

SECTION XXXIII.

This section was entered by Samuel Davis in 1803. He received a deed from the government, signed by Thomas Jefferson, dated March 10, 1807. This section was distributed by gift and sale. The northeast quarter of the section was given to Rebecca Schofield, and is now occupied by J. M. Kenreich; the northwest quarter to Mary Hawley, whose daughters, Mrs. Thomas and Mrs. Hiddleston, are the present owners. The southeast quarter was sold to John Briggs, who built a grist-mill on the creek about 1819. Aaron Holloway, a few years later, built another mill, which is still standing, a short distance below the first, and is the property of J. H. Sell. Caleb Russell purchased the southwest quarter, now owned by P. T. B. Ward.

SECTION XXXIV.

John Zimmerman, of Lancaster Co., Pa., came to this country in 1804 in search of land, and, being pleased with the situation of section 24, entered it. In the next year he moved upon it with his family, consisting of his wife, his son Peter and wife, his sons John, Conrad, Joseph, and Henry, and his daughters Mary, Susan, and Catharine.

The section was subsequently divided, Peter receiving 100 acres, where William Betts now lives, in the southeast part of the section; Joseph, 208 acres, where his son Abram now lives; John, 100 acres in the southwest corner of the section, where John Shrimp resides; Henry, 110 acres in the northwest quarter, where Jacob Stofer resides; Conrad, 50 acres in the northeast corner, where Thomas Callahan now resides. Mary (a daughter of his son John), who had married Henry Coy, received 50 acres, where J. J. Moyer now lives.

SECTION XXXV.

* Michael, Baltzer, and Caleb Roller, brothers, came from Huntingdon Co., Pa. Michael entered section 35 in 1804. Afterwards he gave the northwest quarter to his son Jacob, whose son William is now living at Greenford. To William, another son, he gave the southwest quarter. Thomas and James had the homestead, where Henry Walters now lives, on the east half of the section.

xx Washingtonville is situated on sections 35 and 36 in this township, and sections 1 and 2 in the township of Salem. Land for a church-site and burying-ground was given at a very early day by Michael and Baltzer Roller.

SECTION XXXVI.

Baltzer Roller entered this section in 1803. He went to Tennessee soon afterwards, where he spent a year, and

then returned and settled upon the section. John B., a son, had the homestead, situated on the southeast quarter, Jacob B., the southwest quarter, and Joseph a part of the remainder. The most of the north half was sold to other persons.

Col. Jacob B. Roller, son of Baltzer, served the district as a State representative for twenty-one years. He was in Gen. Harrison's army, and was at Fort Meigs. While in the woods near the fort he stopped at a spring, and while stooping to drink was startled by the whizz of a bullet, which grazed the back of his head. He sprang to his feet, and, seizing his gun, fired at a retreating Indian, who, however, escaped uninjured.

The Cherry Valley Iron and Coal Company own lands in this section.

ORGANIZATION.

Green township was incorporated June 3, 1806, under the general laws of the State, and was then in Columbiana County, where it remained until the organization of Mahoning County, in 1846, when it was attached to that county. It originally contained 36 square miles, but by the organization of the township of Perry, in 1832, was reduced to thirty-two square miles.

VILLAGES.

GREEN VILLAGE

is situated near the centre of the township, on sections 15 and 22, and was first laid out by Lewis Baker, Jacob Wilhelm, and Jacob Cook. Abram Stofer (or Stauffer) kept the first store. Samuel Hardman, David Weikert, and J. M. Hole have succeeded him. The first post-office was established in 1831, and William Van Horn was the first postmaster. He has been succeeded by David Weikert, William Roller, Daniel Beam, N. P. Callahan, A. S. Griffith, and Henry Shray, who is the present postmaster.

The village at present—1879—contains three churches, Lutheran, German Lutheran, and Swedenborgian, a post-office, school-house, drug-store, two dry-goods- and grocery-stores, a tannery, steam saw- and planing-mill, grist-mill, two blacksmith-shops, two wagon-shops, two shoe-shops, and one millinery-store. In the village are two practicing physicians.

WASHINGTONVILLE.

This town was laid out about 1832, principally through the exertions and influence of Michael Frederick, and is situated in the townships of Green and Salem. It contains two churches (Methodist and Evangelical Lutheran), a post-office, school-house, three hotels, two blacksmith-shops, four grocery-stores, one dry-goods-store, one drug-store, two carriage-shops, two shoe-shops, about seventy-five dwellings, and has a population of 800.

The first hotel was opened by Michael Frederick, about 1833. The first store was opened, in what is now "Rail-road Tavern," by Jacob Stoffer,* who was appointed postmaster upon the establishment of the post-office, in 1836. He was succeeded as postmaster by Jacob Borton, Henry Estep, George R. Hillbarn, John B. Stover, Samuel Greenwald, and John R. Stover, who is the present postmaster.

