BLOUNT FAMILY OF POLK COUNTY, FLORIDA

In October, 1851, Reading Blount, with his wife, Elizabeth (Varn) Blount, and their five children, viz: Riley Reading, his wife and four children; Owen R., his wife and two children; Nathan S., unmarried; John J., not grown; their son-in-law Streathy Parker, with his wife, Mary (Blount) Parker, and two children; together with John Davidson and wife, Eve (Varn) Davidson, with their one child, making twenty-one white, and about a dozen negro slaves, constituted a colony that came from near Alligator (now Lake City), in Columbia County, Florida, and located about one mile west of the present Court House in Bartow, Polk County, Florida. This land was at that time lying in Hillsborough County, from which Polk County was formed in 1861. Reading Blount had come into Columbia County from Beaufort County, S. C. prior to 1840, for in the Census of that year we find him in that County with his wife and five others, no doubt, the above five children.

Near the first location, Riley Blount purchased a small improvement from the noted Capt. James Green and paid him \$40.00 for it, and afterwards laid a preemption claim upon it, embracing the 160 acres which was the land later sold to Mr. Jacob Summerlin, and

now constituting a part of the present City of Bartow. The country was absolutely new, as there were no more than a dozen families in what is now Polk County. Two or three families lived in that section of the County now known as Seacrest, and a few in the neighborhood of Fort Meade. These, with the Blount colony and a garrison of United States soldiers, and a hundred or more Seminole Indians, composed the population of the present Polk County.

JOHN CHURCHILL READING BLOUNT, known as Reading Blount, was born in Beaufort County, S. C., March 12, 1791, died near Bartow, Polk County, Florida, February 22, 1879, and is buried in Oak Hill Cemetery at Bartow, by the side of his first two wives. He was married three times.

His 1st. wife was Elizabeth Varn, born in S. C., daughter of Matthias Varn, son of Jacob Varn who came from Germany and settled in Lexington District, S. C., and moved, 1790-1795, to Beaufort District, S. C. She died near Bartow, Polk County, Florida, on April 18, 1861, "age 66". Children by the 1st wife were: Filey Reading, Ezra H., Nathan Snow, Jacob John (called "Jehu"), and Mary.

His 2nd. wife was Elizabeth Marsh, whom he married on November 2, 1802, in Bartow, Polk County, Florida. She died February 11, 1866, in Bartow, Florida. By the 2nd wife, he had two daughters, Jessie and Elizabeth.

The 3rd. wife of Reading Blount was Mrs. Leacy (widder) Collins, whom he married in Polk County, on July 19th, 1866, and by whom he had the following children: Martha, Henrietta, Daniel Stamford, and Gussie or Isabella (name doubtful).

Page, of Bartow, Florida, stated to writer (M.D.V.) a few years before her death that her mother was Eve Varn, who was born about 1800 and was the only child of her mother who died when Eve was 3 weeks old; that the father of Eve Varn died when Eve was 7 years old. Mrs. Page could not recall the name of Eve's father but stated he had a brother Benjamin Varn and also a brother Aaron Varn, who had four sons, J. James, L. Berry, G. Mrs. Page further stated that the father of Eve Varn and his brother Benjamin Varn married sisters and that Elizabeth Varn, a daughter of Benjamin Varn, married Reeding Blount, who settled in what is now Bartow, Polk County, Florida, in 1851. Mrs. Page said her mother married John Davidson and that she was the only child; and that her mother, Eve (Varn) Davidson, died in Bartow, Florida, in 1866. Mrs. Page further stated that the father of Eve Varn was a first cousin of Frederick Varn (son of John) who married Sarah Hiers.

DATA ABOUT FREDERIC VARN, SON OF JOHN VARN AND FREDERIC VARN'S WIFE,
SARAH, DAUGHTER OF JACOB HIERS, AS TOLD BY THEIR SON FREDERIC N. VARN,
SEPTEMBER 28, 1912, TO MILTON D. WILSON, OF BARTOW, FLORIDA.

An alligator caught Sarah Hiers, in South Carolina, when she was about 10 or 12 years of age and left scars below her knee.

John Varn, the immigrant from Germany, lived about 18 miles north of Hampton, South Carolina, on the west side of the Saltketchers.

Sarah Hiers had a sister who married a Smiley.

