#### PART VII

### RICHARD SHOCKLEY ANN BOYDEN

The earliest of this family who has been found was Richard Shockley who was "transported" into Maryland by James Robinson, his wife Barbareth and his daughter Frances. For this, James Robinson received 200 acres of land. He applied for this on June 19, 1671 and probably Richard Shockley worked for several years to repay him for his passage. [See: The Early Settlers of Maryland edited by Gust Skordas Asst. Archivist of the State of Maryland.]

Then October 4, 1674 Richard Shockley married Ann Boyden in Somerset Co., Maryland. Their first two children's births were recorded in Manokin, Somerset Co., Maryland: Richard Jr. was born June 1, 1677, and Elleanor was born April 25, 1680. [Maryland Eastern Shore Vital Records 1648-1725]

Mrs. Tripp's book provides this information but we have since verified it ourselves.

Richard Shocklee published his will December 7, 1708 in Somerset Co. and it was probated August 23, 1716. [Maryland Calendar of Wills by Cotton] His will named his wife, Ann, and sons Richard, David, William and John, and daughters Elener, Elizabeth and Mary.

So far we have been unable to find a will or other record to show the names of the children of Richard Jr. or William. [See Part VI "James" and Part IV "Thomas Sr."]

# DAVID SHOCKLEY Grace

Fortunately, David left a will dated Oct. 4, 1754, and deeds identifying his children; and his son James granted a Power of Attorney in Pittsylvania Co., Virginia dated July 14, 1783 to his son Charlton to dispose of a tract of land granted him near the head of the Nantico River Dec. 20, 1741, also to recover legacies from his father David.

According to Mrs. Tripp's book, page 90, Richard Shockley Jr. was living in Sussex Co., Delaware by 1722 with his wife Elizabeth. That same year he sold the 200 acres of land left him by his father in Somerset Co., Maryland located on a branch of Dividing Creek. The deed mentioned that he had formerly lived on this land which had been left him by his father "Richard Shockley decd. by his last will and testament dated Dec. 7, 1708" proving that Richard Shockley of Delaware was indeed the son of Richard Shockley of Somerset Co., Maryland. The deed mentioned that Richard Shockley Jr. was the eldest son and heir of Richard Shockley Sr. and that the land was part of a 400 acre tract called "Shockley's Piece" granted to Richard Shockley, Sr. by patent dated June 1, 1685.

A few years later David Shockley of Somerset Co., Maryland and Grace his wife also sold his 200 acres on Dividing Creek which land had been granted to him by his father Richard Shockley, Sr. decd. by will dated December 7, 1708. The deed stated that David was the younger son of Richard Shockley and that the land was a part of the same grant dated June 1, 1685.

David Shockley, the "younger son" of Richard Shockley, Sr. of Somerset Co., Maryland published his will October 4, 1754 in Worcester Co., Maryland and it was proved November 22, 1754. He named his sons: James, Solomon, John, and David; and daughters Agnes Engram, Love Rathborn and Emmely Rathborn; also mentioned David Shockley son of Solomon Shockley. Mrs. Tripp commented that, due to various changes in boundaries in the states of Maryland and Delaware, David actually settled in what is now Sussex Co., Delaware in Nanticoke Hundred below Cedar Creek Hundred.

Mrs. Tripp concluded that the children of Richard Shockley and Ann Boyden were all born in what is now Worcester Co., Maryland. After the death of Richard Sr., his sons Richard Jr., William and David Shockley migrated north and settled in what is now Sussex Co., Delaware. John Shockley, the fourth son settled in the part of Worcester Co., Maryland that is now Wicomico Co. Most of the Shockleys found in the 1850 census of Maryland were, therefore, most probably descendants of John while those of Sussex Co., Delaware were descendants of the other three. The Shockleys of Virginia were descendants of the Delaware group, and, from Virginia, descendants spread into South Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas. [See Part VI "James, Charlton, Levi, David, Salathiel."]