Peter Miller was the first blacksmith who opened a shop. Before removing to Washingtonville he resided one year at New Lisbon, where he built the first brick house. About 1829, John Miller, a blacksmith, began the manufacture of edge-tools, which he continued for about ten years.

NEW ALBANY.

New Albany is situated about two miles and a half west from Green Village, and contains a store, post-office, blacksmith-shop, and 22 dwellings. The first steam-mill in the county was built at this place, by Wilson Teeter and Edwin Webb, by whom the town was laid out. The post-office was established prior to 1853. The first postmaster was Henry Thulen, who was succeeded by Joshua Webb, Daniel Beam, Charles Taylor, Lemuel Hixson, Solomon Russell, David Coy, and Lewis Pow, the present incumbent.

SCHOOLS.

Soon after the settlers came to the township an effort was made among the widely-scattered families to assemble the children for purposes of education. Elisha Teeter gave for school and burying purposes a piece of ground situated on the east side of section 20, and a log school-house was built, about 20 by 24 feet in size, with a punchoon floor and a door with wooden hinges. The children from sections 17, 18, 19, and 20 attended school at this house. The first teacher was Edward Bonsall, who was succeeded by Rachel, his wife, and Priscilla Fisher, wife of William Fisher,—both daughters of Abram Warrington. John Cowdin, Patrick Smith, and Daniel Stratton were also teachers before the adoption of the district-school system.

The first school-house for children living in the north middle part of the township was on the New Lisbon road, on land now owned by John Cook, on section 10. This was a log house built by Henry Pyle, who soon after removed to section 2. It was fitted with slab seats, and with desks fastened against the walls with wooden pins. In 1814, Samuel McBride was hired to teach. George Pow succeeded him. No school was taught there after Mr. Pow retired until the district schools were opened, in 1827. The children from other sections, far and near, attended school in this log building.

The first school in the centre of the township was held in the log church west of Green Village. A log school-house was built on section 34, on land belonging to Jacob Stofer, which was attended by children from sections 27, 28, 33, and 34. Henry Zimmerman was the first teacher of this school, about 1815. William, Rachel, and Samuel Schofield, sons and daughter of David Schofield, afterwards taught in a second log school-house, built on the same ground.

At Washingtonville, a school was opened about 1818, in the log church built by Michael and Baltzer Roller. John Roller and Henry Gilbert were among the first teachers.

Owing to the imperfect records of schools in the early days, but little information can be obtained respecting them.

SCHOOLS IN 1844.

The following is from the earliest existing records: "12 schools taught in township; number of teachers, 10; number of children between the ages of four and twenty-one years, 338 males, 346 females; number of children enrolled, 295 males, 241 females; average daily attendance, 169 males, 131 females; amount paid to teachers of common schools from public fund,—to males, \$367.83; to females, \$125. Amount paid from other source,—males,

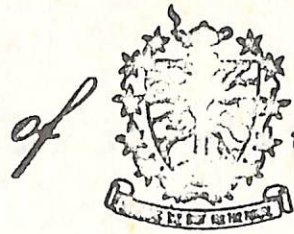

A 1/2 page is two of those small sections, side by side. One whole page speaks for itself! Payment must accompany the ad.

Oops, almost forgot. I hate deadlines, but I'm becoming aware that we do need the things for the Bulletin. So, we need the Bulletin ready to go, six weeks before the publishing month. Ads must be in to me by the first of the month before the six week deadline. I.E. MIAMI VALLEY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

In the historical room of the Troy-Miami County Public Library on April 2, 1970, the Miami Valley Genealogical Society was born. Thirteen interested persons met to lay the ground work for the society. Under the guidance of Mrs. Charles W. Vernon, serving as temporary chairman, a name was chosen and the following officers were elected: President, William E. Lynch of Dayton; 1st Vice-president, Donald E. Webb of Dayton; 2nd Vice-president, Shirley Couch of Vandalia; Secretary, Robert C. Kennedy of Dayton; Treasurer, Margaret Frazer of Vandalia; Director, Harry Couch of Vandalia; Publicity, Anita Short of Arcanum. The name Miami Valley Genealogical Society was thus chosen. The first Thursday of each month was set as the meeting night.

At the first meeting of the executive board, a constitution was drawn up. A membership fee of \$5 per year was decided upon, in order to undertake the administration of the society. Stationary for the Society was considered, and a suitable coat of arms for the society was needed. Margaret Frazer and Shirley Couch were appointed to design several originals; these designs were made and then voted upon by the members. The motto, "Searching the Past for the Future" was supplied by Harry Couch. Mr. Donald Webb took the design to Cincinnati and had it printed into the present coat-of-arms for the stationary, certificates, and membership cards.

