Dear Cousin Robert Peoples,

Recently, a cousin gave me a copy of your article on the Grimball Plantation Journal. Then, another cousin gave me her copy of Kith and Kin on loan, and I saw where Carolyn Harrell referred to your work. Now, I have your address from the Reunion papers mailed to me, so I want to write you and thank you for everything you've done to make public the details of family history as you have.

My mother Lucille Willingham and my father David Buckner of Ridgeland, S.C. met and married in Rock Hill, S.C. Apparently they were unaware that they were cousins. However, they shared double lines of descent from Pierre Robert, Jr. and single lines from Elias Jaudon and Sarah Chouin (Mrs. Willingham, and later Mrs. E. G. Jaudon). They ^(my parents) were divorced, and I later discovered the kinship links when reading a copy of Our Family Circle given me by the late Mrs. A. M. Graham (Ellene Estes Graham, granddaughter of A. Broadus Estes and wife Cornelia Willingham)

of Rock Hill. Dad had told me his maternal grandparents were Howell Wall and Grace Perry, and that he and she were both (Dad and his mom) one of seven children. The list, on p. 207, ^(Our F. Cir.) said that they ^(Howell + Grace Wall) had 7 children, but listed only five. The date of birth, however, given for the child Elizabeth, is the same as that of my grandmother, who was Martha Secilia Wall. This date appears on her tombstone in Ridgeland Town Cemetery, where she rests beside her husband, my paternal grandfather W. O. Buckner. Only one of the children of this couple remains alive. He is Walter Vernon Buckner of Shulerville, S.C. He is now 78, but his mind has failed just a bit recently. I knew my grandmother's sister, Great Aunt Cora Wall Beach, and I attended the funeral of her daughter, Lt. Comdr. Grace Beach of the U. S. Navy Nurses Corps, in Ridgeland many years ago.

The reason I'm writing you this is in the hope that if the Miller genealogy is ever again republished, that the names of Eugene Wall and Martha Secilia Wall may find their places along with their five siblings.

my father David had never heard of the family book and never mentioned any of the Robert, Jaudon, Chovin, or other ancestors to me, but had mentioned the Walls, Perrys, Heapes, and Buckners. He was the youngest child, and didn't know much family history, but I later learned that his oldest brother, Wm Bert of N. Augusta, had told his children about the "Landgrave," and possibly others. It has been just over a year since I learned that my double ancestor Sarah Chovin was a Robert descendent, but I already knew Dad's ancestor E. G. Jaudon was one, and that mother's double ancestor Sarah Lawton (Mrs. Joseph Lawton) was. This came as a bit of a whammy, to mean that my two brothers Graham and Eugene and I go back to Pierre Robert Jr. five ways. It was Virginia Gourdin who enlightened us, and I'd certainly like to meet her.

For your information, I'd like to enclose a few articles of my more immediate family history, for kinship's sake, for identity's sake, and for a bit of acquaintance. My late uncle Thomas Lawton Willingham, Jr. was the 6th Tom Wham in an unbroken line of Tom's. The first four were Thomas

Henry's. But the fourth married his ^{father's} first Cousin, Mildred Lawton. Great great grand father Lawton (Col. Winborn Joseph) left no sons to carry on his name, and Thomas and Mildred named grand father Thomas Lawton Willingham. When he was 14 his father died. He obtained degrees from U. of Ga. at Athens, and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, and served several South Carolina churches as a minister of the Gospel. (Swift Creek, near Hartsville, Graham, near Sumter, Wateree, in Camden, and Park, in Rock Hill, were the main four that I know about). I knew him, and I loved him. After mother's only brother Tom died in 1951, Granddaddy called me "namesake." I was indeed named Thomas Lawton Buckner, after him. My older brother was named for my own father, David.

I hope someday to meet you, dear Cousin, if it pleases God, and if so I can thank you in person. I've wanted to attend a Lawton Reunion, but so far I've been unable. My guess is you're descended from Benjamin F. D. Lawton and Jane Mosse, and from their daughter Charlotte, who married Edward Peebles.

I know of several other minor corrections

to Our Family Circle. I would like to obtain a personal copy of the latest revision. I own no copy at present, although my brother Eugene does. I am divorced. I have a son, 18, Tom L. Jr., who resides with me here in Cary. If you can obtain a copy for me, I'll gladly reimburse you.
