#### NOTES ON BOOKS.

THE GILMAN GENEALOGY, by ALFRED GILMAN, of Lew, Me., Albany: Joel Kneass, 1884. Pp. 24. 25c.

We have seldom, if ever, examined a genealogy (in which we were not personally interested) with so much pleasure, as we enjoyed in the perusal of this. Handsomely printed by Munsell, and well illustrated by very excellent and well engraved steel plate portraits, as well as wood cut views of localities in England and this country, associated with the family history—the external appearance of the volume leaves nothing to be desired. The contents evince the same conscientious and loving care and accuracy. The English portion of the history is full and interesting—the biographies numerous and well written, and the arrangement convenient—while reference to any person or anything mentioned in the book, is rendered perfectly easy and satisfactory, by the numerous indexes of persons, families, places, books referred to, etc., which are given. That one devoted to the Gilman family has a very convenient arrangement, one that we have never before

seen employed for distinguishing the various persons bearing the same christian name. It is to give the date of birth and decease of each, thus:

" 1734, 1806 118.  
" 1772, 1772 200.

The edition consists of three hundred copies in small quarto, and twenty copies on large paper; these last bearing eleven additional photographs.

J.; thence, about 1788, removed to Hudson, N. Y.; again moved about 1809, to Green, N. Y., where he died in 1824. Also, a genealogy of his descendants.

MY WIFE AND MY MOTHER. HARTON. WILLIAMS, Wiley & Walsworth, 1881. 15c. 212 pp. and 6 additional pages of Genealogy. (Privately printed.)

This compactly printed volume, prepared by HERMAN B. BARBER, for many years well known as Probate Judge of Herford County, Conn., contains very full biographies (with extracts from correspondences) of his deceased wife, Frances Elizabeth (daughter of Meritt and Charles) Merrill, and of his mother, Naomi (daughter of Solomon and Hannah) Humphrey, both of Bathamsted, Conn.

The Genealogical portion, separately pagged, displays a great amount of research and careful thought, and traces his wife's lineage to the following families: viz.: *Merrill, Jordan, Britton, Kerns, Frasier, Lyman, Ford, Pratt, Abner, Greenleaf, Good, Blackland, Jones, Ayres, Wells, Yellin, Cross, Goodwin, Clark, Quitt, Jans, Trumbull, Howe, Bennett, Wrighton, Brown, Bull, Green, Clark*. His mother's lineage is traced to the families, of *Humphrey, Grant, Clayton, Mills, Bull, Day-plin, Dyer, French-Myer, Dudley, Lott, Hight, Hildon, Bliss, Clayton, Drake, Moore, Bennett, Giddis, Leman, Scott, Eggleston, Hooper, Owen, Ford, Dow and Bidwell*.

BROTHER OF THE AYLEWORTH FAMILY, BY GEORGE AYLEWORTH. Utica: Bennett, Weeks & Javay, 1840.

This is a pamphlet of twelve pages, without cover, giving one line of the family, without dates for four generations, except in the family of William Ayleworth, of the fourth generation, whose descendants seem to be fully named, and in three of the households full dates are given. An appendix of three pages contains some account of other branches, without dates, and the author's conclusion that Arthur Ayleworth was born in Wales in 1656, and was a brother of Theophilus who, in 1664, fled to Holland, remained several years, spelling his name "Elworth," then with his family settled in the city of New York, where many of the descendants still remain. They spell their name "Glammill" also. He also supposes that another brother died in 1670, and settled in Connecticut, whose descendants "spell their names Elworth;" and says, "no this family belonged Chief Justice Oliver Elworth, who was born at Windsor, Ct., April 28th, 1745, and died 1807, aged 62 years, and William W. Elworth, present Governor of that State." Unfortunately for this last conclusion the ancestor of the Elworths of Windsor, had been many years in that place before 1670.

Arthur Ayleworth came to America about 1691, married Mary Brown, of Providence, R. I., and settled in North Kingston, R. I., where he died in 1726, aged 69 years.

Memorial of a portion of the BOLLING Family, in England and Virginia. Richmond, Va.: W. H. Wade & Co., 1868. 1c. 66.