At the second meeting of the Society, our membership had already grown to fifty persons. Many more people came out and we had to think about a new meeting place, since the historical room in the Troy Library was already too small. Several meeting places were considered and we found a meeting place at Wright State University. The University also had space for our research library. From time to time, members have donated books and papers and the Society has bought books, until our collection of volumes has grown into an interesting place to do research.

Our first meetings were on using books, articles, transparencies, and also talks on how to get started doing genealogical research. In August, 1970, we held our first workshop at the Inland Activity Center

on Needmore Road, Dayton. It was a very interesting meeting at which everyone had a chance to meet their fellow members and get acquainted. The workshop started at 2:00 P.M., and tables were devoted to such topics as courthouse searching, library searching, microfilm use, recording and indexing of information, and other relevant materials. A carry-in dinner was served in the evening and the workshop continued until 10 o'clock that evening.

As the Society grew, the correspondence and keeping of the minutes became too much for our secretary Robert Kennedy, so Mrs. Betty Lee was elected as Recording Secretary, but on Dec. 24, 1970, the Society was shocked by her death. Mrs. Lydia Koverman took her place.

In 1971, the following officers were elected: President, Dorothy Limbach; 1st Vice-president, Richard Cannon; 2nd Vice-president, George Brown; Corresponding Secretary, Patricia Schlipf; Recording Secretary, Lydia Koverman; Treasurer, Lois Lynch; Director, Robert Kennedy.

The first speaker for the Society was Miss Dorothy Lower, Head of the Historical and Genealogical Section of the Ft. Wayne, Ind. Library. Since then, we have had many interesting persons speak, including Mrs. Earl Pepiot, Regent of the Greenville Chapter of the D.A.R.; Mr. Louis Laurents, chief librarian of the Stake Library at Cincinnati, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints; John Webb, Information Consultant at Wright State University Library; Mrs. Lida Harshman, President of the Ohio Genealogical Society; Willard Heiss, noted genealogist, lecturer and author from Indianapolis; Gary Schuman, Executive Director of the Montgomery Co. Historical Society; L.K. Patton of Enterprises, Inc.; Mrs. Helen Van Meter; Mrs. Bernice Graham, State Regent of the D.A.R.; Joseph McDowell from the Cincinnati Public Library; Leonard Hill, a Piqua historian and genealogist; and many more distinguished persons. Many members of our own Society have brought interesting lectures on their genealogical gleanings. Don Bowman, George Robinson, Julie Overton, Dorothy Limbach, Robert Carr, Robert Kennedy, Clarence Shepard, and Dale Phillipi have all made interesting contributions. Our Society has also been honored by having a German visitor, Mr. Richard Goldman, who came to this country to learn more about his ancestors who live here. He became our first foreign honorary member.

When Wright State could no longer let the Society hold their meetings at the University, a new meeting place was found at the Montgomery County Vocational School on Hoke Road.

In November, 1971, the Society undertook the sponsoring of the sales

of the reprinting of W.H. Beers' History of Montgomery County, which was a very successful venture. We hope to launch upon another adventure soon, in doing the Memoirs of the Miami Valley set. The Society also publishes a quarterly magazine, called the Genealogical Aids Bulletin. The first year's publication was done by a committee of four; the second and third years have been edited by Julie M. Overton.

In 1973, the following officers were elected: President, Clarence Shepard; 1st Vice-president, Eilene Davis; 2nd Vice-president, Gerald Koverman; Recording Secretary, Jeanne Turner; Corresponding Secretary, Judy Ireton; Registrar, Margaret Morrow; Treasurer, Lois Lynch; Director, Bert Stoeckel.

Our Society has grown very fast from its small beginnings - may it continue to contribute much to the genealogical research in this area!

BOOK REVIEWS

The "Mary and John" A Story of the Founding of Dorchester, Mass., 1630, by Maude Pinney Kuhns. 254 pages with Index. Published by Charles E. Tuttle Co., Inc., Rutland, Vt. 05701. Order from the publisher; \$13.20

The Story of the passengers of the "Mary and John" is one steeped in the traditions of the heroism, struggle, virtue, and tragedy of the early settlers of this great new country, America. This book gives a short background of these people who made up the passenger list for this journey and then embarks on an extensive coverage of their forefathers who include many famous Americans. We find here the Ancestors of Nathan Hale, Ethan Allen, Ulysses S. Grant, as well as those of many prominent New England families.

Each passenger is covered in alphabetical order in the book in biographical outline. Names of children as well as data of birth, marriage, and death are given. Personal facts are included in each sketch and where evidence is disputed or the authenticity of a fact cannot be proven, this is stated. Within these biographical pages also are found five generation ancestral charts of numerous well-known descendants of these early settlers. It is here that I must take issue with the book. The omission of all locations for birth, marriage, and deaths was most noticeable to this reviewer. Without this very pertinent information, it is impossible to ascertain as to whether any of the information may or may not be relative to ones own line.

