

WILL OF
WILLIAM SMITH

State of South Carolina

In the Name of God Amen, I William Smith of S: Bar-
tholomew Parish and State aforesaid, Knowing the uncertainty
of Life and that it is appointed for all to die and being
perfectly in my Senses, Do make this my last Will and Testa-
ment In Manner and form following (that is to say) To my
Son John Smith I give and bequeath (as follows) a Mulatto Wench
Named Rose, her and her Son George, and a Negro Boy Named
Prince, One Feather Bed & Furniture, also the said Wench
Rose's future Issue, together with a Writing desk, But in case
that my Son John Smith Shou'd die before my Daughter Elizabeth
then and in that case, I give and bequeath the Said Wench
Rose & her future Issue to my Said Daughter Elizabeth and in
case that She & my Son John both Shou'd die before my Son
William then and in that Case I give and bequeath said Wench
and her future Increase to my Said Son William Smith. To my
Daughter Elizabeth I give and bequeath as follows, a Young
Wench Named Befs, a Girl named Rinah & a Mulatto Girl Named
Nancy, them and their future Issue, but Said Wench Befs is to
remain with the rest of my Negroes till all my lawful debts
are discharged, and in Case that my Daughter Elizabeth Should
die without leaving lawful Issue, or Such Issues if any Shou'd
not arrive to the Age of Maturity then and in that case it is
my Will and desire that the said Negroes, Befs, Rinah & Nancy
Shou'd return to my surviving Heirs to be equally divided be-
tween them, Also to my daughter Elizabeth I give and bequeath
One Feather Bed & Furniture, To my Son William Smith I give
and bequeath a Young Woman called Lyndia a Lad Stepney and a
boy Named Jacob together with the Wench Lyndia's future Issue ,
Also one Feather Bed and Furniture, known to be the one I
call my Own, but the fellow Stepney is to remain with the
rest of my Negroes together with the Wench Lyndia untill all

my lawful and Just debts are discharged, and in Case that my Son William Should Die without leaving lawful Issue or if any Issue they be or She do not arrive to the Age of Maturity then and in that case it is my Will and desire that the aforesaid Negroes, Lyndia, Stepney and Jacob Should return to the Survivors or Surviving Heirs of my Estate to be equally divided between them, also I give and bequeath to my Grand Son William Smith, the Sum of Two hundred Pounds Sterling Money to be paid to him at the Age of Twenty One, but Shou'd he die before then and in that Case the Said Sum of Two hundred pounds Shou'd remain with my Estate aforesaid, The aforesaid Sum of Two hundred pounds to be paid out of the Neat proceeds of my Estate, Its my Will and desire that a Mulatte Girl Named Rose Shou'd be Sot free immediately after my death and that she shou'd be Sent to School till she can read Well in the Bible and Write a hand to be understood, and the costs of which to be paid out of the Annual proceeds of my Estate, and after she has get the Schooling aforesaid, it is my Will and desire that she Shou'd be bound to a Montean Maker for the Space and term of Four Years, at the end of Said time it is my Will and desire that She Shou'd have Five pounds Sterling Money paid her, Also it is my Will and desire that she the Said Girl Rose Shou'd have immediately after my death, One Matrafs, two P of Osnaburgs Sheets (fine) Two or three Blankets One bolster & one Pillow and as fast as any or the whole of Said Matrafs, Sheets, Blankets, Bolster or Pillow Shou'd ware out, it is my Will that she Shou'd be furnish'd with as many or the whole till she has servd her time with the Mantua Maker It is also my Will and desire that my Whippy Swamp Plantation or Tract of Land Shou'd be Sold to the best advantage after my Death, as my Executors shall think fit, in order to help/^{to} pay my Just Debts, The rest & residue of my Estate both real & personal I give to my Three Children before mentioned Share and Share alike, but in case either of them

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Shou'd die without leaving lawful Issue, or if lawful Issue and they do not arrive to the Years of Maturity then and in that case it is my Will and desire that the One or More so dieing that their part shall return to the Survivor or Survivors of them and in case that the whole of my Childrens Shou'd die without leaving lawful Issue or if leaving lawful Issue & they do not arrive to the Age of Maturity then and in that case it is my Will and desire that the whole of my Estate shall fall to my Grand Son William Smith & my Nephew James Smith and my Niece Mary Gofs, that is to Say, my Grand Son William to have the One half of Said Estate and my Nephew and Niece the other half equally to be divided between them, And lastly I do hereby Nominate and appoint my Son John Smith, my Friends John North and Francis Berry Executors of this my last Will and Testament. In Witnefs whereof I have hereunto Set my hand and Seal this fourteenth day of January Anno domini One thousand Seven hundred Ninety Two.

It is also my Will and desire that the said Mulatto Girl Rose, Shoud be Cloth'd with Oznaburgs in Summer & fine brown Negre Cloth and flannel every Year after my death till she is free from the Mantua Maker, and White Linen Shifts, Shoes & Hats .

It is also my Will and desire thay my Mulatto Wench Rose Shou'd not be remov'd from the buildings where she now resides, untill there be a Vendue and all the small articles Sold, any thing to the contrary before mentioned notwithstanding.