This interesting volume, which we have merely glanced at, in a friend's library, forms No. IV of "Wynne's Historical Documents from the Old Dominion," and contains mainly of a Memorial of the Bolling Family, written by Robert Bolling, of Chelover, Buckingham Co., Virginia,—translated from the original French manuscript, by John Robertson, Jr., son of William, 1808. It is printed in small quarto form and is cursorily illustrated by excellent portraits, photographs from original paintings of Robert Bolling, husband of Jane Rolfe, Granddaughter of Pocahontas; John Bolling, son of Jane Rolfe; Mary Kennon, wife of said John Bolling; John Bolling, Jr., and Elizabeth Blair, his wife; Richard Ban-

dolph of Corlew, and Jane Bolling, his wife; Richard Randolph, Jr., of Corlew, and Anne Meade, his wife; John Blair, of Cobbe, and Betsy Gray, his wife; John Blair, of Supreme Court of the U. S.; Rev. Harch Blair; his wife, daughter of Richard Randolph, of Corlew, and Ann Meade Bolling, daughter of Col. William; of Robert Bolling, of Chelover, the author of the memoir.

These three well printed, well arranged and compact genealogies are the work of Mr. Charles Myrick Thurston, of New Rochelle, Westchester Co., N. Y. 1 and 280 copies of each were printed at the joint expense of Richard Latham, Allen Melville, Rachel M. Burroughs, Rachel H. Thurston and the author. Copies, he understood, will be sent to contributors toward the cost of printing.—No. 1 and 2, at 91 each; No. 3, at 75 cents.

These works evince a great amount of careful research and are peculiarly rich in genealogical matter relating to other Rhode Island families, such as the *Cypriani, French, Adams, Clark, Bull, Brewster, Rogers, Almon, French-Myer, Smith, Coffin, etc.* The copies of these pamphlets presented to the Society's Library, by the author, are enriched by a great number of manuscript additions and references, etc.

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This pious & honorable Pair were blessed with a numerous Family of Children, seven Sons & three Daughters. Their Names are as follow: John, William, Richard, Daniel, Stephen, James and Ebenezer, Sarah, Hannah & Rebecca. The Order of the Birth of these Children is not named so far as respects the Place of the Birth of the Daughters between the Sons, otherwise the Order is correct. (2)

John, the eldest Son, married, settled in East Haddam & had five Children, two Sons & three Daughters; the Names of the Sons were Samuel & Amos & the Names of the Daughters, Hannah, Sarah and Abigail. (?) Samuel Booge lived a Bachelor & died at a very advanced Age, Amos became a married Man but lived and died Childless. Hannah lived a Maid & died at a great Age. Sarah married & had one Child. Abigail married & had no Child. This family as to male Heirs has become extinct.

William Booge, the second Son, had four Sons, William, Jonathan, Ephraim & Timothy (2). William married but died without Issue, from the above record it appears that Daniel Ome, senior, married for his second wife Rebecca, widow of Richard Walkley.

NOTES AND QUERIES.

**SPICER.**—In the Record, vol III, p. 186 among "Records of the Society of Friends of New York, and Vicinity," is given the list of the children of Samuel and Hester Spicer, of Gravesend. The second child is, "Jacob Spicer was borne 7<sup>th</sup> mo. of 1768."

In Barber and Howe's *Historical Collections of New Jersey*, p. 128, occurs this passage: "The following inscription was copied from monuments in an old graveyard, now overgrown with timber, at Cold Spring. They commemorate a father and a son who occupied prominent stations in Society in their day: 'In memory of Col. Jacob Spicer, who died April 17th, 1741, aged 73 years.

Death thou hast conquered me,  
I by thy shafts am slain  
But Christ shall conquer thee,  
And I shall rise again.

Jacob Spicer, Esq., departed this life Sept. 17th, 1765, in the 49th year of his age. If aught that's good or great could save,  
Spicer had never seen the grave.

His wife, who lies by his side, has upon her monument:  
' Judith Spicer departed this life Sept. 7th, 1747, in the 35<sup>th</sup> year of her age.  
Virtue and piety give way to death,  
Or else the entombed had ne'er resigned her breath."

Among the constituents who purchased a parsonage for the Cold Spring Presbyterian Church, in 1721, and whose names are given by the same authority, is "Col. Jacob Spicer."  
Cold Spring is a mile or two from Cape Island. Subtracting his age from the time of his death, would make Col. Jacob Spicer born in 1688, and I have no doubt he is the same person whose birth is given in the Record, as above stated. A great many people from Long Island and Connecticut settled in Cape May County, as well as in Cumberland County. He seems to have become a Presbyterian. Jacob Spicer the 2d was for many years a member of the Legislature of the Colony of New Jersey, and with his colleague, Aaron Leaming, also of Cape May (whose father, Christopher, also came from Long Island) was the compiler of what is known as Leaming and Spicer's Collection of the Laws, the earliest Collection of the Laws of this Province.