THE HISTORY OF THIS CHURCH

A plaque on the Tower Wall reads: Elizabeth River Parish was established by the Colonial Government before 1637. The first Parish church was at Mr. Newell's Point (the present Naval Operations Base). The first church erected on the site of Norfolk was The Chapel of Ease in 1641 (the present location of St. Paul's). Norfolk became a borough on September 15, 1736; and the present Church, known as the Borough Church, was built in 1739. Samuel Boush, an early Mayor of Norfolk, gave the bricks. The Parish was divided into: Elizabeth River Parish, Portsmouth Parish and St. Bride's Parish. The Church was struck and partially burned by the British on Jan. 1, 1776, when the Borough was bombarded and destroyed. (A cannon ball, which has been cemented back in place where it struck the southern wall of the Church, still remains to tell the story of that bombardment.)

The Church, established by law in Virginia, was disestablished by the result of the Revolutionary War; and its Glebe Lands were confiscated by the State. The Episcopal Church in Virginia was reorganized after the War. The building in 1832, after a period of disuse, was repaired and consecrated with the name of St. Paul's. During the Civil War, the Church was occupied by Federal Forces from 1862 to 1865. After the war, it was returned to the congregation. The Tower was erected on 1901.

On these Church grounds there have been: Old Peoples Home, and an Orphanage. At one time the Church paid for the services of a doctor to attend the poor who were sick. Rectors were at one time paid in tobacco, not money.

THE CHURCH YARD

The Church yard is very similar to the old yards of England. In 1944 a botanist made a list of the plants which include the following:

- Great mahogany-leaved magnolia trees
- Live Oak and Water Oak
- English Yew
- Yucca or Spanish Bayonets
- Holy-leaved Olive (Osmanthus).

The inscriptions on the 274 stones in the Yard were copied in 1902. The oldest is that of Dorothy Ferrell, January 18, 1673. Another, October, 1744, bearing a coat of arms with the motto "fide et Fiducis", was restored in 1892. The William Harris tombstone, which is on the south wall of the Church, bears the date "March 1687/8" -- formerly, in England, the legal year began on Annunciation Day, March 25; the change to January 1 as the beginning of the legal year took place on that day in 1752 (in Scotland in 1600). Hence, dates between Jan. 1 and March 25 are sometimes written thus: Feb. 21, 1574/5, that is, 1575 according to present reckoning.

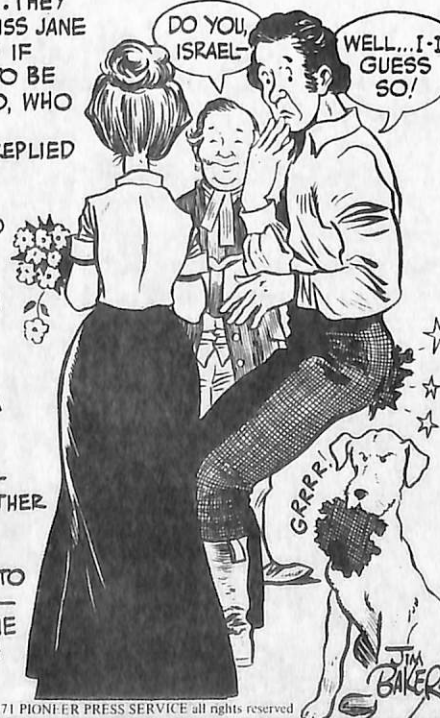

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Genealogy Generally

Robert C. Kennedy

In the entire field of American Bibliography there is perhaps at the present time no single subject with more interest to so great a number of people as genealogy. This is demonstrated by the numerous lists of manuscripts and books on the subject. In itself this fact is not so remarkable, except for the further fact that genealogy has taken its place in American Bibliography within the present generation.

This is evidenced today by the number of persons attending genealogical classes, lectures on the subject, the joining of Historical Societies, and the forming of Genealogical organizations.

Without a doubt many of us know of someone who is undertaking the research of their family tree and enjoying every minute of it. Anyone doing this thing a few years ago had to go through a period of light ridicule from family, friends and neighbors while pursuing his hobby. Not so today, you are out of step if you are not doing it.

The ultimate goal of most persons undertaking the research of their family tree is to produce, eventually, a documented history of their ancestry in the form of a manuscript, book or genealogy.

Today more and more Americans are becoming more conscious of their cultural heritage and producing more and more genealogies. At the time of the American Revolution hardly a genealogy had been written. But, by the end of the Civil War, nearly 300 genealogies had been produced.

At the end of World War I, an estimated 8,000 genealogies had been written. In 1968, there were over 20,000. Today that number has increased to over 100,000, an increase of 75% in the last few years attesting to that consciousness.