#### JOHN SHOCKLEY Will Probated 1766 Sarah

John Shockley purchased 176 acres in Somerset Co., Maryland on the south side of Wicomico River near its head in 1721; and in 1727 John Shockley of Somerset Co., Maryland (carpenter) and Sarah his wife sold 200 acres of land on the north side of Pocomico River and the north side of a branch of Dividing Creek which he had received by grant Sept. 28, 1706. Two years later in 1709 he purchased another 100 acres from William Wallis on the south side of Wicomico River, again showing that after the death of Richard Shockley Sr., the family began migrating north into what is now. Wicomico Co., Maryland and Sussex Co., Delaware.


In 1745/6 John Shockley of Worcester Co., Maryland sold this same 100 acres purchased from William Wallis to his son Richard. Sarah, his wife, relinquished her dower in a sale of land on the south side of Wicomico River in 1750.

John Shockley Sr. published his will January 19, 1761 in Worcester Co., Maryland and it was probated June 19, 1766. He mentioned his heirs: Isaac Benjamin, Jonathan, John, Solomon, Mary, and Sarah. [See Magruders Index of Maryland Colonial Wills 1634-1777.]

### JOHN SHOCKLEY II Will Probated 1773 Catherine

The younger John was born about 1725 in Worcester Co., Maryland. His will was probated in 1773 and it identifies his wife as Catwin or Caturn or Catherine. Mrs. Wood in her book on The Shockley Family of Pike Co., Georgia suggested that she may have been Catherine Coventon because they named their first son Thomas Coventon Shockley. According to land records Thomas Coventon was a neighbor. Their other sons were Jonathan who married Elizabeth Leonard, Elijah, and John.

Thomas Coventon Shockley and his brother Jonathan Shockley can be found in Greene Co., Georgia in the 1820 census. 600 Revolutionary Soldiers Living in Georgia by Houston lists Jonathan in Monroe County. In 1799 Jonathan is shown as a member of the Powelton Baptist Church, Hancock Co., Georgia. The reason we find so many people from Maryland in this area is that after the Revolutionary War a tract in Greene Co. and Washington Co. Ga. was reserved for soldiers.

# THOMAS COVENTON SHOCKLEY Maryland-Georgia-Alabama

The Will of Thomas C. Schokley appears in Will Book 1, 1838-1849, on page 40 of Russell Co., Alabama and a copy can be obtained from the Judge of Probate, Phenix City, Alabama 36867. It identifies his wife Malinda; his daughters Elizabeth Stewart, Martha Short, Mary J. Hamill, and the youngest as Siena; sons William and Archibald. It was dated February 3, 1840. William D. of Upson Co., Georgia was named as one of the Executors.

An examination of <u>Upson Co.</u>, <u>Georgia Marriages</u> by <u>Ingmire reveals:</u>
Martha Shockley married James Shot July 20, 1829
William D. Shockley married Elizabeth L. M. Magehee July 22, 1829
Mary Shockley married Hugh W. Hamill June 24, 1832
Archibald Shockley married Nancy Turner September 23, 1832

In 1979 I received a letter from Mrs. Vernon J. Gomez of Austin, Texas (Eugenia) who had been given my name and address by Woodland G. Shockley of Vicksburg, Mississippi.

She had found her husband's great grandparents on his mother's side in Robertson Co., Texas in 1880 and 1900. She was particularly eager to find William Dent Shockley in an earlier record to find his first wife who she thought was her husband's great great grandmother. Since William Dent Shockley was about twenty-three years older than Nancy Ann Belle Shockley they thought he was her father but further research revealed that they were brother and sister. There had been several marriages between the Sanders and Shockley families so that the Sanders had practically "absorbed the Shockley line." The several women named "Nancy" also confused us.

We thought that William Dent Shockley probably was the son of William D. Shockley but census records show he was the son of Archibald, and Marriage Records 1833-1887 Russell Co., Alabama by Hobbs shows William D. Shockley married Nancy Trotter March 18, 1857. The author added a comment that the grandfather of Nancy Trotter was John Brown.

