I. JOHN STONEY ("CAPTAIN JACK") MARRIED ELIZABETH CAULFIELD OF KNOCKSHEGOWNA, IRELAND AND ARRIVED IN SOUTH CAROLINA WITH THEIR SON, JAMES STONEY, BORN APRIL 1772. IN 1784 HE BOUGHT LOTS 13 AND 14 OF BAYLEY'S BARONY WHICH HE NAMED "OTTERBURN PLANTATION" AND THERE PLANTED INDIGO AND COTTON. HE ALSO OWNED A PRIVATEER, THE "SAUCY JACK", WHICH HE OPERATED QUITE PROFITABLY UNDER A LETTER OF MARQUE. IN 1788 CAPTAIN JACK STONEY AND ISAAC FRIPP DIRECTED THE BUILDING OF ZION CHAPEL OF EASE OF ST. LUKE'S PARISH ON HILTON HEAD ISLAND. HE WAS KILLED IN A HUNTING ACCIDENT AND BURIED AT FISH HALL PLANTATION IN 1821; HIS REMAINS WERE LATER REMOVED TO ZION CEMETERY. THE

STONEY HISTORY

Dublin (born 1742)

Dr. George Mosse was an educated physician from/Ireland (probably Scotch-Irish from North Ireland as he was a protestant Episcopalean) and came to South Carolina in the Parish of St. Thomas & St. Denis some years before the Revolution. He settled at ~~St. Helena Island (see records of married (1) 30 Oct 1767 Elizabeth Martin. After her death in Land grants in the State House).~~ He brought a young wife with him, who shortly childbirth, he moved to St. Helena Island. ~~died, leaving no issue.~~

He later married the ¹⁷⁷⁰ ~~daughter~~ ^{sister} of a neighbor, a Mr. William Norton, who came of a fine English family and had their coat of arms. By his second wife, ^{Dorothy} ~~Phoebe~~ (born 10 Nov 1751, daughter of Jonathan & Mary Ann (Chaplin) Norton) Norton, Dr. George Mosse has seven daughters.

Dr. Mosse lived in Savannah for a few years and ^{was Founding Deacon 1795 of} ~~joined~~ the First Baptist Church (the records of the church of (1800-1806)). He moved back to S. Carolina, purchased land and settled near Black Swamp, once Beaufort District, now ^{Jasper} ~~Hampton~~ Co. He lived there one year and died ^{17 Feb 1808} ~~in 1807~~ and he and his wife, who died ^{March} ~~7 years~~ ¹⁸⁰⁸ ~~later~~, were buried on the plantation, but their graves cannot be found. Dr. Mosse was said to be port Physician while in Sav. and to have founded a medical school but no records of this can be found.

During the Revolutionary War, Dr. George Mosse was a prisoner of War on the British Prison Ship "Packhorse" in Charleston Harbor May 18th 1781. We have this from family records and from Ramsay's History of the Revolution in South Carolina. Page 543. Mosse was spelled in old English letters & reads Mofse. He was an elegant and highly educated man & his daughters also had every advantage & accomplishment, rare in those days.

This George Mosse Stoney married Katherine/Jenkins of ~~Edisto~~ Island. They had three children ^{on 18 Jan 1823} ~~by her~~ ^{Woodward}. Later he married Sarah/Barnwell and had George Stoney (killed in the Civil War) & several daughters, Charlotte, Emma, Addie, Annie. We descend from Katharine Jenkins, the first wife, dau. of Isaac Rippon & Hannah (Scott) Jenkins
John Joseph Stoney, James married- the minister - Miss Read of Beaufort - Elizabeth.

Died, on the 17th of February, at his usual residence on Black Swamp, Beaufort District, of a lingering illness, which he bore with uncommon patience and Christian resignation, in the 67th year of his age, Doctor George Mosse. He was a native of Ireland, but for about 40 years an inhabitant of this state, of which he has been a respectable and useful citizen.- To his adopted country he was a firm, constant friend; but his philanthropy embraced all mankind.

The Doctor was particularly known and respected as the zealous friend and supporter of Religion; from which he derived his present, and expected his future happiness. In the profession of it he was open, yet unostentatious; in his attachment to it, rational, unshaken and uniform.- His religious sentiments were those which are usually stiled evangelical; making the righteousness and atonement of the Redeemer the ground of his hope for pardon and acceptance with God; and considering morality and virtue as the native fruits of faith - the inseparable concomitants of Divine love.

Though not inattentive to other books of usefulness, his reading was principally in those of a religious and devotional kind; but especially in the Sacred Scriptures, to which he gave serious, daily attention. In consequence of which his mind was happily stored with the knowledge of divine subjects. On his hours of devotion, he would not suffer the cares and business of the world to intrude.

In relative life, he was a sincere, candid friend, an affectionate Husband; a fond Father; and an indulgent Master; - And it may be truly said of him, that he was the orphan's friend; that he made the widow's heart sing for joy; and that he did not send the needy, and distressed, empty and mourning from his door.

His last scene presented a grand and pleasing spectacle - just before he closed his eyes in death, he said, in an apparent rapture of joy - "Lord Jesus! receive my spirit. Glory! Glory to God, who has given me the Victory!"

A pious Widow, seven Daughters, and many friends lament the loss of this good man.