In the greatest book ever written, The Bible, there is no evidence whatsoever of ridicule in regards to the genealogy contained therein. Those who read, have read, and are familiar with the Bible know of the very large part that genealogy plays in it. For example, in Proverbs we read, "The glory of the fathers are in their children;" In the book of Genesis genealogy is given front rank in Scripture. Saint Mark traces the ancestry of Jesus Christ back to Adam.

Certainly the time has arrived when we can hardly consider ourselves as educated if we do not try to learn something of our own family history. Not caring about your forefathers or being too busy to take an interest in them simply stamps a man or a woman as forgetting one of the chief commandments; that is, to "Honor thy father and thy mother: (that thy days may be long upon the land.)"

This has been too long disregarded as being "of little or of no importance." Can we do less than to try to solve some of the questions of "Why we are, What we are?"

All this then brings up the big question. Just what is genealogy?

We can all read Webster's interpretation of the word "Genealogy," but to the Genealogist or researcher, the term has its own meaning.

Genealogy has been termed by the genealogist as the science of Personal Identification. It has for its object, "The discovery and permanent establishment by proofs and evidences which would be conclusive in any court of law, of the identity of the individual, both in his relation in his own particular family line as well as in his relations to those belonging to collateral lines of his general family."

All history begins with the individual and his family and as genealogy is the record of successive generations that created events of history, knowledge of its relation to history naturally belongs to the educational equipment of every American citizen.

Biography alone does not account for personal traits and characteristics, but the knowledge of both biography and ancestry helps explain many traits.

There is no more attractive line of study than that which aims at revealing the life and surroundings, the struggles and trials, the manners and customs of our once red blooded ancestors.

Ida Tarbell says in the book, FOOTSTEPS OF THE LINCOLNS,

"To those who love to reconstruct the lives of the sturdy people who made this country there is a curious consolation in sitting beside a wellkept, clearly marked grave of a man who left behind more blades of grass than he found, a clean memory, a better chance for his sons and daughters,--A headstone and a grave seem strangely to round out the earthly span. It seems a man's right."

It is no matter of surprise that Americans should be desirous of tracing their origin to the early settlers and of proving their descent from these God-fearing men who sought in a foreign land that religious liberty denied them at home. It should be remembered, moreover, that the early colonists of New England were with a few exceptions, men of family.

Not the least commendable characteristic of the Pilgrim fathers was the scrupulous accuracy with which they recorded the births and marriages of their children. The documents were carried down to the period of the Revolution.

If a descendant of the Early Settlers can trace his ancestry as far back as the middle of the eighteenth century, there is seldom much difficulty in determining to what English family he is allied.

You establish a family line, not by word of mouth, but by piecing together a multitude of items, hidden away in the records of the counties through which branches of the family have passed. It is in tax lists, deeds, wills, returns of marriages and deaths as well as birth certificates, the testimony brought out in law suits, church records, tombstones; all of the minute facts which men have agreed to save in order to fix definitely who and what we are, what we did, where we came from and when we left it all. These are the things which must be found and fitted together before we can finally answer with absolute sureness the question, "Who are we, and Why we are, What we are?"

One of the curious features in a hunt for ancestors is the help one derives from ancient quarrels, usually quarrels over property. Genealogists and biographers would be sadly hampered if it were not for the inability of men to settle disputes out of court.

We cannot do much historical and biographical work without learning that the memory of man, when it comes to exact details, is painfully unreliable. A conversation is rarely repeated twice alike. If any one of us tries to set down without documents the names of families into which relatives have married, the dates of births and deaths, we quickly find, unless we have a taste for genealogy which we have steadily cultivated that we fall into all sorts of errors. The lesson to impart here is not to commit to memory, but to put on record any and all facts researched.

THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

The American Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution was founded on October 11, 1890. The purpose was to perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publications of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolution soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge" thus developing an enlightened public opinion and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind the blessings of liberty.

Any woman is eligible for membership in the National Society of the DAR who is not less than eighteen years of age, and who is descended from a man or woman who, with unflinching loyalty to the cause of American Independence, served as a sailor, soldier or civil officer (Town Clerk, Selectman, Juror, Town Treasurer, Sheriff, Constable, Jailor, Surveyor of Highways, Justice of Peace) or Minister of the Gospel for the period of 1775-1783, in one of the several Colonies or States, or as a recognized patriot, or who rendered material aid thereto; provided the applicant is personally acceptable to the Society.

Under the leadership of the DAR there also exists The National Society, Children of the American Revolution. This was established in 1895 and there are now more than 16,000 members of the Children of the American Revolution. This Society includes both boys and girls, from birth to 18 years of age, at which time they become eligible for the DAR or SAR.

The DAR Library is one of the finest genealogical libraries in the world, occupies the main floor of the Memorial Continental Hall in Washington, D. C. It has more than 53,850 books and pamphlets and 25,000 manuscripts. The library is open to the public Monday through Friday from 9 till 4. There is a fee of \$1.00 per day for non-members. The month of April is reserved for DAR members.

