It gives a full account of the Stoney family.

They came to England in the 10th Century from Denmark. They got the name from the Stony tract they owned in Yorkshire. The record states that John Stoney, a grandson of a younger son of George Stoney of Kittleill, emigrated from Ireland (1774) to So. Caro. about 1770, when he founded an influential family, at present represented by Capt. W. E. Stoney of Charleston, excontroller general of So. Car. A distinguished office in the South.

Mr. Theodor Stoney of Charleston who built in 1863 the first cigar shape torpedo boat. Geo. M. Stoney, an officer in the Navy, Judge Stoney of California & coentitled to a coat of arms.

They have always been men in prominent places, both in English army & navy. George S. Capt. in English Navy killed while fighting his ship.