Frederic Varn moved from Hamilton County, Florida, in 1848, and settled 3 miles northwest of Plant City, just west of W. S. Knight's place 2 miles, on a sand hill, and in 1853 he moved to Polk County and settled 2 miles south of Bartow.

Frederic Varn moved from South Carolina to near Troupville, (Near Valdosta), Georgia, and later moved to Hamilton County, Florida.

Some of the slaves of Frederic Varn were:

1. Old Jerry; he was a mechanic and made money at night working for himself. One day he went to Owen Keen and took \$2600.00 in money with him and asked Owen to buy his freedom.
2. Clara, wife of Jerry; and their children; 3. Dora; 4. Rosa; 5. Minerva; 6. Stephen; 7. Old Jack; 8. Lizzie, Jack's wife, and their children; 9. Charlotte; 10. Simon; 11. Seely; 12. Harriett; 13. Eliza; and Harriett had 14. Reuben, and 15. Jerry, and there were several others.

Once when Sarah (Hiers) Varn was crossing the Saltketchers, in South Carolina, the water was so high the wagon body floated away from the wagon down the river and the negro driving the team, drove it across the river; then ran down the river and threw a rope to Sarah in the wagon and pulled it ashore.

DATA ON THE VARNS FROM TALK BY MILTON D. WILSON, OF BARTOW, FLORIDA, ON OCTOBER 5, 1912, WITH ANDREW JOSHUA VARN, SON OF WILLIAM VARN, WHO WAS FREDERIC VARN'S OLDER BROTHER.

Josh Varn said his Uncle Frederic Varn was a great hunter.

The old family bible of William Varn, son of John, was in the old barn of Aren Dasher Varn; write to wife of Aren D. Varn, at Cecil, Georgia.

Joshua Varn says his father William spoke "Dutch" fluently and had many "Dutch" books which he read often.

FREDERIC VARN, SON OF JOHN VARN.

The last place of residence of Frederic Varn was about two miles southwest of Bartow. He owned the property now known as the Pharr phosphate property. His hog lot cornered exactly where the railroad passes over six mile creek.

He was well fixed in this world's goods and had about fifteen negroes which he kept working on the place.

His wife, whom he called Sally, especially accenting the last syllable, was a most painstaking housekeeper and always kept everything in order about the place. She was a most devout Christian and was always very careful to lead a most Christian life.

Frederic, however, while a good man and well liked by all, took but little stock in churches. He always looked upon the pleasant side of life and was a great joker, and was always laughing.

His wife, on the other hand, looked upon the sterner side of life and never joked.

His wife, Sally, was really the head of the family and had complete charge of the raising of the children. When they needed it, it was she who thrashed them, and if ever any of her children told a lie or were disobedient, she always thrashed them. She believed that to spare the rod would spoil the child.

Frederic Varn was very fond of dogs and always had seven or eight on the place.

He always had a few of the best ducks, chickens and geese which he always fed himself and would not intrust their feeding to his slaves. It was from these that he always picked his fowl for his Sunday dinner, as it was his custom to always have an unusually good Sunday dinner.

Deer were in abundance about his place and he always kept three or four fine shotguns and rifles ready for hunting.

He had a large sideboard of solid mahogany on which he always kept his decanters of wine and whiskey, and everyone who came to see them or dropped in to pay a short visit were always first offered a drink, and the glasses and decanters were set before them. Then his wife, Sally, always had some bread and butter to offer them. This was a custom at their house and was always gone through with when a visitor first arrived.

Frederic Varn always had many visitors and a large table.

Frederic Varn spoke with a strong German accent.

Frederic Varn was too old to go to the Confederate War but his sons attended. His son, Josiah, who married Victoria M. Seward, was killed in one of the battles of the war and his body was never recovered.

His son William Baker Varn was also in the war.

The Varns and Blounts were the first settlers around Bartow, with the exception of Bigdon Brown and his Son William who were living in what is now called Summerlin Hammock, and they had to make the roads for their wagons when they came to Bartow as there were no roads south of Bigdon Brown's place.

Frederic Varn was afflicted with great nervousness during the last few years of his life, so that it was with great difficulty that he was able to eat; his head and hands shook so when he attempted it.

When he died he devised all of his property to his son Frederic, who married Mary L. Seward.