The trained staff, always in attendance, gives assistance to those seeking information. The Library does not maintain a genealogical service, nor undertake research work. Names of professional workers in Washington, who do research for a fee, will be furnished on request. The DAR Genealogical Library is a reference library only, and books are not loaned.

The DAR magazine is the official organ of the National Society, first published in 1892. It contains articles of historic and national interest, as well as a message each month from the President General, DAR committees, chapter and member news, a general news page, and of interest to members of The Miami Valley Genealogical Society is the Query Section. The Dayton Public Library is furnished the magazines by the Daniel Cooper Chapter of the DAR, of Dayton. This is also true of the Oakwood Library.

The magazines in the Dayton Public Library are bound by years, and they have a card file, located in the Dayton Room, which will aid you in finding genealogical information. The December issue of the magazine has an index for all articles of that year. The State of Ohio also publishes a small magazine, which also includes a query section.

The DAR is extremely interested in securing unpublished genealogical source material. Each Chapter is required to submit at least five pages of family histories, bible records, etc., each year. When eighty pages have been obtained by a state, they are indexed, bound, and placed in the DAR Library.

Not to be forgotten, is the DAR Patriot Index, which lists the Revolutionary ancestors whose records have been accepted. This index has been helpful in assisting prospective members. The Dayton Public Library has these books through 1943 only. Under the Patriot's name you will find the name of the person who cleared the line with the DAR along with their national number, and a brief outline of the Patriot's service, including the state from which he served. These records can be obtained from the DAR in Washington, D. C.

Two schools depend upon DAR funds for maintenance: Kate Duncan Smith in Alabama and Tamassee in South Carolina. The DAR also contributes to five other schools, mainly in the form of gifts and scholarships.

Citizenship training and study of American Government and institutions are promoted. The DAR supplies copies of the DAR Manual of Citizenship to foreign born applying for citizenship, and help in preparing for naturalization examinations. In Dayton this service has been supplied by the Daniel Cooper Chapter.

Junior American Citizens' clubs are organized in the public, private and parochial schools, community and settlement houses, boys clubs, churches, classes for mentally retarded children, as well as state and church homes for children. The program is adaptable to all age groups from kindergarten through high school. There are no dues in these clubs and all materials such as handbooks, song sheets, study guides and pins are furnished by the DAR. JAC activities include patriotism, history, respect for the Flag, loyalty to and respect for the United States of America founded on a knowledge of why our country deserves such allegiance and a good junior citizenship program in terms of practical service to home, community and country, civics and government, conservation, health, safety, parliamentary procedure and, of course, parties, picnics, hobbies, projects, and crafts.

February of each year is American History month, with exhibits and celebrations. Essay contests on American history are held in schools and colleges throughout the country. Medals, Certificates of Awards, and Certificates of Appreciation are presented. Many documents of historical value are added to the collection of Americana.

