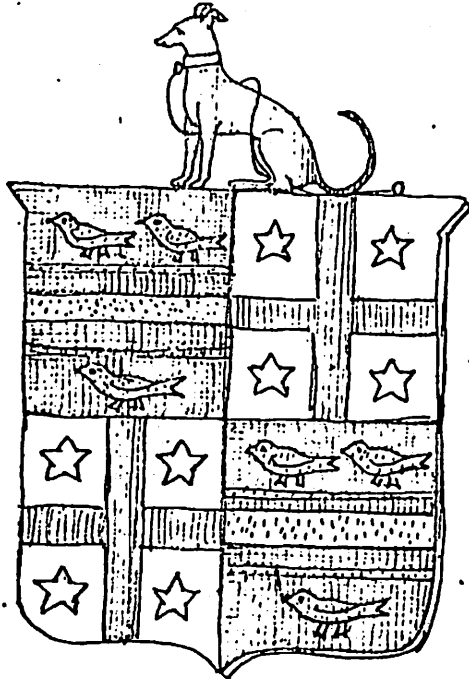

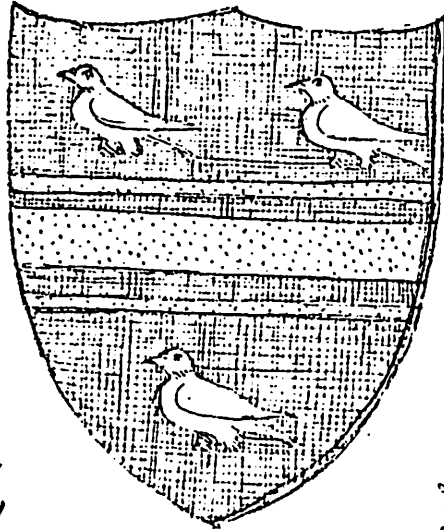

mem: This date letter appears to be most like that given by J. H. Bush in his table of "London date letters" (in his "O.E.D. Plate", printed for Jonathan Mumfords & Co. N.Y. 1888.)  
for 1771-2!



It was not quite clear whether the birds were intended to be dotted (to indicate gold) or not. There were some dots on them but whether they were accidental or were the remnants of a complete dotting, the rest being removed, we did not appear -



Coat of arms (minus crest), with hall mark from a silver salver still in the possession of the Landgrave Smiths - i.e. eldest male branch descended from Thomas Smith, first Landgrave Smith of South Carolina. Drawn from the original silver, in their home at Sumnerville, S.C. - 14<sup>th</sup> April, 1910 - J. M. Clinton Read

The Sandgraves are still extant.  
One is the marriage certificate of the  
Governor and Baroness de Wernhardt,  
his second wife. The other is a silver-  
mounted double-barrelled revolving  
pistol owned by the second Thomas. The  
Crest on this weapon has the Chausson  
in the illustration [sic!]

"Arms - Sa. a fess erm.  
colised or, between three  
martlets of the last -

"Crest - A greyhound  
sejant gu. collared and  
chained with a line re-  
flected on the back or.  
Charged on the throat with  
an annulet or.

"Note - The fess or-  
mine is from family  
plate - It is usually  
blazoned or."

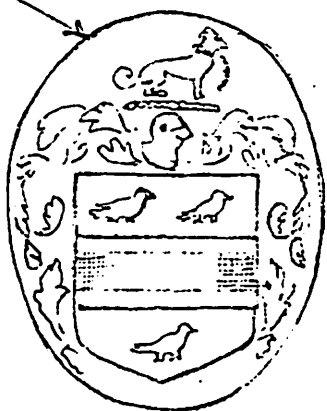
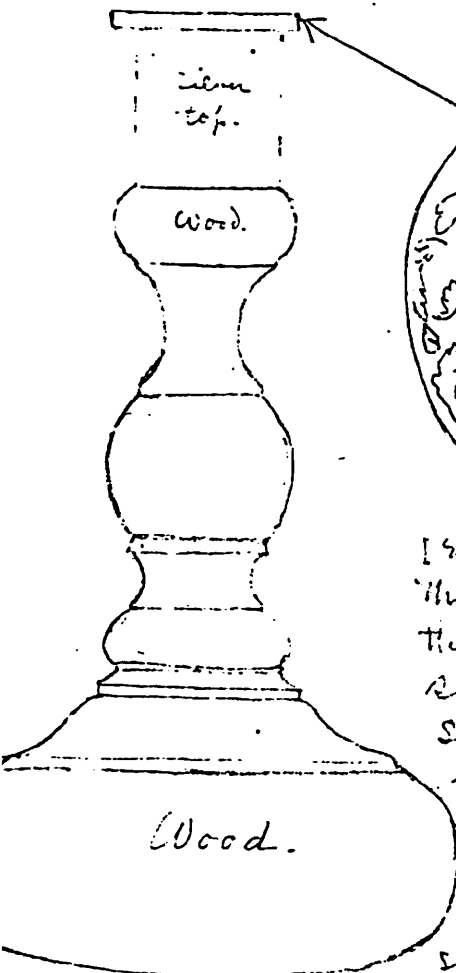

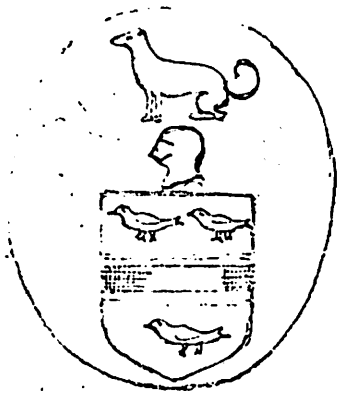

This old seal is still in possession of the Landman Smiths. - is the eldest male branch. The name descends from John Smith, first Landman Smith. So called drawn from the original in Sumnerville, S.C. by M. A. R. Oct. 11, 1910