It was the name William D. that led us back to the Thomas Coventon Shockley family. Also as in many instances, the Texas Civil War pensions were extremely helpful. The widow's application usually contains more information than the veteran's from a genealogical point of view. Applications can be obtained for both W. D. Shockley, No. 3467, and for Mrs.Sallie Shockley, No. 21341. Her application shows that William Dent Shockley was born in Georgia, died December 31, 1901, they married May 23, 1870 in Troup Co., Georgia. She was age 65 in 1912 [1911], born in Chattahoochee Co.,Ga. She had lived in Texas since 1874. She died November 17, 1920 in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Kate Davis. Her son, J. L. Sanders, applied for Mortuary Warrant.

From the following census records and their family records, Eugenia and Vernon Gomez traced his lineage back to Thomas Coventon Shockley and his wife Malinda.

Their son Emmett had a daughter, Mrs. Elvie Shockley Spikes, with whom Eugenia and Vernon J. Gomez visited before her death. Mrs. Spikes did not know about Archibald, her great grandfather.

#### JONATHAN SHOCKLEY Elizabeth Leonard

Mrs. Jacqueline Shockley Woods of Jonesboro, Georgia published a book in 1980 on The Shockley Family of Pike County, Georgia. She has proven a DAR line to Jonathan Shockley (1756-1837) who married Elizabeth Leonard. Her book covers the family who remained in Georgia.

After the 1900 and 1910 censuses were opened, I read some for Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, et al. and attempted to identify those who showed they were born in S. C. or Georgia or Alabama. In her book Mrs. Tripp referred to the "constellation of names theory," and the repetition of family names from generation to generation certainly has been an aid in trying to trace families.

Early in 1986 I received a letter from Mrs. Lloyd Fite, 11938 Longleaf, Houston, Texas 77024, who had obtained my name from Al Shockley [see Part III "Richard b. 1783"]. Mr. Fite is a descendant of John Shockley who was born in Georgia, probably Greene Co., Nov. 5, 1811, a son of Michael Leonard Shockley and Frances O'Rear.

This John married Lurilla (Relly) Smith and they had a son James Leonard Shockley b. May 17, 1840. James Leonard m. Nancy Melvina Boon on August 1, 1861 and Pat Fite found them in Cass Co., Texas in the 1880 c. Their son Thomas Wana Shockley was born in Cass Co., Tx. July 18, 1875. On Jan. 19, 1902 he married Linnie Josephine Alford. Their daughter Evelyn was Lloyd Fite's mother. She was born October 1, 1911 in Comanche Co., Texas and married Hunter Gassaway Fite May 19, 1928. Pat Fite has her genealogy neatly recorded on her computer and beautifully organized.

At the 1986 Mesquite, Texas, Genealogical Society Workshop, I met Mrs. Gwendolyn Blount who has a Shockley ancestor. About all she knew was that

her great grandmother Amanda Shockley Walker was born August 3, 1845, and married James Sanders Walker August 3, 1863 in Union Co., Arkansas. However they were both living in Claiborne Parish, La. when they married. She died April 17, 1933 in Comanche, Texas and is buried in the Pendergrass Cemetery at Sidney, Texas, Comanche County.

When I reviewed the children of Michael Leonard Shockley born in 1784 in Maryland, I realized that Benjamin S. Shockley had sisters named Mary Ann, Francis, Susan, Elizabeth and Harriet. This suggested that he named daughters after his sisters so the Mary Ann and S. F. Shockley who married in Claiborne Parish, La. in 1856 and 1859 could be his daughters also. We have not found him in the 1850 census. I am inclined to believe that the Seaborn Shockley who was married with one son in Pike Co., Georgia in the 1840 census is this Benjamin S.; also that in the 1860 census for Claiborne Parish, La. there is room for another daughter between M. W. and Fan, and between Fan and Manda. The one I first read as Mauda is the right age for Amanda, Gwen Blount's great grandmother. Union Co., Arkansas adjoins Claiborne Parish, Louisiana.