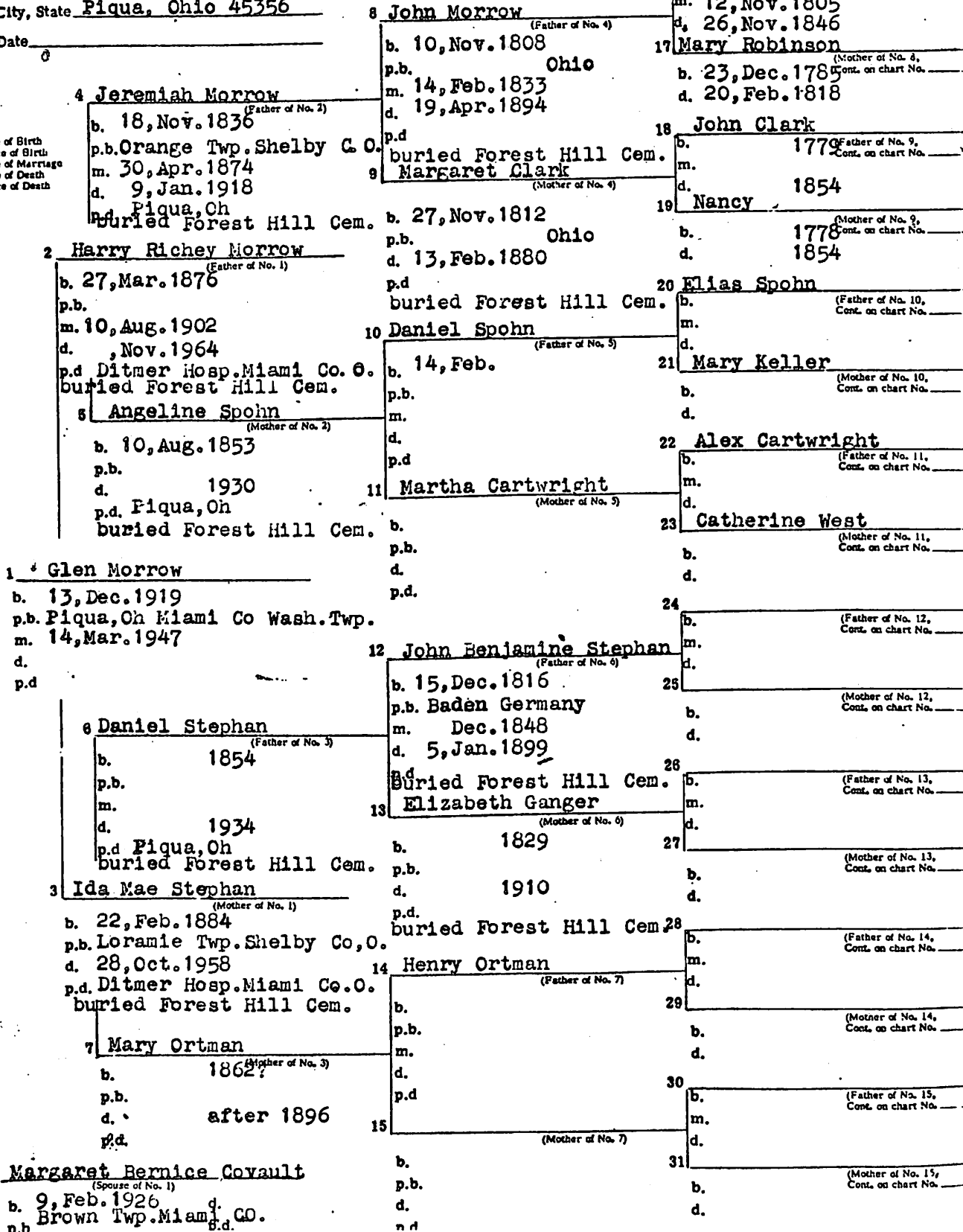

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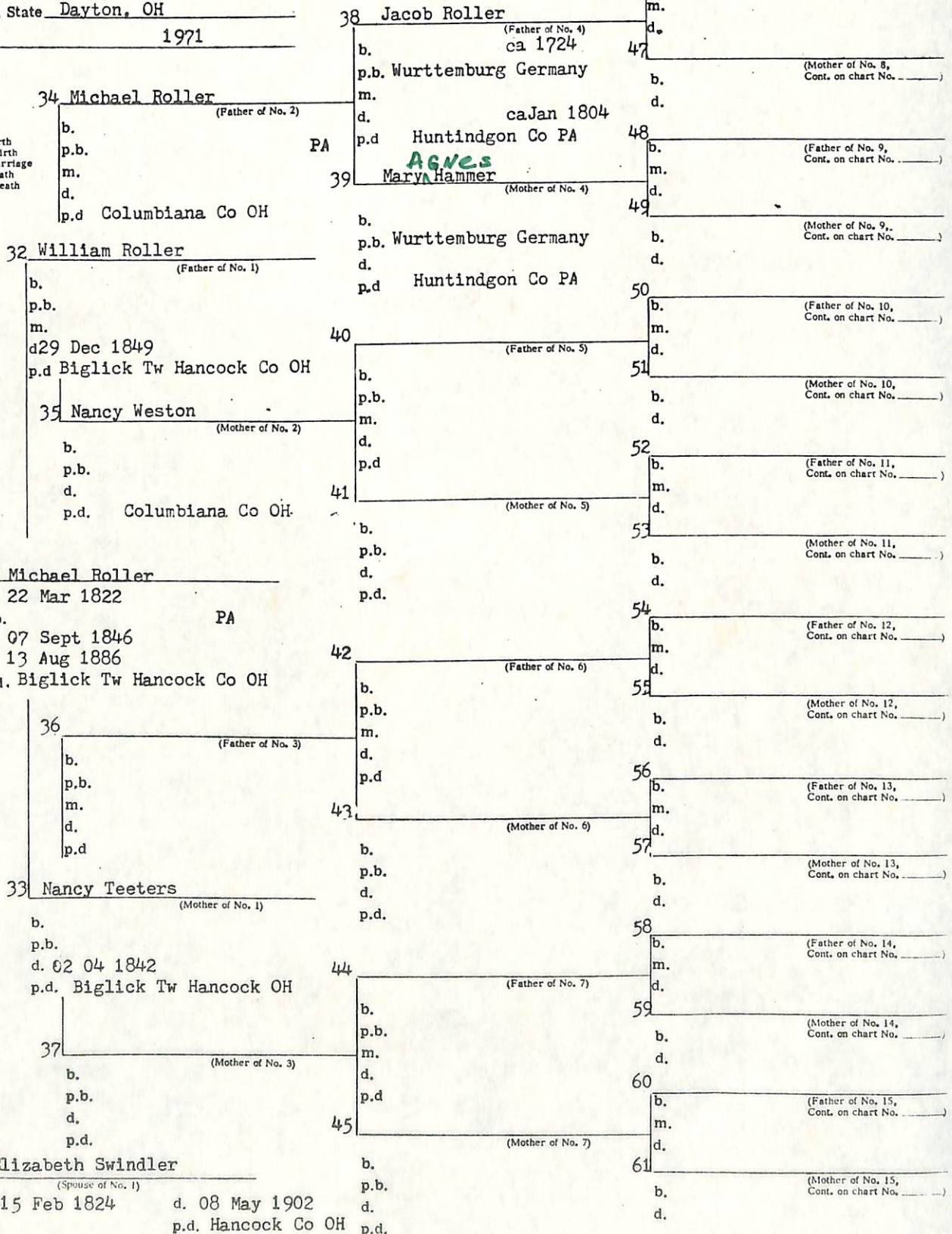