Frederic Varn, his son, sold the home place for Eight Thousand Dollars.

The above is the substance of a conversation concerning him, held by Milton D. Wilson, at Bartow, Florida, with his grandson, Benjamin F. Blount, on this 18th day of July, 1912.

FREDERICK VARN, POLK'S EARLIEST PIONEER, IS DEAD

Veteran of Confederate Army. He established Indian trading post 60 years ago. (by L. A. Morgan)

Fort Meade, Nov. 14. In the passing of Frederick Newton Varn early this morning, Polk County lost her earliest and oldest pioneer citizen. Born near what is now Live Oak, Aug. 30, 1847, his father moved to what was later known as Cork, near the present site of Plant City, four months later. During the Indian war the family spent many months at Fort Frazier near Bartow, where they started a farm close to the fort.

At the close of the Indian War the family established a farm two miles south of Bartow on the Six Mile Creek, where they lived for many years.

At the age of 15 years Mr. Varn joined the Confederate army, and was a dispatch rider between Fort Myers and other Confederate outposts in northern Florida. He had many thrilling experiences and escapes during the war and his description of life during the war and early pioneer days would have filled a book of absorbing interest, for he had seen Polk County grow from a few scattering families to be the empire county of Florida. Sixty years ago he settled at Sink branch, three miles east of Fort Meade, where he and his brother, William, established a tannery and shoe and leather business and a trading post with the Indians.

This business prospered and people came from as far away as Gainesville, Tampa and Sanford to have shoes, bridles and saddle-bags made. Work was given to a large number of people in those days

and "The Tannery", as it was called, is shown on the old state maps printed in the seventies and early eighties.

Mr. Varn's family had been farmers and stock raisers for generations, so it was natural and necessary for him to farm on a considerable scale to furnish food for his employees. In those pioneer days practically everything had to be grown at home for there was no transportation. Cotton and wool were produced and spun by hand into clothes, and a new Easter dress was a real neighborhood object of interest. The few necessities that could not be grown or made on the farm were hauled from Tampa, generally in ox wagons, eight to ten days being required for the round trip.

Supplies had to be brought from New Orleans to Pensacola in large schooners and transhipped in smaller schooners to Tampa. In those days Tampa was a straggling village with but two small stores to supply all south Florida.

In 1870, Mr. Varn was united in marriage to Miss Mary Seward and 10 children were born, five of whom are living: Kline G., of St. Augustine; Claude G., of Daytona Beach; Jackson S., of Tampa, and David H. Varn and Mrs. Lillian Singleton, of Fort Meade.

Mr. Varn lived continuously on his farm from 1869 to 1920, when he retired and made his home with his children, and for the past several years with D. H. Varn. His devoted wife passed on to her reward in February, 1914. Hers was a saintly character, church-going, a devoted mother and adored by all her friends. Their life together was a very happy one.

Mr. Varn was a devoted Christian and church-goer. He early united with the Baptist church and was a consistent member throughout his life. The present Baptist church building in Fort Meade was literally built by his hands and he lived it dearly.

As a man Mr. Varn was a peerless character. Honest to a fault, his word was his bond. Of quiet and unassuming disposition, he had strong convictions, lived his family, and friends. And while he had no thought of office he was always interested in politics, education and advancement of his town and county. He was an active Mason in his early life. He lived farming and his farm was one of the show places of the country in his prime, and none was more energetic.

Funeral services will be held from the Baptist church in Fort Meade Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock and interment in Evergreen cemetery, Fort Meade.

"Jacob Hiers was the father of Sarah Varn, the wife of Frederick Varn. One son of Jacob Hiers was Richard Hiers, offspring of Richard was Mary, (Richard dead), George, other two still living. Miss Mary at Sneads, Fla. Sarah Hiers married Fred Varn and moved to Fla. One of her sisters married Rev. Paul Johnson and was living near Valdosta, Ga. in 1863. One son of Parker was named Hampton. The mother of Sarah Varn, the wife of Jacob Hiers, after the death of J. Hiers married Duncan Stuart who had one child Catharine Stuart. Catherine Stuart married Joseph Smiley, Charles Smiley, their son. He always called her "Aunt Katy". She Aunt Sallie (Sarah) Varn's half sister. M.C.S."