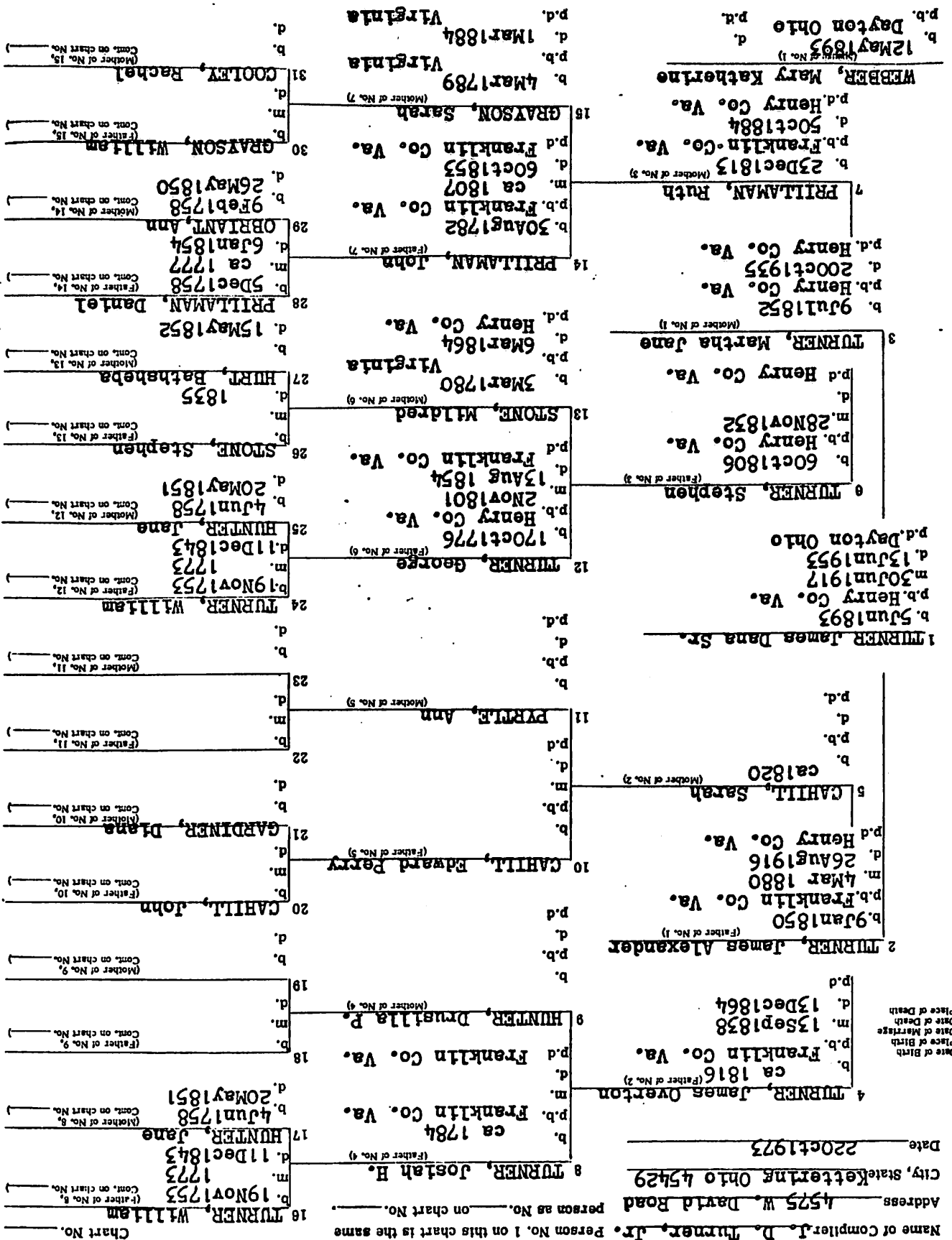
